SUMMARY

This will be your first formal meeting with Simon Stiell (you met him briefly at the UN Climate Ambition Summit in September), who took over as UNFCCC Executive Secretary in August 2022. The Former First Minister met him at COP27 and had a good

relationship with his predecessor, *Patricia Espinosa*. Simon Stiell recorded a video message the Scottish Government's loss and damage conference in October 2022.

Agenda

1. UNFCCC Negotiations

- Parties must use the Global Stocktake to make meaningful progress on reducing emissions, while also increasing climate finance, including to address loss and damage. It cannot be either/or. We need action on both.

You are delivering opening remarks at a St Andrew's Day reception that the Scottish Government is hosting at the Radisson Blu Hotel Dubai Waterfront. It takes place in the evening of the opening day of COP28. The event is designed to showcase sustainable Scottish food and drink companies. The food stations will open after your remarks.

There will be an audience of around 150-200 guests – including Global Scots, senior renewables/net zero business representatives, diplomatic contacts, Scottish university alumni, food and drink sector and media representatives and potentially Emiratis from specific UAE Government Ministries.

Your speech will take place on the main stage of the Firelake Terrace within the hotel and you will be introduced by [redacted - s.38(1)(b)].

There will be a lectern and fixed microphone. You will be speaking in front of a large screen, on which a short (60 sec) net zero Brand Scotland film will be played prior to [redacted - s.38(1)(b)] introductory remarks and before your speech.

Your remarks will conclude with a presentation to our UAE Trade & Investment Envoy, Nick Maclean, recognising his service to Scotland and commitment to that role. Officials are keen for this to take place, as a way of assuring Nick that his efforts are valued.

Opening

Thank you, James.

It is an absolute pleasure to be here, and to welcome you all to this very special event. I'm delighted that so many of you have been able to attend.

Known for his kindness and compassion, the Declaration of Arbroath described Saint Andrew as "the most gentle Saint", and made him the patron Saint of Scotland in 1320.

Today, people in Scotland, and around the world, celebrate the 30th of November as St Andrew's Day.

It's a time when our diaspora communities around the world come together to celebrate their connections and shared love for Scotland.

And it's a time to deepen cross-cultural friendship and cooperation.

But, before going any further, I'd like to thank everyone at the Raddison Blu for hosting us, and – in particular – the hotel's manager, David Allan, for taking such good care of us this evening. David is a very valued member of our GlobalScots network.

I also want to say a word of thanks to our wonderful musicians for this evening, the Scottish Association Dubai Pipe Band.

And, of course, I want to thank each and every one of you for coming. Particularly, our friends from the UAE. I hope you'll all use this opportunity to get to know one another better.

Scotland's presence in Dubai

For Scotland, the fact that the start of COP28 coincides with our national day is quite fortunate.

Because it gives us the chance to repay the very warm welcome that the Scottish delegation has received, since we arrived in Dubai yesterday.

And I can't think of better way to do that, than by sharing with you some of Scotland's most famous produce – our magnificent food and drink.

I can't wait for you to try what's on offer this evening.

But first, I want to talk about COP28, and Scotland's presence here in Dubai.

We're here to add our voice to the call for urgent action – to address the twin crises of climate change and nature loss.

By restoring nature and ending our contribution to climate change by 2045, Scotland is a small country that aims to play a big role in improving the lives of everyone on this planet.

Today, there can be no greater moral imperative than ensuring future generations can thrive.

Today, there can be no better investment opportunity for any nation, than in embracing the transition to fairer, cleaner, greener societies.

And there can be no better business case than the one for regenerative economic systems, which serve every human being and the planet.

Our delegation includes representatives from a range of Scottish businesses – from sectors as diverse as low carbon and renewable energy, agritech, space data, and bio-engineering.

In each case, these companies are playing their part in Scotland's journey to net zero.

In doing so, they are also achieving huge business success.

And one really good example of that is the company Nova Innovation – who specialise in marine energy technology.

Earlier today, Nova announced that they have secured a £30 million grant from the European Commission to install tidal turbines in the waters around Scotland's Orkney islands.

It will be the largest tidal energy farm, anywhere in the world, further underpinning Scotland's status as a world leader in renewable energy.

Strengthening ties - Food and Drink

So, our delegation includes businesses with reputations that are growing internationally.

And I'm delighted that being here in Dubai gives us the chance to find new opportunities for trade, collaboration and investment, with the UAE.

That's something we've managed to do, very successfully, over the past few years, not least through our presence at Expo 2020 Dubai.

In October, Scotland also signed a memorandum of understanding with the UAE, committing us to strengthening our ties of trade and innovation.

And one area where we think there is particular scope to do that, is in relation to food and drink.

That sector is already Scotland's largest source of exports to the UAE.

By reducing its emissions and becoming more sustainable, the industry is also playing an increasingly important role in our transition to net zero.

And so, tonight, we've decided to showcase eighteen of our most ambitious and sustainable food and drink businesses.

The companies have been selected by the Dubai and Abhu Dhabi teams of our international trade body, Scottish Development International.

And their products exemplify the quality and diversity for which the industry in Scotland is so renowned.

Our wonderful chef for this evening, Adam Tracey, has prepared some incredible dishes for you.

So, I hope all of you take the opportunity to sample the food and drink on offer.

Among other things, it includes:

- Some exceptional meat, fish and seafood,
- Superb Scottish drinks,
- Some delicious soft fruits and ice cream,
- Traditional oatcakes and shortbread,
- And a range of other items made with our fantastic Scottish ingredients.

I'm also delighted that this evening marks something of a first – with the launch of Scotch Lamb, in this market.

It's a further sign that the list of premium Scottish products – enjoyed around the world – keeps on growing.

And I hope that our visit will open up new opportunities for these products to be enjoyed here in Dubai, and across the UAE.

I should say, that if you are keen to find out more about any of the products or businesses, there are members here from our Scottish Development International teams, who will be happy to speak to you.

We're also joined this evening by representatives from two of our main trade associations – Adam Wing, from Seafood Scotland, and Tom Gibson, from Quality Meat Scotland.

I know they too will be happy to answer any questions you might have.

For now, I simply want to thank you all – once again – for joining us, as we celebrate Scotland's national day.

Thanks again to our hosts for the wonderful welcome you've given us – and for the work you're doing to make COP28 a success.

Whether you are a Scot living here; one of our official GlobalScots; or simply someone who trades with, invests in, or who simply has a love for Scotland – we are hugely grateful.

Summary & past engagements

Cabinet Secretary Gray visited the IGS demonstrator during his visit to UAE in October. Scottish Enterprise were at an early stage investor in IGS, stepping in when a private sector investor pulled out. IGS are particularly grateful for that intervention.

Desired outcomes

Background briefing

Vertical farming is the practice of growing crops in vertically stacked layers. It often incorporates controlled-environment agriculture, which aims to optimize plant growth, and soilless farming techniques such as hydroponics, aquaponics, and

aeroponics. Some common choices of structures to house vertical farming systems include buildings, shipping containers, tunnels, and abandoned mine shafts.

Founded in 2013, IGS brought together decades of farming and engineering experience to create an agri-tech business with a vision to revolutionise the indoor growing market. IGS's commitment to innovation has continued apace to develop patented plug-and-play vertical farming technology systems which deliver consistently high-quality food produce onsite at a customer's location.

In May 2021, IGS signed a partnership deal with AgTech R&D experts and growers, Madar Farms, bringing its vertical farming technology to the UAE for the first time.

Background in the UAE

SSK (Saeed Salem Khalfan Enterprise) are the distributor for IGS here in the Middle East, they have a JV with Christof Global Impact (CGI), who are an international group with multiple interests in climate change and food security sectors. SSK have negotiated a substantial loan, underwritten by UK Export Finance (UKEF). IGS will be the main supplier for a subsidiary of SSK.

The Deal (embargoed until 3 December) [redacted - s.33 (1)(b)]

- IGS are currently speaking to other investors and customers in the region, which SDI are supporting.

The deal is scheduled to be announced on 3 December. As it is supported by a UK Export Finance loan guarantee, the announcement will be made in the presence of a UKG VIP. We can arrange a congratulatory message on social media.

COP28

The 2-tower farm they are building at Al Quoz for COP28 will be handed over in late October, with 1 tower being used for PR/media/politicians/public tours, and the other will grow crops to be used by the contract caterers for COP28.

