Preparing for education

The team have met with SG analysts working on the Education domain. The priority was to understand the issues surrounding current indicators and explore whether new indicators need to be included in SIMD.

We are also testing the various suggestions that were made at the workshops for improving and supplementing the Education indicators. We hope to report back next month the findings from this work.

SIMD Review - Stage 2

The rationale for reviewing SIMD comes from changes such as Welfare Reform through to the new exam system and the creation of Police Scotland.

We are hoping to create an academic grouping of specialists in the fields of poverty, statistics and geography to help guide our work in producing the next SIMD in 2015.
