Brown rat *Rattus norvegicus* and black rat *Rattus rattus* on seabird islands Line to take

 Protecting Scotland's islands from the impacts of invasive non-native species such as rats is highlighted as a priority in the Scottish Biodiversity Strategy.

Explanation

Rats (mainly brown rats) have had a major impact on breeding seabirds on many offshore islands globally. Severe cases can result in local extinctions but there are also examples of these seabirds recolonising islands after rats have been removed. In Scotland the worst affected seabirds are those which nest in burrows, like storm petrels, shearwaters and puffins. Brown rats have been successfully eradicated from a number of Scottish islands, including Handa (Scottish Wildlife Trust), Ailsa Craig (RSPB and others) and Canna (National Trust for Scotland).

RSPB is about to submit an EU LIFE+ bid for a project to restore of a number of UK seabird islands. This project aims to maintain populations of petrels and shearwaters or create suitable conditions for them to recolonize. Eradicating black rats from the Shiant Islands is a major component of this work. This project has support from SNH, conditional on the LIFE bid being successful.

SNH is funding a PhD student to study the impact of brown rats on breeding Manx shearwaters on the island of Rum. Aspects of the rat's ecology, such as their ranging behaviour, diet and habitat use, will also be studied.