Mangrove Initiative

In November 2022 the UAE announced the Mangrove Alliance for Climate which aims to plant 100 million mangrove trees to support and grow mangrove forests with a view to developing nature based solutions to Climate Change. [redacted - s.33(1)(b)]

Dr Sultan Ahmed Al Jaber, Minister of Industry and Advanced Technology of the United Arab Emirates, UAE Special Envoy on Climate and President Designate of COP28. Dr Sultan Ahmed Al Jaber, has been instrumental in leading the UAE's green agenda, while championing the importance of the energy transition to accelerate economic growth and fulfil environmental goals. Dr. Al Jaber is also the

first CEO to serve as a President for the climate summit, following his contributions towards fostering an ecologically sustainable society in the UAE through projects he's guided in the public and private sectors.



Mike Bloomberg, UN Special Envoy on Climate Ambition and Solutions, President of the C40 Board. Michael Bloomberg cofounded financial information and media company Bloomberg LP in 1981. A major philanthropist, he has committed to donating his stake in Bloomberg LP to Bloomberg Philanthropies when he dies, if not sooner. Bloomberg served as mayor of New York City for 12 years,

from 2002 to 2013, and launched an unsuccessful bid for president in the 2020 race. Bloomberg is one of America's most effective voices on urgent national and international issues, including climate change, gun violence, public health, and immigration reform. He serves as the UN Secretary-General's Special Envoy for Climate Ambition and Solutions, and as the WHO Ambassador for Noncommunicable Diseases and Injuries.



H.E. Abdulla Mohammed Al Basti, Secretary General of the Executive Council of Dubai. His Excellency Al Basti oversees the creation and implementation of The Executive Council's vision, direction, and strategic decisions for the emirate across various sectors. Al Basti manages the Council based on four main pillars: integrated government services; government excellence; strategies, policies and corporate governance; and

integrated government communications.



Premier Nomusa Dube-Ncube, KwaZulu Natal, Under2 Coalition Co-chair for Africa. Hon. Nomusa Dube-Ncube is a South African politician and former diplomat who has been the 9th Premier of KwaZulu-Natal since August 2022. A member of the African National Congress, she is the first woman to hold the office. Prior to serving in the legislature, she was South Africa's ambassador to the Czech Republic. You met with Premier Dube-Ncube during New York Climate Week this September, both at the capacity as Co-chairs of the Under2 Coalition meeting, as

well as at the Bloomberg Philanthropies Roundtable COP28 event.



Mayor Abigail Binay, Makati, Philippines. Abby Binay previously served in Congress as representative of the second district of Makati from 2007 to 2016. Binay's vision includes transforming Makati into a smart city: she initiated a digital economy through cashless payments and connected Makati citizens via free Wi-Fi. In 2020, Binay gained worldwide recognition for her efforts as the country's sole finalist in the

World Smart Cities Awards. Her upcoming plans include making Makati a green city powered by renewable energy and retrofitted with efficient and sustainable transportation systems.



Mayor Anne Hidalgo, Paris, France, member of the C40 Steering Committee. Anne Hidalgo has served as Mayor of Paris since 2014, the first woman to hold the office. Paris wants to reshape the way its two million residents interact with the city around them, with a focus on reducing car use and encouraging travel on foot and public transport by 2026, mayor Hidalgo has pledged to plant more than 170,000 trees across the capital, with

50 percent of the city covered by planted areas by 2030. Hidalgo, Paris became one of the first C40 cities to boast a bike-sharing scheme.



Governor Yuriko Koike, Tokyo, Japan, member of the C40 Steering Committee. Yuriko Koike currently serves as the Governor of Tokyo, since 2016. Koike is the first woman to be elected as Tokyo's government. "Resource circulation is the pillar of Tokyo's climate change measures. Promotion of a circular economy is an urgent task," said Koike. She said that of the Zero Emission Tokyo Strategy in December 2019.



Claudia Lopez, Mayor of Bogota, Colombia, member of the C40 Steering Committee. On October 27, 2019, López won the elections for Mayor of Bogota and became the first woman to win this position in the Colombian capital. As of January 1, 2020, Mayor López implemented The Development Plan which bears the name of New Social and Environmental Contract for the Bogotá of the XXI Century, among its composed 5 pillars

Mayor Eduardo da Costa Paes, Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Eduardo da Costa Paes is a Brasilian politician who has been the mayor of the city of Rio de Janeiro from 2009-2012, served a second term from 2013 to 2016 and was re-elected again in 2021. During his second term as mayor of Rio, Eduardo Paes was elected president of the C40 Cities Climate Leadership Group, a position he held until December 2016. He has been also elected as the President

of the Social Democratic Party in the state of Rio de Janeiro.



Laurence Tubiana, CEO of the European Climate Foundation (ECF). Laurence Tubiana is CEO of the European Climate Foundation (ECF) and a Professor at Sciences Po, Paris. Before joining the ECF, Laurence was France's Climate Change Ambassador and Special Representative for COP21, and as such a key architect of the landmark Paris Agreement. Summary

Your roundtable will be guided by key guiding questions, set by the Climate Group. Please see points to make under each guiding question (please note interventions should be only one minute long – your answers below are approx. one minute each).

What would you like to see in the Global Stocktake decision that would help you in delivering on your climate action together with national government?

- The Global Stocktake reveals the deep gulf between where we are and where we need to be.
- We need to see clear actionable milestones to put us on track to achieving 1.5
 degrees. This must include levers and opportunities for subnational governments,
 civil society, philanthropies and the private sector to contribute to global ambition
 and delivery.
- The deep gulf revealed by the GST can be filled at least in part by properly empowering states, regions and devolved governments, as we know, up to 80% of adaptation and mitigation actions are or will take place at the state, regional, and city level. Key to this is enabling such governments to access finance.
- In terms of how Parties can learn from the GST, regions and devolved governments have real value to add here. Scotland - for example - has enshrined in law annual emissions targets against which we provide an annual report including sector-level indicators. This level of transparency enables us to be appropriately held to account and challenged to push ourselves further.

When given opportunities to engage with negotiations, which track of negotiations would you be following and why

- The Scottish Government is keenly following discussions on the UNFCCC Loss and Damage fund, as well as climate finance.
- We are keen to see all developments underpinned by the principles of transparency, equity and fairness that meet both the scale and urgency of global need.
- Voices and communities in the Global South must be heard and are an integral part of agreeing global solutions.

Summary

 This is a moderated session with set questions and is focused on how subnational governments can be empowered to unlock their potential, and how they can better work with their national counterparts.

Annotated agenda

Q1- How has your government utilised its legislative authority to set an advance net zero climate goals? What was the impact of that work?

- Scotland is proud to have responded to the urgency of the situation and set legally binding annual targets that go further than the requirements of the Paris Agreement.
- To miss our 2021 emissions reduction target by just 1.2% points (49.9% against a target of 51.1%) is disappointing but it demonstrates that we are not far behind where those ambitious targets dictate that we need to be, and we continue to be ahead of the UK as a whole in delivering long-term emissions reductions.
- By setting legal annual targets, we have made ourselves available for scrutiny and ensured we are appropriately held to account and challenged to do all we can.
- By taking such action, we have set an example to others of what real credibility looks like.

Q2- Please tell us about an example of when your action at the local level supported delivery of national goals?

 The UK Government's climate targets are necessarily reliant on action that takes place in Scotland, and Scotland has served the UK Government by setting more challenging targets than our national government counterparts and reduced emissions more rapidly.

- For example, last year it was shown that Scotland is planting more than 75% of all new woodland in the UK. We have also invested heavily in peatland restoration. Such action is funded solely by Scotland but benefits the UK Government's climate targets.
- Scotland's renewables sector has grown hugely and is serving both the UK and Scotland's targets: the emissions intensity of Scotland's electricity grid is lower than in other parts of the UK and as a significant amount of electricity generated in Scotland is exported to other parts of the UK helping to reduce overall UK emissions.
- Scotland is ready and willing to go further to achieve both our own climate targets and those of the UK Government, but has a number of asks (in particular around the energy market and the gas grid) that would enable us to accelerate action, but are sitting with the UKG that have not been addressed.

Q3 How can the international community better support and collaborate with subnational governments to maximize the impact of their legislative, regulatory, and procurement powers in achieving collective climate goals? Provide an example of your past experience or tell us about an example where such support would be needed in the future.

- The international community can support Scotland and other states, regions and devolved governments by maintaining the momentum around a greater role for states and regions. We are seeing this via the Local Climate Action Summit and the CHAMP initiative. States, regions and devolved governments will do all we can to carry this momentum beyond COP but we need to see the international community championing this agenda.
- o In terms of how we can be supported, as I mentioned, we have a number of asks sitting with the UK Government. In particular, around reform of the electricity market aimed at reducing the cost of electricity for both suppliers and consumers. We need national momentum around the role of states and regions to be carried such that national governments are responsive to the asks and insight offered by their state, regional and devolved governments.

