Using SIMD to improve outcomes

Following our last newsletter we heard some very good examples about how SIMD is being used to improve and direct services for the better. We have attached some examples of good practice of SIMD.

These examples show how SIMD can be used in conjunction with other data sources to make informed decisions and polices. We have also reissued our guidance on the best practices to employ when using SIMD.

Help for our infrequent users

The SIMD team attended the Gathering in the SECC, Glasgow. We met a lot of people who are interested in SIMD, but who don't need to use it often or in very much detail.

To help everyone, including infrequent users, we are preparing a new online tutorial that people can access at any time, with instructions on how to quickly get the SIMD information you require.

Fuel poverty

In the workshops you told us that we should look at fuel poverty as a new longterm indicator. Households are in fuel poverty if they need to spend over 10% of their income to stay satisfactorily warm.

To measure fuel poverty we would need to know household income, cost of fuel, and the house's energy efficiency. Since we don't have this information for all households, we can't measure fuel poverty directly at datazone level.

Instead we are exploring whether other data sources could be used as a proxy measure. If this turns out to be possible this will be included as a new indicator in SIMD 2015.
