We had discussed a short A5 booklet containing some key messages from the REFRESH How To Guide – this was requested by the Second Hand Smoke Co-ordinators and was intended to complement the How to Guide by being something that could be handed over to parents interested in making their home smoke-free (while the practitioner keeps hold of the How To Guide)

This has been pushed to the side a bil, while the Take it Right Outside campaign has been developed and while John has been off but I feel its something we should respond to now.

We have produced a draft, and are keen to get this printed and distributed – but can I just check that you would still be able to cover the production costs? John Reid at Allander Press (who produced the How to Guide) have given the attached quote of £1,166 for 5,000 copies and £1,457 for 10,000 copies. If this seems OK then we'll circulate the draft for comments, and of course link in to work around the Take it Right Outside campaign.

You'll remember we didn't have to pay for a reprint of the How to Guide as we found out that Allandor Were keeping over 2,000 copies in storage for us – the staffer here who arranged that has left and didn't make any note of it!



ASH Scotland has warmly welcomed the UK Government's announcement today (21st January) that MPs will vote on regulations for the introduction of plain, standardised tobacco packaging before the General Election in May. MPs have previously supported plain packaging by a significant majority.

ASH Scotland Chief Executive



"We are delighted that sustained campaigning by the public health community has finally secured a firm Coalition Government commitment to moving forward with this important measure, which will help protect our children from the harms caused by tobacco.

"The introduction of standardised packaging will help Scotland achieve our aim of a tobacco-free generation by 2034.

"Glamorous packaging is one of the last bastions of advertising for a vile industry whose profits depend on booking in the next generation.

"In the face of a determined and expensive rearguard action by Big Tobacco and its allies, we are pleased that the Westminster Government has not been scared off by a deceitful industry and its array of front groups and lobbyists.

"In Australia where this measure was introduced in 2012, there are clear signs of early success. The Australian government confirms that illicit product has not increased, while the number of cigarettes bought per person has fallen. Consumption of cigarettes and tobacco in the first quarter of 2014 was the lowest ever, and a national survey for 2013/14 showed that the proportion of daily smokers aged 14 or older in dropped from 16.6% in 2007 to 12.8% in 2013.

"MPs voted overwhelmingly in favour of the measure when the initial legislation was passed. We expect to see similar support when they come to vote on the detailed regulations."

Every day 40 young people in Scotland take up smoking while nearly two-thirds of smokers start before they are 18.

Evidence shows that standardised packaging will help cut the number of young people who smoke by removing glitzy branding and designs from packs to make them less attractive.

Welcome for Scottish plain packs commitment

Health charity ASH Scotland has welcomed the Westminster and Scottish Government commitments to introduce plain, standardised tobacco packaging, and rejected critics' claims that the vital health initiative is unpopular and will not cut smoking.

Following the UK Government's announcement yesterday (21 Jan) that it will bring forward plain packs legislation at Westminster before the General Election, Scotland's Public Health Minister Maureen Watt has confirmed the Scottish Government's long-standing commitment to introduce the measure in Scotland.

ASH Scotland Chief Executive said:



"We are delighted the UK Government has committed to moving forward with this important measure, which will help protect our children from the harms caused by tobacco by making glitzy packaging less attractive.

"The Scottish Government has led the way in the drive for plain packs and must be congratulated for quickly confirming that the necessary progress will be made in Scotland as soon as possible.

"The introduction of standardised packaging will help Scotland achieve our aim of a lobacco-free generation by 2034. Glamorous packaging is one of the last bastions of advertising for a vile industry whose profits depend on hooking in the next generation.

"Now that Big Tobacco has falled in its campaign to stop standardised packs, we are seeing the continuation of misleading claims by the industry and its supporters. Critics parret dubious tobacco industry-funded research on plain packs in Australia that purports to show the measure has led to a rise in illicit tobacco and has not affected smoking trends.

"But Australian Government figures actually prove illicit product has not increased and the latest ovidence from HMRC in the UK concludes the movo will have no impact on the level of counterfeit product.

"In Australia, the number of cigarettes bought per person has fallon. Consumption of tobacco in the first quarter of 2014 was the lowest eyer, and a national survey for 2013/14 showed that the proportion of daily amokers aged 14 or older in dropped from 16.6% in 2007 to 12.8% in 2013. That said, this measure is not aimed at existing smokers but at a generational change – whore children grow up free from the predatory marketing of tobacco companies.

"It is also wrong to say that plain packaging is uppopular with the public. A new Cancer Research UK survey shows nearly three-quarters (72%) of UK voters across the political spectrum said they supported the move and only 15% were opposed."