Biography Satya S. Tripathi, Secretary-General, Global Alliance for a Sustainable Planet



Satya is currently the Secretary-General of the Global Alliance for a Sustainable Planet. With experience as a development economist, lawyer and changemaker with over 40 years of varied experience, Mr. Tripathi also serves as Chancellor of the Kalinga Institute of Social Sciences in

Kalinga, the Philippines, the world's largest academic institution dedicated exclusively to indigenous people and cultures. Satya is also a Senior Distinguished Fellow on Innovative Finance at the World Agroforestry Centre.

Satya has served with the **UN** for more than two decades in key positions across the planet and was most recently **the UN Assistant Secretary-General**, **Head of New York Office at UN Environment and Secretary of the UN Environment Management Group**. His other strategic engagements with the UN include: Head of Human Rights Investigations for the UN in post-war Bosnia (UNMIBH); Chair of the Committees on Laws, Treaties and Administrative matters for the UN-mediated Cyprus unification talks in 2004; UN Recovery Coordinator for Aceh and Nias where he facilitated international cooperation and funding of over US\$ 7 billion for post-tsunami recovery efforts in support of the government and affected populations; and Executive Head of UNORCID, a UN System Office established by the UN Secretary General in 2011 to facilitate the implementation of a US\$ 1 Billion REDD+ partnership between Indonesia, Norway and other stakeholders.

Mr. Tripathi was instrumental in establishing the Tropical Landscapes Finance Facility (TLFF) in Indonesia in 2016 and the Sustainable India Finance Facility (SIFF) in 2017 to leverage 'private finance for public good' at mega-scale to achieve transformative social and environmental impact for millions of people in developing countries. He previously served on the World Economic Forum's Global Agenda Council on Forests.

- Edinburgh has positioned itself as the Space Data Capital of Europe.
- The country is in the process of finalising the development of both vertical and horizontal launch sites will be ready for launch in 2024
- We have more space focused jobs per capita than any other part of the UK
- Continuing to attract key international Space focused companies and organisations like Mangata and of course Xprize who are choosing Scotland as a great place to be based.

- We are continuously growing our end to end capability from Satellite creation, development to launch to application and all of the research and expertise that goes with it.
- We have been very clear through our Space strategy, that was launched here in the UAE During Expo, that sustainability should be at its core
- We are now world leading when it comes to space sustainability following the publication of the world's first Sustainable Space Roadmap.

Question: how does Scotland's space sector fit with the international space eco system and what are the opportunities for international collaboration?

Points to raise:

- International collaboration opportunities are huge. We launched our space strategy at the World Expo here in Dubai because we know that this sector needs international partnerships and collaboration.
- We are continuing to build links with partners here in the UAE and globally.
- We are continuing to explore areas of collaboration between the Scottish and international partners and as we are demonstrating we have the expertise that can enhance global efforts in space exploration and climate monitoring.
- International collaboration on satellite technology, data sharing for climate research aligns with COP28's goals for sustainable development and environmental monitoring.
- Space education and workforce development could create a robust foundation for collaboration between the Scottish and other space sectors, fostering innovation and contributing to global efforts in addressing climate change.

Anousheh Ansari - CEO of the XPRIZE Foundation, the world's leader in designing and operating incentive competitions to solve humanity's grand challenges. Ansari, along with her family, sponsored the organisation's first competition – the Ansari Prize; a \$10 million competition that ignited a new era for commercial spaceflight. Prior to being appointed CEO of XPRIZE, Ansari was the CEO of Prodea Systems, a leading Internet of Things (IoT) technology firm she founded in 2006. She made headlines around

the world when, in 2006, she embarked upon an 11-day space expedition, becoming the first female private space explorer, first astronaut of Iranian descent, first Muslim woman in space, and fourth private explorer to visit space. Ansari serves on the World Economic Forum's Global Future Council, is a UNESCO Goodwill Ambassador and is a member of the STEM Leadership Hall of Fame.



Daniel Smith - Founder of global space communications firm AstroAgency and a Founding Director of not-for-profit Space Scotland, an industry-led group that brings together the nation's space companies with government and academia. A serial space entrepreneur who has played a founding role in five space companies since 2017, including spaceport development company Fire Arrow and orbital launch company Skyrora, he supports AstroAgency's global space clients - over 50 private companies and several international

government agencies - with strategic guidance, industry connections and business development.



Anna Hazlett - Founder and Principal of AzurX, a UAE-based private space and satellite advisory and investment firm committed to advancing the state of humanity and human knowledge. Anna is recognised as a global champion of the 'New Space' industry advancing space-centric initiatives, working closely with both private sector and government.



Phil McLachlan - **CEO and co-founder of D-CAT.** He has over thirty years' leadership experience across aerospace, defence, and high technology industries. Summary

- The core purpose of the event will be to demonstrate Scotland's ongoing commitment to climate justice and to announce £1m in new funding to Malawi, working with Give Directly to support displaced communities. This support comes in addition to existing Scottish Government support to Malawi including the £8m Climate Just Communities programme; and the £800k Storm Freddy programme delivered by the Scottish Catholic International Aid Fund.
- The event will be used to build global ambition around finance and action to address loss and damage, from both state and non-state actors. The event will do so by exemplifying Scotland and Malawi's existing successful and longstanding partnership around loss and damage, demonstrating our commitment and making the case based on moral responsibility.

o Suggested FM answer:

- o Scotland is proud of it's strong and longstanding partnership with Malawi on addressing loss and damage.
- o We are proud of our world first Climate Justice Fund (total of £36m over the course of this parliament) which will continue to focus on communities most affected by climate change. It is crucial that ensuring the views and needs of those typically marginalised in such communities are at the centre of future climate justice interventions in Malawi, Rwanda, and Zambia.
- o I firmly believe that Scotland leading the way in demonstrating the scale of action that is possible at the subnational level, can, and is already, providing impetus for other historical emitters to do the same.
- Q2- How does subnational action fit within the loss and damage action and finance landscape, and how best can this be supported?

o Suggested FM answer:

- o Subnational governments have a crucial and essential role to play in addressing loss and damage and the global journey to net zero. For over half of the emissions cuts needed at a global level, the responsibility lies with local government such as states, regions, and devolved nations like Scotland.
- o We are closer to communities than governments of large countries can be. That helps us to be effective as we legislate, build new infrastructure, fund investment, and protect our environment.
- o As well as recognising the contribution that devolved, regional and subnational governments can make in responding to the global climate emergency, we must also create an environment that enables states and regions to harness that potential and translate it into action.
- o Scotland has secured a second term as European co-chair of the Under2 Coalition (2022-2024), a network of states, regions and devolved governments

committed to ambitious climate action. Networks like the Under2 Coalition are an excellent example of how best subnational action can be supported.

- Q3- How can we continue to ensure that global action to address loss and damage is centred around the rights of and justice for those most impacted by climate change?
- o Suggested FM answer:
- A climate justice approach recognises those least responsible for the global climate emergency are being affected first and most severely by it.
- An effective response must tackle existing inequalities such as wealth disparity and discrimination based upon gender, age, disability or indigenous status, as the impact of climate change can be made worse by these factors.
- o The Climate Justice Fund supports International Development's new programme principles, in particular through embedding in our new programmes a Partner-Country led approach, equality and amplifying global south voices.
- o It is my firm belief that this equalities-centred approach to climate justice can be replicated elsewhere through focussing on a partner-country led approach.

Desired Outcomes

- Increased commitment to financing and practical action towards addressing loss and damage globally, done so in a climate just manner. This outcome could be realised from smaller scale action such as improved international and intranational relations, to larger scale action such as new financial commitments and partnerships.

Sensitivities

- We are clear that our funding must not distract from establishing the COP27
 Loss and Damage fund. Decisions to operationalise the fund are urgently
 needed to ensure the funds reach those communities who need it most. The
 Scottish Government will do all we can to support this.
- Given the urgency and scale of what is needed, the Scottish Government encourages all to consider what they can do now to support communities already facing the worst impacts of climate change. Contributing to our new programme is one way to do this.

- This funding for the C40 Cities Inclusive Climate Action programme will support

Architect of the Bridgetown Initiative, a proposed reform of the global financial architecture and development finance which has been increasing in momentum during 2023 and will feature in COP28 discussions.

Barbados is part of the Loss and Damage Transitional Committee with Mottley's climate envoy saying that the agreement caused an "equality of discomfort" between global south and global north and Mottley's statement's welcoming the progress made.

SG has asked PM Mottley to speak at our Loss and Damage event where we will announce £1m of new funding via C40 to support urban workers address the impacts of climate change. She has not yet confirmed.

