## Introduction





The Industrial Injuries Scheme (IIS) gives money to people who have become disabled or become injured because of their job. The Scottish Government is planning to replace the IIS with a new benefit called Employment Injury Assistance which will be delivered by Social Security Scotland.

Since April 2020 the Scottish Government has been responsible for IIS in Scotland. It is being delivered by the Department for Work and Pensions (DWP) until we introduce Employment Injury Assistance. This means people continue to get the payments they need.



This has meant that we have had time to think carefully about IIS. This has taken longer than we planned due to the pandemic and other benefits we have prioritised such as Adult Disability Payment and Scottish Child Payment.



We need your help to make sure that the new benefit works well for the people who get it. There are some questions throughout this document so you can tell us what you think.


## Background



IIS was introduced in 1948 to support people who became disabled or developed a disease because of their work.



The scheme hasn't changed much since it was introduced.



The scheme has 7 benefits. The benefits which make up the scheme are listed below.



#### Open to new applications

Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit (IIDB)

**Constant Attendance Allowance** 

**Exceptionally Severe** 

**Disablement Allowance** 

**Reduced Earnings Allowance** 

**Retirement Allowance** 

## Closed to new applications but some people still receive payment

Un-employability Supplement

Industrial Death Benefit



There are less than 1,000 new applications in Scotland per year. This number has been decreasing since 2002.



## **Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit**



The main benefit in the Industrial Injuries Scheme is Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit.



Around 21,000 people receive Industrial Injuries Disablement Benefit in Scotland.



In order to meet the eligibility criteria, someone must either: -

 have a long-term health condition or disease that is on a list of diseases
be disabled as a result of an accident.

The condition or injury must have happened because of your job.



An Industrial Injuries Advisory Council (IIAC) advises the UK Government if new diseases should be added.



Members of the Council include scientific and medical professionals.



IIAC cannot provide advice to the Scottish Government.

## Challenges of the current system



There are challenges with replacing IIS. Some of these challenges are set out below.

## Gender gap



Men make up the majority of people who receive an IIS benefit.



The conditions list does not include many injuries and diseases which are more common for women.



Adding new diseases to the list takes a long time because of the research and changes to the law that is needed.

### **Other disparities**



People who are black or from an ethnic minority are more at risk from workplace injuries but can face additional barriers in getting benefits.



63% of those who get IIS benefits are over state pension age.

### Assessments



To get IIDB, people have to have a medical assessment to decide how much they should get. This is a very medical approach which is different to the approach the Scottish Government have taken for Child Disability Payment and Adult Disability Payment.

## Section 2 – Taking forward delivery of Employment Injury Assistance



We want to deliver our benefits in a compassionate way while making sure we protect peoples' current payments.

## Option 1: Like for like benefit delivered with full case transfer with benefit reform to follow



The Industrial Injuries Scheme is mainly delivered using paper files.



This means that, unlike the Scottish social security system, applications are paper-based.



Files are held in multiple locations and many of these files are very old and in poor condition.



The number of files is much greater than for other benefits. This means we need to find and move paper-based files that are for people in Scottland which is difficult to do.



We will need to create a way to apply online. This could cost £39.8 million which we need to think very carefully about.



We could keep a paper-based system for applications. This would cost £13 million. However, this might not meet the principles of our Social Security Charter.



Our main priority is making sure no one loses their current payments.



However, the transfer of the Industrial Injuries Scheme would be very difficult because it is currently a paper-based system.



Moving up to 150,000 paper files will take a lot of time and will cost more than it has done to transfer other benefits from DWP.



One option would be to deliver Employment Injury Assistance on a like for like basis as IIS before May 2026. This means Employment Injury Assistance would be very similar to IIS.



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We would have to work with DWP to establish a detailed timetable for case transfer.



Delivering Employment Injury Assistance now on a like-for-like basis would use time and money which can be better used in the short-term, including how to improve the benefit for the future.

## Option 2: Prioritise fundamental reform of Employment Injury Assistance



There are specific challenges for us to deliver Employment Injury Assistance.



The current Scheme has about 1,000 new applications per year.



The Scottish Government believes a different approach to delivery may be needed to provide a high-quality service to clients which provides value for money.



This approach would not involve delivery in the same way as the current Scheme or case transfer.



There is a need to update who can receive the benefit and provide value for money.



This would allow us to consider the design of a new benefit that meets the needs of people in Scotland today



Developing an updated Employment Injury Assistance will involve a lot of research and talking to experts.



The first step will be creating a group with experts to inform what we do next. This is called a stakeholder advisory group.

The Scottish Government's preference is to prioritise long-term changes to the current Industrial Injuries Scheme.



We would begin work immediately following this consultation to start reform.



The stakeholder advisory group would be created one month after this consultation ends. This group would begin to publish advice 9 months after the consultation ends.
