A public consultation on draft Regulations and Statutory Guidance to accompany the Social Care (Self-directed Support) (Scotland) Act 2013

NHS Highland and The Highland Council welcome the opportunity to comment on the draft Regulations and Statutory Guidance that will accompany the new legislation when it comes into force in April next year.

We suggest that the heading for this section should read 'Assessment and Eligibility'. As a whole, we feel that the section is overly-detailed and that it could be condensed without losing any of its meaning. In particular, we feel that this section is overly jargon-laden and fear that that there is a danger that this may result in too much manoeuvrability in interpretation. We believe that there is a particular risk around eligibility criteria, which in turn may lead to a postcode lottery.

We feel that it may be appropriate to reconsider how best Guidance might be provided in respect of children and families. We note that the Scottish Government proposes to develop a suite of Guidance aimed at different stakeholders. We therefore wonder whether it makes sense to develop specific Guidance aimed at SDS in respect of children and families.

The reason for asserting the above is that it is felt that the draft Guidance here is heavily targeted around adult services and there is insufficient recognition of the major differences between children and adults, their respective needs and the support that they require in order to meet agreed outcomes.

Professional discretion should be able to be exercised as to whether such children/young people e.g. in long term foster placements or cared for through a shared care package can access a direct payment.

We need to ensure that SDS does enable flexible support solutions for children and young people. For example, some young people are '*looked after*' on a 'part-time basis' in as much as they are in receipt of term-time residential care provision. SDS may be helpful in enabling families to access appropriate support during holiday periods.

We make reference at several points in this response to child and adult protection and would want to stress again in this section the need to ensure that significant child protection concerns will always take precedence over the options for SDS.

In a situation where an SDS support package is in place and compulsory measures are subsequently applied, there will be need to review this as a matter of urgency and for transitional arrangements to be agreed e.g. where there are issues of neglect and the parent is not engaging in the implementation of the Child's Plan.

Links and interface with other bodies involved in child protection need to be clearer e.g. the Children's Hearing system, especially with the legislative changes introduced which provide a new ground which is more applicable to children with disabilities.

The importance of professional judgement and discretion is again highlighted. For example, where compulsory measures are in place e.g. where a child is '*supervised*' at home, there may be little room for flexibility unless professional discretion can be applied to use SDS as a way of empowering the family to engage.

The current regulations are concerning as there is no legal requirement for

parent/carers to ensure that personal assistants are members of the PVG scheme. This is relevant irrespective of whether the recipient is a child or adult.

The assessment and support planning process/providing choice in the wider safeguarding role: This section is not sufficiently clear that conflict can be the dominant factor with a family when intervention is not at the request of the parent/carer. This can make planning difficult/not possible until the conflict is resolved.

The involvement of the child in making and managing choices: We feel that there could be more explicit guidance around utilising SDS with young carers providing support for a parent or guardian, especially where the views of the parent may conflict with those of the young person. Throughout Scotland there is a shortage of advocacy for children and young people especially those with a disability. Hence, it should not be assumed that this is readily available. We would wish to highlight that the role of the 'appropriate person' for those under the age of 16 appears to conflict with other legislation that gives children greater influence in decision making over the age of 12.

Transition: this section of the Guidance would benefit from being strengthened considerably with regard to the interface between children's and adult services

Incapacity: there are also issues during transition to adult services when a young person lacks capacity to consent and the parent has been using a direct payment to employ staff. A guardianship application would have to be made in order that the support arrangements can continue. This process takes time and needs to be started well before the young person reaches the age of 16. Where Guardianship proceedings are in hand but not yet confirmed there needs to be greater clarity regarding parental/carer responsibility in agreeing the direct payment. Where the young person has reduced capacity and Guardianship is not deemed necessary, there may be difficulty if it is considered that the young person would not be capable of taking on the role of being the employer. This could create legal issues for both the family and the local authority in terms of who is the lawful employer. We feel that some consideration in the Guidance of the legal issues surrounding this would be helpful.