Former First Minister met PM Mottley at COP27 where they discussed the Bridgetown Initiative, transition to renewables and the urgent need for action on climate change.

In January, Lisa Cummins, **Barbados Minister for Energy and Business Development**, visited Scotland to learn about our renewables sector, in particular offshore wind and hydrogen. She met with the First Minister and energy officials. There has been no follow up.

Mr Sefcovic is the EU's lead negotiator at COP 28. You discussed Scotland's renewables and hydrogen potential in June. One of the key EU COP 28 aims is agreement on global action towards the tripling of renewable capacity to 11TW and the doubling the rate of improvement by 2030, recognising that cooperation with developing nations will be necessary to achieve this. The EU's mandate also calls on "partners, from all regions, in a position to do so, including [governments, NGOs, private institutions], to provide enhanced and additional support for climate action, including in responding to loss and damage."



Essential Background Orbital Marine

Orbital Marine Power is a Scottish engineering company, with offices in Orkney and Edinburgh, focused on the development and global application of its floating tidal stream energy technology.

The Scottish Government gave Orbital £3.4m to help develop its tidal turbine which was manufactured by Scottish company Texo Group at their quayside facilities in Dundee. The Scottish National Investment Bank (SNIB) has invested £4 million in Orbital Marine Power, to support the ongoing operation of the existing project in Orkney and enable the company to continue its course to delivering multi-device projects in locations across the UK and around the world.

Orbital Marine Power has been successful in securing Contracts for Difference (CfD) to deploy a further 14.4 MW of tidal stream capacity in Orkney over the next 4-5 years.

OPENING

Good morning.

Thank you, Amal, for that very kind introduction.

Thank you for all being here and sharing in what I am confident will be a very productive and useful discussion.

And a special thank you to Omar, and the wider GEFI team, for all of your work in promoting global dialogue around the development of Green, Sustainable and Ethical Finance.

You are supporting Scotland's ambition to become a truly global centre for green and sustainable financial services.

Backed by over fifty global institutions and thought leaders in Green and Sustainable finance, I am incredibly proud that the 'Path to COP28' is being led by a Scottish organisation.

Indeed, many of you here today will have visited Edinburgh for the annual GEFI-led Ethical Finance Summit in September.

The Summit has firmly established Edinburgh as the home of global conversations on how to get sustainable finance flowing.

Today is a very welcome opportunity to continue those conversations, and for me to outline some of the work the Scottish Government is doing to build on our position as a global partner for green finance.

And also our work - I think mutually reinforcing work - to attract more investment to Scotland to facilitate our own Just Transition.

CLIMATE CRISIS

None of us in this room are in any doubt that we are facing a climate crisis; and one which is escalating rapidly.

Indeed, scarcely a week goes by without news of a major climate-related natural disaster.

United Nations Secretary General Antonio Gutierres has warned that "the evidence is everywhere. Humanity has unleashed destruction."

He also said that "this must not inspire despair, but action."

It is humanity, and humanity alone, which can take the action we urgently need to keep the global temperature rise below 1.5 degrees celsius.

Unless we act now, we will continue to see an increase in devastating heatwaves, floods, catastrophic storms, and water scarcity - something which we are already seeing in Scotland, a nation which many of you will know is famous for its rain.

That is a price our planet simply cannot afford to pay.

By restoring nature and ending our contribution to climate change by 2045, Scotland aims to play a big role in improving the lives of everyone on this planet.

Today, there can be no greater moral imperative than ensuring future generations not only survive, but thrive.

There can be no better investment opportunity for any nation,

than in embracing the transition to fairer, cleaner, greener societies.

And there can be no better business case than the one for regenerative economic systems, which benefit every single human being, and our planet as a whole.

Legacy of COP26, "the Finance COP"

COP26 in Glasgow was one of the most significant conferences ever hosted in Scotland or indeed the UK.

At COP26 we showed that in Scotland - a country which helped lead the world into the industrial age - now wants to use that same ingenuity to secure a fair and equitable net zero future.

In many respects, Glasgow's COP was "the Finance COP".

The private sector showed it was ready to supply the financing required to avoid the worst effects of climate change.

And financial institutions, with collective assets under management of nearly 100 trillion dollars, came together under The Glasgow Financial Alliance for Net Zero.

Here in Dubai, it is essential that we keep up the momentum for delivery, action, and progress.

We have already seen some progress in areas like loss and damage and climate finance - but we are not there yet. The world must go further, and quickly.

Scotland and a Just Transition

To meet the biggest challenge humanity has ever faced - climate change - we need to collaborate.

In Scotland, we are approaching this challenge through progressive and ambitious policy and targets, as well as through attracting vital investment and collaborating with academia and the private and third sectors.

Since 2016, the Scottish Government's radical innovation division, CivTech, has been delivering groundbreaking solutions to address the climate and biodiversity emergencies.

These cover everything, from better land management to cutting-edge land and marine natural capital investment vehicles.

CivTech's extraordinary success is the result of a fundamentally collaborative approach between the public sector, businesses, both large and small, the third sector, and citizens –

Collaboration which is already yielding results.

CivTech graduates **RiverTrack**, have designed ultra-low-cost early flood warning systems for remote and rural communities –

Reducing the cost of implementation and maintenance off flood warning systems by up to 95%.

Rethink Carbon are using smart technology to help communities and land managers make good land-use decisions and increase carbon capture.

We know the costs of transition to a net-zero economy are lowest and the opportunities greatest with early and well-managed action and investment.

This is why my government will soon implement a new Green Industrial Strategy – which will provide certainty to businesses and investors, ensuring the people of Scotland share in the

enormous economic opportunities of the global transition to net zero.

Through close cooperation with international partners and the private sector, Scotland will continue to develop its role as a global financial centre for responsible, sustainable investments that lead to greater rewards for all, not fewer.

Green Financial Services

For deals to be done, for finance to flow, and for net zero to be achieved, we must ensure that Scotland's financial system is ready for the future.

Because the just transition to net zero is not just an environmental and moral imperative. It is the greatest economic opportunity of this century.

A clear example of that is ScotWind - the world's largest floating offshore wind leasing round - which is expected to deliver up to £25 billion of investment across Scotland's supply chain.

That point on economic opportunity is particularly true when it comes to financial services.

Behind every investment, every transaction, sits a team of financial, legal, data and accountancy experts moving deals through to completion.

I want to attract and grow that international talent pool in Scotland.

The Global Green Finance Index ranks Edinburgh as one of the top 20 financial centres in the world and we are the second largest centre for financial services in the UK, with deep historic knowledge and capacity for innovation.

TheCityUK reported last year that the green finance market has already grown one hundred-fold since 2012.

And, we know it will have to continue to grow quickly in this decade, to support the move to net zero.

This is why the Scottish Government established a taskforce on Green and Sustainable Financial Services, convened by the Global Ethical Finance Initiative, and which is supported Scottish Financial Enterprise.

Bringing together industry leaders to cement Scotland's status as a global centre for green and sustainable investment.

I am looking forward to receiving the group's final recommendations early next year, which will provide a clear road map for Scotland – one of the world's oldest financial centres – to seize the opportunities presented by the transition to a net zero economy.

One of the ways that the Scottish Government is already trying to intervene to support investment in net zero sectors is the establishment of the Scottish National Investment Bank in 2020.

Since 2020, the Bank has made investment commitments worth over £460 million – in projects and businesses which support Scotland's ambitions on innovation, place, and net zero.

One of the key areas that the Scottish Government and the Bank believe to be an enormous opportunity for Scotland, is in offshore wind.

Which is why I recently announced up to £500million of public sector funds over the next five years to stimulate and support private investment in the infrastructure and manufacturing

facilities critical to the growth of our world-leading offshore wind sector.

We know that kind of de-risking of investment, is hugely important.

But we also know that for green finance to flow, we need to make the best case possible for why it should flow to Scotland.

And we must make it as easy as possible for our partners to invest.

INVESTOR PANEL

This has been the key focus of the Scottish Government's Investor Panel, which I co-chair with Angus Macpherson, the Chief Executive of Noble and Co.

We established the Investor Panel to advise us on how we can attract more capital investment to Scotland.

Its remit includes areas such as offshore wind, hydrogen and decarbonising transport

Its membership includes an expert panel of investors and asset managers who will use their wealth of experience to provide market intelligence on current and future green opportunities.

The Investor Panel makes clear the Scottish Government's determination to work with this community to support sustainable growth and achieve our wider ambitions doe

We agree with the Panel that the scale of our ambition will require a new, and very different, approach if Scotland is to deliver the physical infrastructure necessary for a Just Transition.

And it will require public and private capital investment on a far greater scale than anything that has been accomplished to date.

