The Scottish Government Consultation Process

Consultation is an essential and important aspect of Scottish Government working methods. Given the wide-ranging areas of work of the Scottish Government, there are many varied types of consultation. However, in general, Scottish Government consultation exercises aim to provide opportunities for all those who wish to express their opinions on a proposed area of work to do so in ways which will inform and enhance that work.

The Scottish Government encourages consultation that is thorough, effective and appropriate to the issue under consideration and the nature of the target audience. Consultation exercises take account of a wide range of factors, and no two exercises are likely to be the same.

Typically Scottish Government consultations involve a written paper inviting answers to specific questions or more general views about the material presented. Written papers are distributed to organisations and individuals with an interest in the issue, and they are also placed on the Scottish Government web site enabling a wider audience to access the paper and submit their responses.

Consultation exercises may also involve seeking views in a number of different ways, such as through public meetings, focus groups or questionnaire exercises.

Planning Scotland's Seas: Scotland's National Marine Plan and associated consultations

Beatrice Offshore Windfarm Limited (BOWL) welcomes the opportunity to respond to Scotland's National Marine Plan draft consultation and associated consultations.

Scotland's National Marine Plan

BOWL welcomes the explicit reference that 'the Scottish marine planning system should promote development and activities that promote sustainable economic growth' and in line with this overarching objective, BOWL strongly believe renewable energy development and associated infrastructure will have a crucial role to play in meeting this objective.

BOWL believes the draft Marine Plan and associated consultation documents present a helpful exercise and will provide a clear direction regarding the future management of Scotland's seas however there are a number of aspects which cause BOWL concern.

Marine Protected Area Network

Whilst BOWL supports government plans to introduce nature conservation MPAs, it has concerns over whether suitable consideration has been given to the BOWL development when setting the boundaries for sites forming part of the MPA network and in particular new marine pSPAs/ SPAs. The current protection SPAs afford to the marine environment is outlined at page 29 of the Possible Nature Conservation Marine Protected Areas Consultation Overview consultation document.

The Habitats Regulations require that existing project consents must be reviewed for projects which could give rise to likely significant effects on a newly designated SPA. With major pre-construction costs and long construction timescales associated with the Wind Farm, significant expenditure will have been committed at the point of any consent review. BOWL has already undertaken a detailed Environmental Impact Assessment and

provided Information to Inform an Appropriate Assessment (Habitats Regulations Appraisal) which addresses ornithology. The active proposals reviewed in this consultation to potentially designate new SPAs in the vicinity of the Beatrice Offshore Wind Farm effectively mean a new project consent may be required at an unknown future date. It is additionally not possible to quantify the consenting risk at present because any proposed boundaries and conservation objectives of new SPAs are unknown.

BOWL intends to make major investment decisions for the Wind Farm once all necessary consents have been granted. The uncertainty generated by the potential for new SPAs raises significant issues with investment commitments and if they could be made.

Therefore BOWL requests that the Scottish Government give serious consideration to the uncertainty the issue around pSPAs has on future investment in the Beatrice Offshore Wind Farm. If the UK and Scottish Governments wish to meet the ambitious renewable energy targets this uncertainty requires to be addressed.