What we know about illicit in the UK

- No separate estimates are published for Scotland. So Scotland's share of the illicit tobacco market is unknown
- The illicit market share was an estimated 10% for cigarettes and 39% for hand rolling tobacco in 2013-14 in the UK
- In 2000 the UK illicit tobacco market rose to a very high level, when it was estimated that more
 than one in five cigarettes (21%) were illicit and almost two-thirds (63%) of hand rolled
 tobacco was illicit, the level of illicit trade in the UK has fallen significantly since then due to
 concerted action at Government and EU level. Meanwhile tobacco tax revenues have continued
 to rise



 Whereas in 2000, most large cigarette seizures consisted of genuine UK brands smuggled into the country, by 2012-13 most large seizures were of 'illicit whites' (brands produced mainly or solely for the illicit market)

What we know about illicit in Australia since plain packs

In conducting his review Sir Cyril Chantler visited Australia, concluding that there has been
no indication of a rise in illicit tobacco in Australia and a very small proportion of illicit
products seized have been in plain packaging (suggesting criminals have not seen plain

- packaging as of particular benefit to them)
- Speaking to the Chantler review a representative of British American Tobacco admitted that they had seen a reduction in counterfeiting of their brands since the introduction of plain packaging
- In a memorandum to the Australian Excise Tariff Amendment (Tobacco) Bill 2014, the Australian Government stated that it does not consider that tobacco plain packaging led to an increase in the illicit trade in tobacco products
- In November 2013 KPMG published a report which argued that in the 12 months to June the percentage of illicit had increased from 11.8 % to 13.3% in Australia. The report was paid for by BAT, Imperial Tobacco and PMI. Halogen Communications, a PR firm paid for by PMI issued a press release saying it 'should give Scottish Government pause for thought'. The report was criticised by the Australian Government who argued it 'substantially exaggerate the size of the illicit tobacco market in Australia', Sir Cyril Chantler also dismissed the findings saying he did not have confidence in the assessment
- Research conducted on the early experience of plain packs in the state of Victoria found
 plain packs don't hurt small retailers, flood the market with very cheap cigarettes, or boost
 the trade in illicit tobacco. Use of illicit unbranded tobacco didn't increase in the state: this
 was 2.3% in 2011, and 1.9% in 2013. The researchers say the findings suggest there is no
 evidence for these particular arguments against the policy, put forward by the tobacco
 industry

Tobacco industry involvement in lilicit trade

- There is extensive evidence of previous complicity in illicit trade by tobacco firms.
- The apparent complicity of the tobacco industry in smuggling was one of the areas
 investigated during a House of Commons Health Select Committee's Inquiry in 2000 where
 it became clear both British American Tobacco and Galiahers were complicit in the illicit
 trade in tobacco to one degree or another. Imperial Tobacco also came under scrutiny at
 the House of Commons Select Committee on Public Accounts in 2002 and accused of lying
 over its complicity in smuggling
- More recently an investigative report by the Organised Crime and Corruption Reporting Project accused ITI of being involved in cigarette smuggling in the Middle East and the company is currently under official investigation by OLAF as a result
- In November 2014 it emerged that HMRC had fined BAT £650,000 for oversupplying UK manufactured hand rolling tobacco into Belgium

Will O'Reilly

 One of the most commonly used arguments by the tobacco industry against the introduction of plain packaging is that it would lead to an increase in the illicit trade of tobacco

- Will O'Reilly, a former Scotland Yard Detective Chief Inspector has been employed as a
 consultant to PMI conducting research into illicit tobacco since 2011. Following the Scottish
 government's announcement in Sept 2013 that it would proceed with plain packaging, O'Reilly
 appeared in numerous articles in local Scottish papers scaremongering about the threat of
 illicit tobacco.
- In the articles he claims illicit cigarettes are easily available in the towns and cities he had
 visits and says this will only increase if plain packs are introduced because they will be more
 easily copied. However, the key security features on existing packaging that help identify illicit
 products will also be present on plain packs

Concern over e-cigarette ban in hospital grounds

Health charity ASH Scotland has commented on today's news that most NHS Boards in Scotland will include electronic cigarettes in their smoke-free grounds policy, to be introduced by April.

ASH Scotland Chief Executive said:



"Given the devastating harm to health caused by tobacco use, we are keen to encourage smokers to try effective ways of quitting which for some people might include advice, nicotine replacement therapy or ecigarettes.

"There is a clear case for hospital grounds to be free from tobacco use, which is always dangerous.

"However, we are concerned that a blanket ban on e-cigarette use could discourage smokers from trying an alternative that might help them to move away from tobacco.