But we are clear that such investment has the potential to generate significant economic growth and create new jobs and industries right across Scotland.

We are up for the challenge. We are ready to capitalise on the opportunities in front of us. And we are already taking steps towards that.

Recently, the Investor Panel recommended that we consider issuing a Scottish Bond, to improve our engagement with institutional investors and debt markets.

Given the wealth of investment opportunities in front of us, I announced, in October, that the Scottish Government will take steps to issue its first ever Bond, to finance key infrastructure such as affordable housing.

We are moving forward with that work, taking the first steps including beginning due diligence assessments. If fiscal, economic and value for money conditions are satisfied, the aim is to make the bonds available to the market by the end of the current parliamentary session - in 2026.

This is a first for the Scottish Government, and an exciting opportunity to help raise Scotland's profile and engagement with international investors to attract investment.

Conclusion

The biodiversity loss of the past decades has shown us all, the humility of nature – doing everything it can to maintain the life support systems that sustain us, and which we continue to erode - while the earth-shattering destruction of extreme weather events continue to warn us of the growing cost of global inaction.

We have the chance to establish Scotland as a major centre for green and ethical finance, while helping Scotland and the wider world make the crucial move to net zero.

We need everyone – investors, governments, and industry – to rise to the challenge of financing our survival.

For now, that is a challenge we can still meet. It is imperative that we do. Thank you.

ANNEX A

Opening remarks

I would like to thank His Excellency Dr. Thani bin Ahmed Al Zeyoudi for inviting me to sit on this panel with my distinguished colleagues.

I want to thank him and the UAE as hosts for the inclusion of a specific day on trade at COP28 and I look forward to the UAE hosting the WTO Ministerial Conference13 in Abu Dhabi early next year with His Excellency as Chair.

As Cabinet Secretary during some of the Covid period I witnessed first hand the fragility of our supply chains and global trading systems. The war in Ukraine has also demonstrated the vulnerability to key sectors in our daily lives such as Energy security and the cost of living and the need to double down on renewables. Which is why I am really glad to have seen some of the announcements coming through this week at COP28.

The Scottish Government have been calling for a greater coherence between trade and climate policy since we published our trade strategy, the Vision for Trade, in 2021.

Our Vision for Trade sets out the principles and values for the trading relationships we want our country to have, now and in the future. We want Scotland to be a successful trading nation, but we also want to be known as much for *how* we trade as for *what* we trade.

We view the nexus of trade and climate as the good, the bad, and the ugly.

The <u>good</u> is that trade can help to scale up and promote the use of environmental goods and services. The more we can do to promote cross border trade and international collaboration to deliver a just and fast transition to net zero the better.

The <u>bad</u> is that trade emissions are contributing to the challenges we face. The world economic forum estimates just eight supply chains, from construction to textiles to food, account for more than 50% of global emissions. This is why the decarbonisation of supply chains is so important.

And finally, the <u>ugly</u> is that climate change is already changing our ability to trade. We've seen climate impacts to our major trade routes, from the Panama Canal to the Rhine. This is why the conversation around supply chain resilience is equally important.

But I know that it is businesses who trade, not Governments, so I'm here as much to learn from you, distinguished colleagues on the panel and in the audience, on what you need from governments to maximise the opportunities of a just transition and manage the risks that climate change poses to our trade and resilience.

ANNEX B

Question: to be asked by Moderator:

How is Scotland contributing to making international trade more resilient and sustainable?

Answer:

Let me focus on policy and practice.

As I briefly highlighted, Scotland's Vision for Trade sets out the principles and values for the trading relationships we want to have, now and in the future. It's about HOW we trade as well as what we trade.

It's focussed on ensuring trade works for people, prosperity and the planet – what we term a wellbeing economy – and on creating a fair trading system that works for everyone.

The Vision for Trade calls for greater coherence of the international climate and trade regimes so that they support each other. That is why, for example, we welcome efforts through the World Trade Organisation to reduce barriers to trade for environmental goods and services.

On a practical level, we are supporting a vibrant Scottish ecosystem of start ups with a strong emphasis on climate tech and sustainability. In fact, I spent this morning with 19 Scottish businesses who are here at COP to showcase their pioneering innovation and technologies and to learn from and collaborate with other. These companies range from sustainable vertical farming, to ocean and tidal energy to green heat.

Similarly, earlier in the week I joined a panel about Space and Sustainability and how Scottish companies like D-Cat and Krucial are leading the way in using satellite data to address climate change, make supply chains more efficient and improve resilience.

These companies are working and trading right across the globe and it is our role as the governments to make that as easy and straightforward as possible.

<u>Further Background Information</u>

Supply Chain Resilience

Supply chain resilience has been tested more than ever in recent years. It was tested in unprecedented ways by COVID-19, demonstrating the importance of resilient

supply chains to ensure the continued flow of critical goods. It's being tested now by conflicts around the world. Finally, climate change is also testing this resilience. It's already changing our ability to trade. We've seen climate impacts to our major trade routes, from the Panama Canal to the Rhine.

That is why we recognise in our **Vision for Trade** that In addition to using trade to contribute to net zero targets, action is needed to prepare for climate impacts on trade.

Global Value Chains are also hugely important for Scotland. By strengthening supply networks this can support our economy and encourage businesses to diversify their supply chains, thereby building greater resilience.

While it is businesses that trade, one significant lever Governments do have to influence trade flows is the public procurement of goods and services. This represents a major part of a country's market. Therefore, the Scottish Government's approach to sustainable public procurement is geared towards support development of a diverse, responsible and resilient supply chains. Our approach outlines steps on how public bodies could:

- maximise opportunities to engage with the market to build the capability and flexible capacity of both existing and new supply chains;
- **engage with key partners**, including other public bodies, local economic development and enterprise organisations, to prioritise and target efforts.
- **consider action to achieve a positive social impact**, assuring and protecting workers' rights within supply chains and achieving employment and skills where possible.

The Scottish Government declared a Climate Emergency in April 2019 and has shown leadership by establishing the cross-sector Climate and Procurement Forum in November of that year.

From the outset we have taken a multi-track approach to address strategic enablers for climate action - building capability across the public sector and its supply chains and collaborating across procurement and climate policy to address the complex challenges we face in delivering against our climate ambitions.

Our national collaborative frameworks that are available for use by the wider public sector in Scotland and by charities represent approximately 10 per cent of annual procurement spend in Scotland (£14.5 billion). Building on risk management exercises that were conducted relating to previous supply chain shocks including Brexit, COVID and the Ukraine, we are undertaking a risk management exercise on national collaborative frameworks through the lens of climate adaptation.

This approach is also reflected in our approach to International Climate Justice.

The Climate Just Communities contract started in August this year. It aims to deliver "on the ground" interventions in Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia to combat the impact of climate change on the most marginalised communities in Africa. The focus is on communities most at risk of the consequences of a changing climate including increased droughts, floods and unpredictable weather patterns.

- Three £8 million contracts were established with different service providers for each, totalling £24 million over three years.
- Each lead service provider has a consortium of delivery partners and subcontractors "on the ground" to deliver agreed interventions, giving great work opportunities to local communities.
- Through the tender process, the lead service providers submitted climate emergency proposals detailing actions they plan to take throughout the contract duration.

Scotland Vision for Trade (VfT)

Published in January 2021, VfT sets out the Scottish Government's five principles - **Inclusive Growth, Wellbeing, Sustainability, Net Zero and Good Governance** - underpinning our trade decisions and relationships. The Vision positions our approach to trade within a broader economic, social and environmental context. It considers the strategic role of trade and how it contributes to wider governmental ambitions, in line with our National Performance Framework.

- Innovative business solutions and trade with like-minded nations is critical in our global fight against climate change.
- While it is businesses who trade, not governments. We know that trade is essential for
 economic security and important to every nation on the planet. It is also the enabler
 for breakthrough technologies to have impact at global scale.

Question 1 - Scotland currently has a carbon intensive economy. What are your key considerations when looking to transition to a low carbon economy?

Answer

The challenge and the opportunity of net zero is one that is being faced by countries around the world and there can be no doubt that the world is watching to see how

fossil-fuel intensive, smaller economies like Scotland manage the transition to a net zero society and fulfil our obligation to decarbonise.

Ensuring our transition is a just transition is how we choose to answer that net zero challenge. If Scotland, as a nation, can get this right, then decarbonising our economy through a just transition will have positive impacts on every aspect of our lives.

