Dear Mr Swinney,

My name is [Redact 38(1)(b)] and I am a 16 year-old female currently attending [Redact 38(1)(b)] in [Redact 38(1)(b)]. Today, August 4th, has been a day for some to recognize and celebrate their efforts and outstanding achievements but for many others across the country, a day which has been filled with less celebration, more puzzlement and the feeling that their hard work this year has been ignored. When my phone pinged at 8 o'clock this morning I never touched it for a total of exactly 43 minutes, instead I sat there staring at the notification from the SQA feeling like I was in a dream. I still cannot seem to get my head around the fact exams this year were cancelled but what I struggle to come to terms with more is that teachers' estimates, my schools past exam performance and even the area in which I live in are what determined my exam results this year.

Last year for my national 5's I proudly walked away with 4 A's, a B and 3 C's and decided to continue studying the four subjects I achieved A's in to higher level. I can truthfully say that this year I worked extremely hard to ensure I done my absolute best in preparing for my highers as this was probably one of, if not the most important year of my life at school. On

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top of attending school I also dance 23+ hours every week and this doesn't even include performing and competing across the country and overseas. On top of all this finding time to study was a struggle, but I still managed it and gave every test, prelim and class task my absolute best shot. Last year my prelim results really were not what I had hoped for but I pulled it out the bag for the exams and managed to turn no awards to C's and even D's to A's. None of this was down to what my teachers thought I would achieve, those in the years past at school or the home I live in. This was down to my own personal efforts, determination and countless hours of studying alongside little to none sleep.

I cannot do anything more than praise and thank my teachers from the bottom of my heart for guiding me and being fantastic throughout the year. These teachers have known me since I walked into that school at eleven years old and have monitored my work and progress all year long so in my opinion are the most qualified to predict results - not strangers in an office who know my name and post code. The SQA should have used sources such as prelims, tests done throughout the year and previous exam results, alongside teacher input, to determine my grades. Everyone is different, so assuming that someone won't do well and excel in their studies because they are from a deprived area or don't attend a certain school - Jordanhill, Dunblane High or St Ninian's to name a few - simply just is not right. At the end of the day we are all human. The price of the home I live in, the car my parents drive, the job my mum or dad has, none of that affects my studies or who I am or my capabilities. Using class as a basis for results is completely unacceptable especially when it is at a level of seriousness where it is impacting the rest of a child's life.

I appreciate this has been a difficult, very stressful time and COVID 19 has forced the SQA to take an alternative approach to the exam process this year. Despite this on going crisis, I don't think this should be permission for the SQA to involve - in my opinion - irrelevant factors in determining my grades. Many students, including myself, have woke up this morning to sheer disappointment and grades far lower than their potential. We never received the results we both need and deserve to take our education onto the next level at colleges and university we have no choice but to enter lower levels of education, then employment which goes collectively with low pay. This is then encouraging the cycle of poverty and isn't helping those from deprived areas in anyway. If anything, it is keeping them trapped unable to blossom and show everyone, especially the SQA themselves in this circumstance, that they are able and more than capable of achieving great things.

Mr Swinney I am aware that previously you have emphasized your aims to reform education in under-privileged areas. I think a great step in finding a solution to this would definitely be revising the approach the SQA take in assessing exam results and also if a situation like this were to arise again - here's hoping not. This would be a huge step forward and great progress in this target of yours.

Writing this email to you today has taken me a lot of courage. I am doing this not only for myself but on behalf of the thousands of others across the country who share the same opinion as I. We are the future and we are standing up for what we believe is right.

Please explain to me how a straight A student through Standard and Higher grades can have a school prediction of A for AH physics and the SQA reverse the schools recommendation to award a D !!!!. By lunchtime she is feeling more circumspect and hopeful that the appeals process will come through for her.

As a parent, I am very disappointed that the previous performance of the school in some subjects seems to have meant that my incredibly hard working, diligent and conscientious girl has missed out on important grades which she hoped would get her in to her intended course at university.