The promotion of options to children and families: with regard to promoting SDS for all children and families it is considered necessary to build on existing work and learning from direct payments provision with children and young people with disabilities with a view to a phased roll out beyond that group of children and young people. It would be useful to have clearer definitions regarding 'specialist support depending on specific need of the child or young person' as this can rest with health professionals.

On the whole, we like the Guidance but at 79 pages feel that the document could be shorter and use more accessible language.

We have referred elsewhere to the need to ensure that the move towards integrated health and social care services in Scotland should be better reflected. In the light of this, we feel that further recognition needs to be given to the fact that many adult care support packages include elements of both health and social care and in the case of children and families, the support packages also include resources from local authority education providers.

We plan to update the BRIA in light of the comments and information from this consultation.

We welcome the Scottish Government's commitment to providing dedicated funding until 2015 to support the implementation of the new legislation and plan to make optimum use of this. We hold the view that the legislation will result in fundamental cultural change and its implementation means that our practice will need to change. Hence this process of major change, together with its consolidation, will extend well beyond 2015. In Highland we are developing a 5 year strategy for SDS and note that nationally there is a 10-year strategy for SDS.

Our view is that any option whereby an individual would access a gross payment of their Direct Payment would inevitably result in additional administration time and costs for us. We feel that this is not a good use of public funds.

Question 2: What are your views on Part 3 of the draft Regulations (appropriate/inappropriate circumstances for the employment of close relatives)?

As stated in Question 10c, we support the decision not to relax the rules around use of family members as paid members of staff.

Question 3: What are your views on Regulation 11 which deems individuals who are placed under a variety of criminal justice orders to be ineligible to receive direct payments?

For example, is it appropriate to impose the exclusions listed in Regulation 11? Are there any persons not listed in regulation 11 to whom it would be inappropriate to offer the option of a direct payment?

We believe that this is a complex area and whilst in general, we would support the position, we do feel that there are some situations - albeit exceptional – where it may be appropriate for people in the identified exclusion list to benefit from a direct payment. Subsequently, we feel that there may be merit in reviewing this section of the Regulations.

Question 4: What are your views on restricting access to direct payments for those who are homeless, those who are fleeing domestic abuse or those who require support in relation to drug or alcohol addiction?

Whilst we would generally agree that a direct payment would not be generally appropriate at times of crisis, we can see opportunities where a direct payment might be beneficial to one of the classified groups as part of a support package. Again, professional judgement would be paramount in ascertaining appropriateness.

We feel that in highlighting specific groups in this way, the Guidance may potentially be discriminatory.

Question 5: What are your views on restricting access to direct payments in relation to the provision of long-term residential care?

This question was raised during the initial consultations on a draft SDS Bill. The Scottish Government would like to invite detailed views before making a final decision prior to the laying of the Regulations before the Scottish Parliament. Should the restriction be removed from the final regulations, thereby allowing direct payments for residential care? Or should it be retained? Please provide reasons as to your support or opposition to requiring authorities to provide direct payments for residential care.

Our own experience is that to date there has been little interest from people in Highland wishing to access a direct payment for the purpose of purchasing a residential service. If flexibility is issue, then we believe that the Individual Service Fund approach may be the most appropriate route to go down for a younger adult. On the whole, we see little advantage for the individual in going down the direct payment route unless they are keen to purchase a service from a provider that we do not currently contract with. We believe a move in this direction would require considerable planning both at a national and local level not least of all taking account in older people's services of the impact on the National Care Contract.

Question 6: The draft Regulations do not specify circumstances where the direct payment option should be unavailable for care and support to children/families. *Should* there be specific restrictions on choice of support in relation to children/families support (i.e. support provided under Section 22 of the Children (Scotland) Act 1995) and should these restrictions apply to the direct payment only, or to other options as well?

We feel that we have addressed this in 8c of the Guidance and 3 and 4 of the Regulations where we have flagged the importance of professional judgement.
