# **SUSTAINABILITY TEST (LITE) - Introduction**

This simple Tool is designed to help you embed relevant and proportionate sustainability requirements in the development of frameworks and contracts.


#### Content

You are asked to determine whether a series of Environmental and Socio-economic Risks and Opportunities are relevant to the subject matter of the contract. This will help inform contract requirements.

The Test may be used in isolation or by reference to the results of Prioritisation of Categories/ Commodities which your organisation may have undertaken. The Prioritisation Methodology is a strategic planning tool that identifies environmental and socio-economic priorities for categories/ commodities that help inform category/comodity/procurement/ market engagement strategy, reflecting a balance of a. spend b. risk and opportunity c. scope to do more to mitigate risks/capture oportnities, and d. influence over the market. You have the opportunity to import results from Prioritisation into this tool. This helps ensure consistency and a complete audit trail.

The Prioritisation Methodology and the Sustainability Test are methods that may be used to demonstrate consideration of 'Improving economic, social, environmental wellbeing and reducing inequality in the area', 'Involving small and medium enterprises and 3rd sector bodies including supported businesses' and 'Promoting Innovation', as required by the Sustainable Procurement Duty within the Procurement Reform (Scotland) Act 2014.