A just transition means:

- Making the most of our natural resources, as we are demonstrating through the scale and ambition of our Offshore Wind and Hydrogen plans.
- Skills training and education that helps to secure good, high value jobs in green industries like low-carbon manufacturing, renewables, and tech;
- Job security for those in industries that will play the biggest part in the transition at every level from those working in petrol stations to those on oil platforms.
- Homes that are energy efficient and help to reduce fuel poverty.
- Building infrastructure, transport and communities that support our efforts to decarbonise, to enhance biodiversity and which are resilient in the face of the impact of climate change that we are already feeling.
- Making sure the costs do not burden those least able to pay and the benefits of our transition are felt regardless of where you live, who you are and what you do.

We are developing Just Transition Plans for sectors, regions and sites, ensuring our transition to net zero is a fair and managed transition

We began with our Energy Strategy and Just Transition Plan and we are developing plans for Agriculture and Land Use, the Built Environment and Construction, and Transport alongside our next Climate Change Plan.

Our ambitious approach builds on our world-first National Just Transition Planning Framework and sets out how we will be working with others on the economic and social impacts of transition.

We are increasingly embedding just transition into all of our work as a government. The 2019 Climate Change Act requires that forthcoming Climate Change Plans address the challenges faced by sectors, regions and communities in Scotland and the policies Ministers set out to address these challenges.

Question 2 - What is Scotland doing to decarbonise supply chains?

Answer

As I said in my opening remarks it is businesses who trade, not Governments. However, I know that government has a key role to enable and support businesses, so they are assisted in their decarbonisation efforts.

The most important thing we are doing is supporting the creation new renewables economy in Scotland. We are leading the way across the transition to renewable energy following successful leasing rounds. Scotland now has the potential pipeline for over 40GW of Offshore Wind capacity and we are aiming to generate 5GW of Hydrogen by 2030.

We know that we decarbonise more than just our energy sector and that is why through initiatives like our Low Carbon Manufacturing Challenge Fund we working to to reduce the carbon footprint of manufacturing

This has supported companies like:

- Trojan Energy, in Aberdeen, to develop their new technology to allow more onstreet charging for EVs while keeping pavements clutter free;
- Also, Wave energy pioneer Mocean Energy, who are part of COP28 Business Delegation, have received support to help design, build and test key subsystems for their wave energy machine.

We are also refocusing our economic development agencies to assist more companies than ever before to decarbonise.

Lines on battery storage

The Scottish Ministers have committed to considering what adaptions may be necessary to the consenting regime in Scotland to facilitate deployment of battery storage technology and will seek views as part of a future consultation.

We will ensure that we engage with battery storage project developers as part of that consultation.

Battery storage is classed as electricity generation. We are aware that the UKG has removed the need for obtaining consent for battery projects at a national level. We are committed to reviewing the Scottish position with respect to battery storage projects.

In parallel, there is wider work underway to review the current scale threshold at which generation projects come to Scottish Ministers for determination as opposed to going to Local Planning Authorities. We will seek to consult on this in due course

Lines on Grid Reform

Grid connection dates are very long – this is due to be fixed by the policy work underway with Ofgem and NGESO. We would love to see Scotland as a first mover in this and help to enforce the removal of zombie projects and the management of the connection queue to facilitate real projects being connected ahead of others.

We strongly support reforms to the grid the connections process to remove 'zombie' projects and speed up the process for projects that are ready to connect.

We welcomed the decision by Ofgem (on Monday 13 November) to introduce a grid connection queue management process, which will enable National Grid Electricity System Operator (ESO) to remove stalled, speculative or slow-moving projects. This will free up capacity and prioritise projects that are ready to connect.

These reforms are critical to enabling our just transition to net zero.

We urge the ESO to implement the reforms quickly but networks are reserved to the UK Government and regulated by Ofgem, the Scottish Government has no ability to enforce or manage the delivery of these reforms.

Question:

Name one policy intervention or investment that your government introduced that can help with meeting your national NDC?

Answer:

- Scotland is one of only a very few countries to have set statutory annual targets, having set them for every year until we meet net zero, as well as including a share of emissions from international aviation and shipping in the targets.
- We met the 2020 target and are disappointed we missed the 2021 so narrowly.
- We know the importance of integrity and hold ourselves to account. If annual
 emissions targets are missed, we require a catch-up plan to set out additional
 policies to make up for the excess emissions by aiming to outperform on future
 targets.
- Scotland's legislation also enshrines in law our commitment to a just transition, ensuring fairness is at the heart of our approach.

Question:

How do you think national government should approach development of new NDCs and how can you help them?

Answer:

- Nationally Determined Contributions should be woven into mitigation and adaptation plans at all levels of government. As we know, the Global Stocktake report has urged countries to use its findings to ratchet ambition at COP28 and make clear commitments to greater climate action, particularly in relation to the next round of National Determined Contributions (NDCs) in 2025.
- As for helping Parties to recognise this ambition, the most effective means of doing so is to lead by example. Subnational governments have extensive experience in the development and delivery of climate action which is valuable to the NDC process.
- In Scotland, we are responsible for our own national Climate Change Plan, through which we have set ourselves some of the most ambitious targets in the world. Through demonstrating ambition and the urgent action required to meet this- in ways such as this, we can influence larger states, including Parties, to take action.

Question:

How can Under2 Coalition help over next two years to assist states in supporting their national governments in developing NDCs?

Answer:

• The conclusions of the first-ever global stocktake report are deeply concerning and we must use COP28 to provide the dramatic course correction that we need to secure a net zero and climate resilient world.

- The momentum at this COP towards increasing the role of states, regions, cities and devolved nations is welcome. We must build upon this to fully realise our potential in UN processes, and to increase our influence.
- Under2 Coalition members can play a crucial role by demonstrating high levels of ambition and action. Through this demonstrative ambition, subnationals can be an asset to NDCs.
- Other opportunities to assist states exist in sharing of lessons-learned both amongst ourselves and with state governments in order to aid progress.
- Globally, we must coordinate with other subnational organisations such as the C40 group, to use shares asks and language to drive ambition.
- Domestically, states, regions, cities and devolved nations must lead by example, and continue to show ambition in their climate action.

Governor Cameli represents the right-wing Progressistas party, supporters of ex-president Bolsanaro. Acre region is in northwest Brazil with a population of 700'000. It is within the amazon region, and has 92% tree cover.

Oh Young-hun governs the group of islands in the Sea of Japan known as Jeju Provide, population ~700'000. He represents the centrist-liberal Democratic Party of Korea.

- Scottish Government has funded the inception and development of the Just Transition Taskforce, an officials-led peer-learning forum for members of the Under2 Coalition interested in just transition policy development. The Climate Group receives the funding to provide the practical support to the Taskforce, and currently 11 states and regions are active members (California, Gauteng, Western Cape, North Bank, Cross River State, Maharashtra, Isle of Man, Mato Grosso, Washington, Wales and Quebec)

Questions and answers

The event will take the format of a discussion moderated by Professor Nick Robins, with the below questions provided by the organisers below. There may be further questions from the audience at the event (please see background briefing section).

- 1. Just transition has been high on the Scottish Government's agenda for several years, and Scotland took world-leading action to include a set of just transition principles in climate change legislation. Can you tell us more about that decision and how you are carrying it forward as Cabinet Secretary?
 - Scotland updated its climate change legislation at a time when there was increased emphasis on a just transition both internationally and domestically.
 The Paris Agreement in 2015 referred to taking into account the imperatives of

a just transition of the workforce, and the International Labour Organisation had published guiding principles for a just transition, covering:

- o the need for policy coherence across portfolios;
- o the provision of a framework to create "decent jobs";
- consensus and social dialogue;
- o and the need to support workers' rights and gender equality.
- Domestically, a coalition of trade unions and environmental stakeholders heavily advocated for a just transition to be integrated into the work of the Scottish Government, and set out their views on the remit of the first Just Transition Commission.
- As we developed the Climate Change Bill, we considered the ILO's principles.
 The Scottish Parliament held a parliamentary debate which demonstrated cross-party support for the application of just transition principles in Scotland.
- Looking back since 2019, our approach to applying these principles across Scottish Government policy has expanded, most predominantly through the development of sector Just Transition Plans, which must be designed in a way that develops and maintains social consensus and meet just transition outcomes.
- We are using these outcomes to guide our work in our £500 Just Transition Fund as well, as projects must demonstrate progress against the outcomes.
- 2. As you know, the Scottish Just Transition Commission was tasked by your Government to advise you on your approach and has been clear that the costs should not unfairly burden those least able to pay. With your work developing Just Transition Plans for the built environment, transport and agriculture sectors, where have policies been effective in this regard and where is more work required to build on this?
 - Ensuring costs do not unfairly burden those least able to pay is at the heart of a just transition for Scottish Government and something we know our climate change policy needs to reflect. There are already examples where we have done this, for example expanding our provision of free bus travel. Scotland already has the most generous concessionary scheme in the UK, investing £300 million annually to provide free bus travel for over 2.6 million people, including everyone under 22 and over 60.
 - We have also committed to investing at least £1.8 billion over the course of this Parliament towards heat and energy efficiency measures and to support those least able to pay, including grants of up to £7,500 for heat pumps and £7,500 for energy efficiency measures, including a rural uplift of £1,500.
 - These are individual examples of where we've been taking this forward. Our Just Transition Plans aim to consider each sector's transition in a holistic way, providing clarity and also assessing against unintended consequences. Broadly,

the Just Transition Plans will set out interventions that address co-benefits and ensure we are supporting those with the least ability to pay.

