- The red deer rut across the UK begins in September and lasts until around early November.
- The dates for the male deer close season in Scotland are aligned with that period.
- The dates for the male close season in the rest of the UK do not cover the rut.
- The difference in male close seasons is largely a result of historical differences in legislation.
- The dates for the male close season in the rest of the UK are broadly aligned with the time in which male deer grow their antlers.
- Male red deer typically begin to grow their antlers in the spring, they then drop off following the rut in winter.
- In Scotland, male deer can be culled throughout the period in which their antlers are growing.
