Gigabit In Scotland

Public Review Report (Revised)



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March 2024

1. Introduction And Background

In March 2021, the UK Government announced an ambition to deliver nationwide gigabit-capable broadband as soon as possible, recognising that there is a need for government intervention in the parts of the country that are not commercially viable. They have committed a total of £5bn to ensure that all areas of the UK can benefit. This will be spent through a package of coordinated and mutually supportive interventions, collectively known as Project Gigabit¹, with an initial intervention of £1.2bn targeting at least 85% gigabit coverage of the UK by 2025.

The Scottish Government issued a Public Review (**PR**)² to determine the eligible intervention area for investment of public funds into gigabit-capable broadband infrastructure on 23rd March 2023. The period of consultation closed on 24th April 2023, with the Public Review formally closing on 23rd June 2023.

The outcome of this PR will be used to inform eligibility for possible future procurements via Project Gigabit and support the development of other potential public interventions in Scotland. It may also be used to determine eligibility for the current UK-wide GigaHubs and Gigabit Voucher programmes.

2. Purpose Of This Public Review Report

Under the UK Government's Gigabit Infrastructure Subsidy Scheme³ guidelines, public sector intervention in broadband infrastructure investment is limited to those areas where there is no current or planned (within the next 3 years) commercial deployments, to avoid distorting what might otherwise be/become a competitive market.

The Scottish Government carried out an Open Market Review (**OMR**)⁴ of all current and planned infrastructure within the scope area between 21st February 2022 and 21st March 2022. The submitted data allowed us to produce a draft intervention area for the Public Review.

The Public Review is now complete and this report sets out the responses to the consultation and the actions that the Scottish Government has taken as a direct result of those responses and subsequent data changes from suppliers.

This report was originally published⁵ on 3rd November 2023 following the outcome of our Public Review. Further data submissions from infrastructure suppliers have been received and assessed as part of our regular rolling OMR update process, where suppliers provide coverage updates to the Scottish Government three times per year. As well as suppliers' plans, the Scottish Government also accounts for updates from existing intervention programmes, including the R100 Programme and UK Government programmes. Submissions received by 19th January 2024 will be taken account of ahead of the first planned interventions later this year. The revised outcome is included in this report.

3. Public Review Response

A total of 17 formal responses were submitted during the consultation period. None of the responses asked to be treated in confidence. The table in Appendix A summarises the responses and the actions that the Scottish Government has taken as a result.

The table has been extended to include the 12 further responses received from infrastructure suppliers as part of our rolling OMR process up to 19th January 2024.

4. Revised Intervention Area

As a result of the Public Review and including supplier data changes during the assessment phase and rolling OMR process, the Scottish Government has revised the Gigabit broadband map for Scotland. In line with the Gigabit Infrastructure Subsidy Scheme guidelines, the Scottish Government has classified premises as White, Grey, Under Review or Black. We will only subsidise build to premises which have been designated as White.

- White indicates premises with no gigabit network infrastructure and none is likely to be developed within 3 years
- Black indicates premises with two or more qualifying gigabit infrastructures from different suppliers being available, or will be deployed within the coming 3 years
- Grey indicates premises with a single qualifying gigabit infrastructure from a single supplier is available, or is to be deployed within the coming 3 years
- Under Review indicates premises where suppliers have reported current or planned commercial broadband coverage, but where claimed current gigabit coverage has not been verified, or, in respect of planned

build, where evaluators are confident that gigabit infrastructure will be delivered, but some risks to delivery remain, or there are some gaps in evidence.

For presentational purposes, postcodes have been used when mapping the proposed eligible areas for this Public Review (note we will only subsidise build to premises which have been designated as White - postcodes are not used to determine intervention areas for subsidy).

For the purpose of mapping only, postcodes have been classified as follows:

- 1. A postcode is **White** if any 'White' premises are present; else
- 2. A postcode is **Under Review** if any 'Under Review' premises are present; else
- A postcode is **Black** if all premises in the postcode are classified 'Black'; else
- 4. A postcode is **Grey** if all premises are 'Grey' or there is a mixture of 'Grey' and 'Black' premises

The current Gigabit coverage map for Scotland can be found in Appendix B. An associated file is available for download alongside this document listing all postcodes with their Subsidy Control classification and premise breakdown. A list of eligible premises (White and Under Review) is available to suppliers upon request.

Premises that are classified as Under Review will be subject to continued monitoring and verification of supplier plans within the proposed delivery period by the Scottish Government and in the event that these commercial plans fall away, these premises will be reclassified as White and form part of the proposed intervention area and therefore eligible for intervention via this aid measure. Monitoring forms part of the rolling OMR process.