3. Question to both Cab Sec and Secretary Rodríguez Gómez: Backlash can often cause policies to fail. How is our government creating a sense of distributional fairness of both adaptation and mitigation costs?

- Our National Just Transition Planning Framework sets out the need to ensure a
 fair distribution of costs as one of our outcomes. We know we need to do this
 and that it is a hugely complex and challenging task, which is why Scottish
 Government is currently commissioning deliberative research to support both
 our understanding of what a fair distribution of costs is and engage members
 of the public on this.
- A key element of this approach is ensuring we engage the public on policies that are likely to impact their day-to-day lives and incur costs, so that members of the public feel they've been consulted.
- The Just Transition Commission's recent advice points out the need to introduce
 a distributive approach to ensure public consent for changes to come.
 Internationally, we know the UN has a principle of Common But Differentiated
 Responsibilities which increasingly may need to be considered in domestic
 policymaking to ensure there is a perceived sense of fairness in both mitigation
 and adaptation costs.
- 4. Question to both Cab Sec and Secretary Rodríguez Gómez: Transitions are complex, what works well in one region today can backfire in another tomorrow. What lessons can you share from your perspective, to other subnationals that are integrating just transition in their net zero emissions plans?
 - Regions and nations across the globe are currently in the process of taking forward just transition work. This is new ground at a time when even reducing emissions is getting into a space of difficult decisions and trade-offs.
 - This is why it is so important that we share knowledge as we go and why the Just Transition Taskforce offers a forum for that knowledge sharing.
 - Our efforts to develop and co-design Just Transition Plans are already providing some learning on how to build trust around future interventions. It is clearly fundamental to engage stakeholders before policies are fully developed.
 - Having a Just Transition Commission of experts has also helped shape the Scottish Government's approach in a number of ways, and we continue to benefit from the advice that Nick and the rest of the Commission provides. That's why I'm delighted to say our grant to C40 will include funding to Africa's first local Just Transition Commission, so that five regional governments in the Global South can benefit from expertise the way we have.

How will you monitor and evaluate progress in your Just Transition Plans?

- Each Just Transition Plans will contain a monitoring and evaluation framework, setting out a series of data indicators which will be used to measure progress against the sectoral outcomes.
- No other jurisdiction has developed a full monitoring and evaluation framework for a just transition. We are working on this.
- The Just Transition Commission has emphasised it is prioritising looking at monitoring and evaluation in its advice to the Scottish Government, and we will welcome the Commission's support on this and our work in tackling this important yet challenging part of this work.

How are you financing the transition?

- We know that Government cannot fund the entire transition. This is why the Scottish Government has announced a new Green Industrial Strategy that will help businesses and investors and ensure the people of Scotland can share in the enormous economic opportunities of the global transition.
- A key focus in the year ahead will be to work across the public and private sectors
 to drive forward agreed recommendations from the First Minister's Investor
 Panel on how we attract private investment for large scale infrastructure projects
 and use public spending more effectively to crowd in private capital.
- We also have a £500 million Just Transition Fund for the North East and Moray, which has allocated £75 million to date, supporting projects and communities across the North East and Moray to create jobs, support innovation, and secure the highly skilled workforce of the future.
- Projects supported in the first year of the fund include:
 - o £11 million on a **package of skills interventions** supporting the transferability of workforce across sectors to meet the needs of the net zero transition including: a digital offshore energy skills passport; and an Energy Transition Skills Hub.
 - o £30 million on **innovative projects and approaches**, including two targeted innovation funding support schemes: the Social Enterprise Just Transition Fund and supply chain pathway and challenge fund; and a digital innovation lab.
 - o £3 million testing and promoting **emerging technologies** such as EV battery recycling technology, offshore green hydrogen, and decommissioning; and

- o £4 million empowering and **investing in communities**, with our participatory budgeting approach and through specific community projects in ecovillages, adaptation and local climate assemblies.
- o We also ring-fenced £1m of the Fund in 2022-23 for participatory budgeting, which we will continue every year over the lifetime of this parliament.

How are you ensuring the needs of rural areas are reflected in the just transition?

- We are developing sectoral Just Transition Plans to address fairness in the highest emitting sectors, and are committed to following with regional Just Transition Plans, which will focus on the different needs and impacts on Scotland's regional economies and communities.
- However, it is already evident in developing sectoral Plans that no one-size-fits-all approach will work. The engagement with the public on the Just Transition Plans has been clear that there is a need to differentiate based on the ability to choose behaviours. Rural needs are a clear example of this.
- It's also worth pointing out that we have committed to regional just transition plans during the course of this parliament. We will be setting out our intended approach in the coming months.

Subnational Ambition for Adaptation:

- States, regions and devolved nations have a significant amount to offer when it comes to contributing to national NDCs and NAPs, and we also have much to offer by demonstrating how to work successful with local levels of government.
- Collaboration with regional and devolved governments working with national government is so important, but we must see Parties show willingness to collaborate with us and be responsive to our needs.
- Many states, regions and devolved nations such as us have produced their own versions of NDCs and NAPs, and – with our experience of implementation and understanding of communities on the ground - can offer valuable insight to national governments.
- Next year we will publish our new National Adaptation Plan. This plan will recognise
 the importance of regions and local authorities in delivery resilience across
 Scotland covering 5 outcomes across nature, communities, public services,
 business and the economy and our international efforts.
- We have initiated programmes to support adaptation in Scotland's most rural and sparsely populated Northern region. These regional partnerships are proving an effective way of building an ecosystem of local authorities and public bodies to come together and deliver adaptation action in a way that is tailored to their region.
- We are also applying this approach that recognises regional strengths to just transition, by developing Just Transition Plans for sectors, regions and sites, ensuring our transition to net zero is a fair and managed transition.
- Finally, your question refers to stakeholders; a key stakeholder for Scotland is the public. We have a statutory public engagement plan and put a real emphasis on working with the public to understand how to support them to reduce emissions, and maintain public support for policies.

Non-party governments potential:

- Welcome the momentum at this COP to increase the role of states, regions, cities and devolved nations and realise our potential in UN processes, including via the Local Climate Ambition Summit.

Juergen Voegele is the Vice President for Sustainable Development at the World Bank. He was previously Global Director of the Climate Change Group and Senior Director of the Agriculture and Food Global Practice.

As of 2022, the bank's total climate financing portfolio was \$29.4 billion. Critics say this is a start, but far from sufficient.

The Transitional Committee has recommended that the **UNFCCC Loss and Damage Fund** is hosted at the World Bank for four years on an interim basis. Critics argue that it would fail to provide communities direct access to funds, and risk further indebting developing countries. Others see it as an opportunity to reform the World Bank, which also currently hosts the **UNFCCC Green Climate Fund.**

The Bridgetown Initiative, led by Barbados Prime Minister Mia Mottley, aims to increase the speed and scale of mitigation and adaptation funds from Multilateral Development Banks to the most climate vulnerable countries.

Introduction

A warm welcome to you all. I'm delighted to be here this afternoon, representing the Scottish Government at this important and timely discussion on loss and damage.

My thanks to all the organisers and participants, including the SLYCAN Trust and their partners SLYCAN Trust Youth. I'd also like to welcome representatives from the Sri Lankan Government and the UNFCCC, who will share their experiences shortly.

UNFCCC Loss and Damage Fund

I been asked to talk about **why** it's important that Scotland committed loss and damage funding at COP26 and **what** the impact of that commitment has been.

Well, let's start with the why.

2023 is on track to be the hottest year on earth since records began and the consequences have been felt worldwide.

Over the past year, we've seen a food crisis in Malawi, drought in the Horn of Africa, and wildfires in places such as Greece, Hawaii and Canada.

The devastating impacts of the climate crisis are affecting communities all over the world, but these impacts are being felt first and most severely in the Global South.

We recognise that developed countries, like Scotland, who have benefited so greatly from industrialisation, have a moral responsibility to address the loss and damage caused by unavoidable climate change impacts.

