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

COMMERCIAL SEAWEED HARVESTING IN SCOTLAND: PROGRESS TO REGULATE INDUSTRY

Purpose

To update you on the progress to establish a regulatory framework to support the sustainable development of the commercial seaweed industry.

Priority

Routine – this submission is to update the Cabinet Secretary on progress.

Background

- The Marine (Scotland) Act 2010 introduced a licensing regime to regulate activity in the Scottish marine area. However this does not include direct provision for seaweed harvesting at a commercial scale.
- The UK currently has no large-scale cultivation of seaweed, but Scotland has a few small-scale seaweed growers and wild harvesters. The seaweed harvesting sector has recently indicated aspirations to develop large-scale wild seaweed harvesting around the coasts of Scotland.
- Marine Scotland has received 3 enquiries from organisations who may wish to undertake commercial harvest of wild seaweed in Scotland, with MBL being the most advanced of these. A number of general enquiries relating to smaller scale harvesting have also been received. Linda Rosborough's submission of 3 November provides further advice on a possible approach to MBL.
- Large scale mechanical extraction of wild seaweed, in particular kelp forests, is a new project and the environmental impacts are not known. To better understand these impacts Marine Scotland has initiated a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) of wild seaweed harvesting to investigate the potential environmental and cumulative impacts. The SEA will provide an evidence base to inform regulatory decisions. The Draft SEA screening report is set out in **Annex B**.
- SNH and SEPA are fully in agreement with us that this SEA is a necessary step in progress to establish a regulatory framework.

Current Scottish Policy Framework

- At present to harvest wild seaweed an agreement with the relevant landowner (such as The Crown Estate) is required. If harvesting is proposed within a Site of

Special Scientific Interest where seaweed is (or supports) one of the protected features, a license from SNH is required.

- The Scottish Government has indicated its support for the sustainable growth of the seaweed sector through the National Marine Plan, adopted in March 2015, which identified that there are opportunities to grow Scottish seaweed production, primarily through cultivation in the sea.
- Scottish Ministers consulted on a draft seaweed policy statement in 2013 which included an SEA. The purpose of the SEA was to inform the development of the draft Seaweed Policy Statement, i.e. the cultivation of seaweed through aquaculture and its use in Integrated Multi-Tropic Aquaculture systems. As part of this wild seaweed harvesting was touched on. At that time the data available indicated that most harvesting was happening at a small scale, the report noted that at this small scale there was no evidence of adverse environmental effects. However the report also cautioned that if we saw an increase in activity particularly at a larger scale then we could see adverse environmental effects.
- Several respondents raised concerns about the potential environmental effects of wild seaweed harvesting in response to the consultation.
- Several countries have adopted protocols and/or regulations to address sustainability and environmental concerns held over wild harvesting. Further information on these is set out at **Annex C**.

Key Issues

1. Environmental Considerations

Seaweeds play an important role in supporting marine biodiversity by providing widespread and complex habitats and niches for a large number of marine species. Wild seaweed harvesting activities may have widespread implications for marine ecosystems and may also affect ecosystem services. A diagram at **Annex A** highlights these issues. The following impacts of seaweed harvesting could have serious environmental consequences:

- loss of habitat and/or shelter for a range of plants and animals, alongside loss of direct and indirect food sources. As well as detrital grazers, suspension feeders et al, this has consequences for higher trophic levels, e.g. mammals, birds and piscivorous fish.
- loss of nursery grounds for juvenile invertebrates and fish, with consequences for higher trophic levels and commercial fish stocks.
- loss of the physical modification effects of seaweed, e.g. wave damping, which may result in increases in coastal erosion and/or flooding events.
- loss of carbon sink provided by seaweed species.

The key issue is the sustainability of any seaweed harvest. At this point we are unable to assess what the sustainable level might be and have begun an SEA to address this issue. Without sustainability any jobs would be short-lived.

2. Marine Licensing

As stated above the Marine (Scotland) Act does not contain a clear provision for us to directly license commercial seaweed harvesting. To put this issue beyond any doubt we would suggest using a secondary legislation provision.

3. Stakeholders

Stakeholders will play a key role in the development of the SEA through the set-up of a Project Advisory Group (PAG). Stakeholders from across the sectors including fishing and environmental interests will be invited to participate. In addition the Scottish Seaweed Industry Association chaired by Walter Speirs will also be invited to give an industry perspective.

4. Timetable

- The SEA process has been started and a screening report prepared.
- We are undertaking a procurement exercise for someone with specialist knowledge on seaweed to advise on the SEA.
- We expect the SEA to be complete by the end of March 2016.

Recommendation

The Cabinet Secretary is asked to note the above steps that are being taken. We will provide a further update to the Cabinet Secretary when the SEA is complete and provide options for next steps.



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