"A policy to restrict e-cigarette use to designated areas of hospital grounds is something we would support.

"Hospitals might also choose to draw a distinction between devices which look like eigerettes and some newer vaping devices, which look nothing like a traditional tobacco eigerette and so don't lead to confusion with smoking.

"In addition, e-cigarette use in NHS grounds will doubtless have to be reviewed in future as we expect some types of the devices may be licensed for medicinal use as a nicotine replacement therapy.

"Overall, we mustn't lose sight of the fact that the main aim of smoke-free grounds is to put tobacco out of fashion and support people to move away from the most dangerous products and towards longer, healthier lives."



Children, carers and second-hand smoke Interim report February 2015

Background and scope

The first year of this project, which is match-funded by the Scottish Government and the Robertson Trust, is intended to provide training for paid staff and carers who work with parents and children under five. The aim is to equip staff with the knowledge and skills to raise the issue of second-hand smoke and accompanies a longer term aim of achieving smoke-free homes and cars so reducing children's exposure to second-hand smoke.

The initial aim was to reach 150 staff from 10 different organisations and to engage with at least 20 projects and services across Scotland. The training is designed to be a one day workshop covering:

- second-hand smoke what it is and the impact on child health
- health behaviour change and communication to support a motivational approach
- simple steps that parents can take
- and information on local and national smoke free homes initiatives.

Training to date

Training has been carried out across Scotland. To date:

- 11 events have been held with a further 2 planned
- 2 events have been held in Forth Valley
- 5 in Grampian
- 1 in Tayside
- 1 in Glasgow
- 2 in Lothian
- 4 courses that have been provisionally booked have been cancelled due to low uptake and
- 2 have been deferred/re-arranged.

To date ASH Scotland has engaged with over 200 organisations and there have been 121 participants from 52 organisations including:

- 25 Voluntary organisations
- 10 local authorities
- 8 NHS and
- 9 others (nurseries, membership organisations, independent childminders).

Pre-course surveys

A pre-course survey has been conducted on each occasion to gauge participants' knowledge, experience and confidence with raising the issue of second-hand smoke with parents and carers

prior to training. Averaged results from participants who completed this (n 333) were (where 1 is poor knowledge and 10 is excellent knowledge):

- 6.2 knowledge and understanding of the health risks to children from second-hand smoke
- 6.2 in terms of knowledge of ways parents can effectively protect their children from the
 cifects of second-hand smoke and
- 5.5 in terms of knowledge of health behaviour change.

The questionnaire also looked at experience of discussing the topic and whether participants had ever raised the issue

- 25% of the sample had had raised the issue between 2-5 times
- approximately 35% had raised the issue on 6 or more occasions.
- in terms of confidence in raising the issue, participants scored 5.6 for confidence in discussing the health risks from second hand smoke and 5.6 in discussing ways parents and carers can effectively protect children from second-hand smoke.

Post course evaluation:

- knowledge and understanding of the health risks to children from second-hand smoke post course was measured at an average of 8.9 representing a movement of 2.8 points from the baseline
- knowledge and understanding of ways parents and carers can effectively protect their children from second hand smoke averaged 9 representing a movement 2.8 points in terms of increased knowledge
- knowledge of behaviour change scored 8.6, an increase of 3 points.

Assessment of training quality:

 94% rated the training at 8 or above on a scale of 1-10 where 1 is not useful and 10 is very useful).



Taking action on smoking and health

There have been three meetings over the past 18 months - working title "REFRESH next steps". This has been an affiliation of those with an interest in using the air-quality feedback methods trialled in REFRESH and has involved representatives from the Universities of Aberdeen and Edinburgh, ASH Scotland, BLF Scotland, NHS GGC, NHS Fife, NHS Grampian, NHS Lanarkshire, NHS Highland and Islands. This group will meet again in April and will be launched as the Smoke-Free Homes Research Collaboration (SFHRC): a website is underdevelopment.

An abbreviated version of the REFRESH 'How To' guide was to have been produced by ASH Scotland but funding is currently not available. However training on carers and second-hand smoke (which is match-funded by Scottish Government and the Robertson Trust) has been developed and delivered, and this has both met its targets and been well-received.

The main legacy of REFRESH has been the First Steps 2 Smoke-free project (CSO funded research project involving Universities of Aberdeen and Edinburgh and NHS Lanarkshire) that will use low cost air quality monitors to provide second-hand smoke feedback to 120 vulnerable mums taking part in the First Steps programme in Lanarkshire.

ASH Scotland is also developing work with Dylos monitors to support people affected by ingress of second-hand smoke in their homes and workplaces.