The mapping analysis of existing and evidenced planned coverage (within the next 3 years) has identified significant remaining 'White' areas. The outcome of the Public Review is summarised in terms of White, Grey, Black and Under Review premises below and in reference to postcode mapping as described above:

Note that this outcome reflects the whole of Scotland. The PR⁶ document intimated that Highlands and Islands Enterprise (**HIE**) was carrying out a Project Gigabit procurement on behalf of the Inverness and Highland City Region Deal. HIE has since confirmed that it will not proceed with the procurement, therefore in line with the PR document, we have assessed all premises in Scotland.

In line with the Gigabit Infrastructure Subsidy Scheme, if commercial plans change and are notified to the Scottish Government, then affected premises can be reclassified accordingly.

For any potential procurements, the Scottish Government will make coverage information available at a premises level within the identified White postcode areas to bidders to ensure that bids can target those premises without Gigabit broadband coverage efficiently.

5. Next Steps

The Scottish Government has used this information to define the eligible Intervention Area for potential future procurements under the Gigabit Infrastructure Subsidy Scheme⁷ and is in the process of finalising the design of procurement areas as a subset of the intervention area. These have been discussed with the market via a Pre-Procurement Market Engagement exercise. In line with the scheme, potential procurements are likely to include both "Local Contracts" using the existing Dynamic Purchasing System and "Regional Procurements" using the restricted procurement procedure.

A map showing the potential local (Type A) and regional (Type B) procurements can be found in Appendix C. The first procurement (Lot 1) is scheduled to launch in March this year and includes 11,394 properties

throughout the Scottish Borders and parts of East Lothian, Midlothian and South Lanarkshire. Further detail of the proposed Lot 1 procurement can be found in Appendix D.

The process required for the provision of gigabit broadband infrastructure under the scheme across all of Scotland is expected to take around 5 years with the first contracts awarded in the second half of 2024.

The UK Government plans further interventions beyond those described above as part of Project Gigabit.








Appendix C – Potential Gigabit Procurements



Appendix D - Lot 1 Procurement Details

The first procurement (Lot 1) is scheduled to launch in March this year and includes 11,394 properties throughout the Scottish Borders and parts of East Lothian, Midlothian and South Lanarkshire. The Lot 1 boundary plan shown below has been defined as being bounded by the Scottish national border in the South and the North Sea coast in the East/ North East. The Lot broadly follows the boundary with the Local Authority areas of Dumfries & Galloway and South Lanarkshire in the West with the exception of the moorlands between Broughton and Moffat where no premises exist. This creates a natural barrier in the west of the lot. The North of the Lot area is bounded by the natural barrier of the Pentland Hills and crosses through East Lothian to the coast dividing the Edinburgh commuter belt area (where commercial activity exists or is planned) with the more rural part of the Local Authority area.




The Scottish Government has carried out market engagement to seek feedback from suppliers on the Scotland-wide intervention area and individual Lot design, including procurement type and market capacity to bid for potential procurements.

The total public funding investment has been based on the number of premises requiring subsidy. The Scottish Government will confirm a budget drawn from public funding for this area within the forthcoming tender documentation. Details of any restrictions on the use of public subsidy will be explained within the tender documentation.

Lot 1 will be a Type A Procurement with 11,394 in-scope premises for an anticipated subsidy amount of £26,296,482.

The in-scope premises for the procurement are shown below, with the subsuperfast (< 30 Mbps) premises shown in a different colour for transparency. Full details of eligible premises will be included within the tender documentation and are available to suppliers on request.



This procurement was designed utilising data from the PR conducted in Scotland referred to above and supplemented with information derived from the October 2023 rolling Open Market Review undertaken by the Scottish Government and subsequent supplier and programme updates received up to the 19th January 2024. Premises identified as no longer valid in our baseline Ordnance Survey data have also been removed. This ensures that we have used the most up to date information about suppliers' existing and planned commercial build with supplier submissions being used to inform eligibility across Project Gigabit in Scotland procurements.

The Scottish Government is confident that integrating these rolling OMR findings will ensure the best possible outcome for this procurement area, maximising both coverage and value for money accordingly. Our interventions will always flex to respond to both changes in the dynamic marketplace, and the appetite for our procurements.

The forthcoming procurement for Lot 1 will be carried out in accordance with the Public Contracts (Scotland) Regulations 2015⁸. Scottish Government procurement approaches are designed to address the scale of the individual procurements. The Lot 1 procurement will be conducted in a transparent and non-discriminatory manner. The Scottish Government reserves the right to amend or withdraw the procedure for the competitive sourcing process at any time. Any amendments will be done in line with the Procurement Regulations.