I urge you to make sure that the appeals process takes into account the work that pupils have done over the year, including their prelim result and assignments.

Dear Mr Swinney,

(I have copied in the Scottish minister email address as the website shows this as the contact details for the Minister for Mental Health - Clare Haughey)

We appreciate that these are hard times for everyone and that your decision to close the schools must have been an incredibly difficult one for you but a necessary one due to the extent of the Covid-19 outbreak.

At the outset of the school closures you said no child sitting exams would be disadvantaged by this situation.

I do understand that yourself, teaching staff and the SQA will all do the best you can under very trying conditions but I feel I must raise my concerns.

We have a 16 year old daughter - [Redact 38(1)(b)] - who is in her 5th year at [Redact 38(1)(b)] School in Edinburgh. Unfortunately due to anxiety and mental well being issues she barely left her room and missed a huge part of 3rd and 4th year meaning she was unable to sit any N5's in 4th year. With the help of her psychiatrist at [Redact 38(1)(b)] (been attending for two years), medication and the ongoing support of her guidance and teaching staff at the High School and a lot of hard work and determination on her part [Redact 38(1)(b)] has made great progress this year, was attaining over 90% attendance and after her prelim results all her teachers were predicting passes in the oncoming exams.

Having missed so much school [Redact 38(1)(b)] has been on a upward trajectory this term and was carrying good momentum into the exam period.

However now that term can't be completed one teacher who was predicting a C (possibly even a B with a concentrated effort) is now talking about presenting her for a D because of the early closure - she has a private tutor for this subject and she says that not being presented for at least a C is extremely harsh.

My concerns are twofold:

As all other teachers are sticking with their assessment that [Redact 38(1)(b)] would pass her oncoming exams she is left with a feeling of disappointment and lack of fairness on the revised approach of this one teacher - after the progress she has made this year [Redact 38(1)(b)] was actually looking forward to sitting these exams as she missed this experience last year - how does know that she will be fairly assessed on this subject?

My second concern is outwith your control but I feel should still be mentioned, lots of parents like ourselves who have young people with mental health issues will be worried that these

Will be breaking the daily routine and losing the confidence achieving this gives them, will agencies such as [Redact 38(1)(b)] be given additional support during and after this medical emergency to support these children and the additional children caused anxiety by these closures?

We would appreciate you views on the above and we look forward to hearing from you.

I am a Scottish student just having finished my sixth year of school that finished early due to the Covid-19 Pandemic. Following achieving my Higher Results in fifth year, gaining as much work experience as I could fit in and studying hard to raise my attainment - I was awarded 3 conditional offers into Veterinary Medicine at Surgery at [Redact 38(1)(b)] , for starting September 2020. Note: These are English universities as the entry requirements are harder for Scotland than England, I guess this is because Scottish universities require more foreign students than English ones to keep their finances afloat. However this is a discussion for another time.

Today, 4th August 2020, I have received my SQA Results after not having sat any of my Advanced Higher exams this year. For the last three years I have studied all three sciences; biology, chemistry and physics and have always achieved A and B's. This morning I was devastated to find that I had been awarded with grades lower than this. An A, B and C; despite my ongoing commitment throughout the whole of sixth year. Therefore I have not achieved my condition of AA to get into the profession that I have worked so hard towards throughout my entire school career.

Is it guaranteed that the English system will downgrade their students too? If they don't then the competition for university spaces for people like myself is truly unfair.

During this pandemic it has been stated many, many times that no student will be disadvantaged because of the current climate. Well, I can safely say that I have been disadvantaged. I've spent the last 4 months working and worrying about these results; being told constantly by everyone around me - that be friends, family, the public and yourselves - that everything will be fine. This is not fine.

I hope that something is done to resolve this issue. There is now a generation of young people who cannot go forward into their prospective careers due to the decisions that have been made.

Following the SQA awards issued today and John Swinney's March statement that those unable to sit exams would not be disadvantaged in any way,

"I want the 2020 cohort to hold their heads high and get the qualifications they deserve."

this has not been our now s6 daughter, [Redact 38(1)(b)] experience. She currently attends [Redact 38(1)(b)] School, [Redact 38(1)(b)]. We do not believe that her awards have been fully based on,

"...coursework, teacher assessments of estimated grades and prior attainment as the basis of certification."

as the Deputy First Minister and Cabinet Secretary for Education and Skills suggested.

Her modest, reported predictions, following her Higher Prelims, at February's Parents' Evening were:

Chemistry	B	awarded C
English	A	awarded A
French	A	awarded A
Biology	A	awarded B
Maths	C	awarded C

She's disappointed that the SQA results reflect that her school's departments have downgraded what they were predicting for her (the results are identical to the school's submitted ones). Thus, leaving no appeal process and giving her results that are less than the achievable ones needed for her chosen University course? When she received these this morning, we all thought that the SQA had let her down but it appears that her own school has! We're communicating with them now but fear she has no voice. The school said that they will provide evidence and we wish to receive a copy of this.

The awards in Biology & Chemistry do not reflect her predictions, her straight A Nat 5s, her continuous work effort and conscientiousness or consider the fact that, along with her peers, she did not have the opportunity to sit the exams and get justified results. Looking at both her Chemistry and Maths Nat 5 prelims, they went up 1-2 grades, as she knuckled down and worked hard on the past papers. She had just acquired an external maths tutor, who was fairly confident that with work and focus she would achieve a B if not an A. More concerning is that her personal circumstances were not taken into account. I informed the school, at the start of lockdown, that she had been working long hours (20+/wk) with a new job acquired at Christmas and had not focused enough on Prelim study, believing like many of her peers that the 'REAL' importance was the May exams. After the Prelim results she had written to her work to say that due to her Highers she needed only Saturday hours or would have to quit.

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The school marking, the process, the outcome and not having any opportunity to sit an exam are something that we believe has to be re-looked at. If the school's evidence appears weak, we would like some other form of independent appeal. These young people have been badly let down despite promises to the contrary.

Barring any appeal, she would like the chance to sit these exams at no disadvantage, alongside her 6th year choices, and not as resits. We would like ScotGov assurance that Universities will not look at them as resits if a student wishes to sit them for the first time with the next opportunity to do so. It appears the results issued today are being treated like previous results gained after sitting an exam, in the eyes of further education etc. and not as a certification model created due to a pandemic? We believe that come Autumn students in England can sit exams if they think they can improve on them and we see no reason that Scottish students should be disadvantaged by not having the same opportunity?

We look forward to your thoughts and considerations for how to REALLY make sure 2020 students get the results that they deserve fairly.

I am writing to you about the results that my son received today for his Higher exams. He is devastated! He achieved A and B results in his National 5 exams in 2019 and these have fallen this year to C, D and two F awards!

How can this be?

I appreciate that he did not perform well in his prelims due to family circumstances and the fact that the exams were moved to before Christmas for the first time however, these results do not reflect what my child was capable of achieving had he been allowed to sit an exam. Some of the course work had not even been taught and you have asked teachers to base their decisions on the prelim results.

What has been put in place for these children who we know do not “pull their socks up” until the exams? He is definitely suffering as a result of the Scottish Government’s decision to cancel the exams in 2020.

Can you please advise us?

had a new Maths teacher [Redact 38(1)(b)] from the beginning of February and found him to be much better, was going to supported study and getting 2 extra periods per week as well as continuing with the private maths tutor.

[Redact 38(1)(b)] followed the School's Mentoring Program (available to all pupils doing 5 Highers) with [Redact 38(1)(b)] and as at week beginning 24th February and 2nd March (copies attached) [Redact 38(1)(b)] was targeted at Grade C and working at Grade C for maths. Comments from the maths teacher [Redact 38(1)(b)] stated, homework completed, supported study attended, excellent effort in class and no subject concerns.

We are therefore frustrated and angry that the schools has submitted a recommended fail award when this is attributable to their negligence for the reasons stated above. We have contacted the school and raised our concerns. We will not accept that there is nothing more you can do in this matter.