Scotland's action on loss and damage

Addressing loss and damage is at the very heart of Scotland's focus on international climate action and climate justice. At COP26, we became the first Global North Government to commit funding for loss and damage: turning pledges into action.

Our initial £2 million, is already supporting communities in Asia, Africa, and the Pacific Islands. For example, projects we have funded are helping communities in Malawi to rebuild houses destroyed by cyclone Ana, using resilient building materials and local artisans; supporting climate displaced women in Bangladesh to increase their incomes; and funding community led action across Pacific Islands.

At COP27, we committed a further £5 million of funding to address non-economic loss and damage.

And at New York Climate Week, in September, our First Minister announced that we will be partnering with the Climate Justice Resilience Fund to deliver this £5 million commitment, on programmes that will be community led, and give a strong voice to women and girls.

Scotland - leading by example

We recognise that our funding commitments are small in terms of what is needed globally. But we see them as important step in mobilising, scaling, and motivating greater international action – showing that we can spend on loss and damage *now*.

Our pledges at COP26 and COP27 were a catalyst for other governments to step up and commit funding. And we will continue to encourage governments, NGOs, and the private sector, to step up their ambitions on addressing loss and damage.

Listening to women and young people

It's not just about the amount of funding pledged but *how* it is distributed.

In all the projects we fund we seek to ensure that women, young people and those facing existing marginalisation in their communities are at the forefront of all decision making.

Our job is to listen to their experiences, and most importantly, in response: do everything in our power to support the platforming of our Global South partners in international climate discussions.

Building global evidence on loss and damage

We know that there are still substantial gaps in the global evidence base on loss and damage, particularly on non-economic loss and damage.

Learning from our programme is contributing to this global evidence.

The better we understand what works on the ground, the more effective our interventions will be.

That's why we brought together international representatives and practitioners to articulate best practice on *Addressing Loss and Damage* for a Conference in 2022.

At the conference, we made real progress, discussing and then putting into practical action afterwards, the importance of varied and targeted funding for loss and damage, that does not create debt for

those countries most in need of our support. But there is so much more to learn and that's why we're here today.

Closing

I'd like to finish by reiterating commitment that Scotland will continue to champion the issue of loss and damage, pushing other countries and funders for greater ambition and action. We are clear that a people-centred, human rights approach must be central to this action.

I'd now like to hand over to colleagues for what I'm sure will be an informative discussion. Thank you.

Last year, in Sharm el Sheikh, we met to push for substantive progress to reduce emissions, build resilience and to advance the discussion on climate finance and loss and damage.

A year later, we meet again following events around the world that have served as a stark reminder that the climate crisis is a crisis that is here and now.

2023 is on track to be the hottest year on earth since records began and the consequences have been felt worldwide.

Over the past year, we've seen a food crisis in Malawi, drought in the Horn of Africa, and wildfires in places such as Greece, Hawaii and Canada.

We meet today in more difficult circumstances than ever before and with the impacts of climate change being felt more intensely and more frequently.

But what has remained steadfast in that year is our resolve to meet these challenges head on, in a way that is fair and just.

In our response to meeting these challenges, we must recognise the inherent injustice at the heart of climate change.

Far too often it is those who have contributed least to the crisis that often suffer the impacts first and most severely.

We recognise that developed countries, like Scotland, who have benefited so greatly from industrialisation, have a moral responsibility to address the loss and damage caused by unavoidable climate change impacts.

We also cannot ignore that within these communities, climate impacts have the ability to exacerbate existing inequalities.

Far too often it is women, young people and those already marginalised that bare the very worst of its impacts.

The Scottish Government stands in solidarity with the Global South. Last year, at COP27, we saw a breakthrough agreement to establish an international loss and damage fund.

While we recognise this achievement, there is still a considerable distance to go to properly address losses and damages in the Global South.

In those decisions around the operationalisation of the fund, we must listen and be guided by those who are already experiencing the very worst impacts of loss and damage.

At COP26, we were proud to become the first Global North country to commit funds explicitly to address loss and damage.

Since then, we have continued to champion the issue of loss and damage, pushing other countries and funders for greater ambition and action. We are clear that a peoplecentred, human rights approach must be central to this action.

During New York Climate Week, our First Minister announced a new £1m programme to address loss and damage to be delivered through Scotland's Humanitarian Emergency Fund.

Since the announcement, we have worked at pace to mobilise those funds and today, I am pleased to announce, four projects have now been selected as part of the programme - projects in Pakistan, Zambia, Kenya and Ethiopia.

This is the first time, that we know of, that loss and damage funding has been dispersed through a humanitarian framework in this way.

We hope that this will provide valuable learning and that this will support a growing evidence- base to inform UNFCCC and COP discussions.

We do not have all the answers. But we are making a start and hope we can offer some.

We know, for example, that a changing climate amplifies existing gender inequalities.

That's why we must recognise the differentiated impacts of climate change on women in particular if our progress on climate change is ever to be more than partial.

We know too that even in humanitarian contexts, we must be locally-led. People are the greatest experts in their own lives. Our job is to listen and respond.

These projects will therefore address the disproportionate impact of climate change on women and marginalised groups, and local communities will be involved in each step of project design and delivery.

In Scotland, we are committed, not just to taking a human rights based approach in our climate justice work, but across all of our international relations. We have committed to taking a feminist approach to all international relations.

Over the past two years, we have been speaking to experts in this area, based in Scotland and abroad, to help us shape our approach.

We have spent this time listening and learning from others, including experts by experience and academics, including those from the Global South.

Last month, we published our position paper that sets out the principles which will guide our work and ensure our feminist approach.

This is just the first step of our journey to ensure all our work on international relations, development and climate justice is fully gender-responsive.

Across the world, young people have been instrumental in bringing the issue of climate change to the fore of public consciousness.

Climate change is, without doubt, an unjust legacy for young people. They will face the greatest impacts of the crisis across their lifetimes. As we look to the future, we must listen, learn from and be guided by our future generations.

This year, Scotland is delighted to be welcoming four young women from the Global South as part of our Scottish Human Rights Defender Fellowship delivered through the University of Dundee.

The Fellowship supports defenders working to promote gender and the environment, providing a temporary place of respite in Scotland from the dangerous conditions around the world, while they develop their skills and extending their networks.

This year, the programme is supporting its youngest ever defender to take part, alongside the first defender from an indigenous community.

This is a small step but one of many in our work to ensure that marginalised groups, including young people and women, are at the centre of climate action.

We want to act as a bridge – providing marginalized groups with a platform and access to international dialogues.

We are clear that the lived experiences of marginalized groups and their demands must be heard as crucial evidence of the need for action of unprecedented scale and urgency.

I hope that, when we meet again at COP29, we can look back at this moment and reflect on the progress we have made in advocating for a stronger youth and indigenous voice in formal negotiations and on the operationalisation of the Loss and Damage Fund.

The Scottish Government will lend its full support to YOUNGO in their call for a youth plenary at COP29.

FUNDED PROJECTS

1. Overview

Of our initial £2m announced at COP26, £1m was awarded to the Climate Justice Resilience (CJRF) who have distributed a variety of community led grants (detailed below).

CJRF are also our partners for the £5m programme to address non-economic loss and damage. **Projects have not yet been selected.**

2. Africa

A \$200,000 grant was provided to **Churches Action in Relief and Development (CARD) to** support the communities in Chikwawa district in Malawi, which was devastated by Cyclone Ana in January 2022.

The project provided support to rebuild houses destroyed by the cyclone, using resilient building materials and local artisans. It has a livelihood component in the form of a livestock pass-on scheme, in which one set of families receive the first round of goats, which are supported by veterinary services and livestock insurance. Once the goats reproduce, the first set of families pass on the offspring to a predetermined second set of families. **These interventions were identified and selected by community members during a community-level assessment of the loss and damage they** experienced after Cyclone Ana.

3. Asia

A \$250,000 grant was provided to **Helvetas Bangladesh** to help families make more informed decisions about migration, including by offering skill development opportunities for more economically successful migration.

The project also provided support for the smart use of remittances to support the climate resilience of family members who have not migrated. The project will **establish** a gender-disaggregated database of seasonal or temporary migrant workers, to provide an evidence base for further support for climate-forced displacement. In addition to support around migration, the project enabled communities to re-build livelihoods and infrastructure damaged by climate-induced disaster. Community Teams, composed of previously displaced community members, played a critical role in identifying those in need of support first.

1. A further \$250,000 grant was provided to **Young Power in Social Action** to support climate-forced displaced people in south-eastern Bangladesh.

This project focused on providing for the immediate basic needs of climate-forced displaced people in a safe location, as well as building the capacity of climate-forced displaced people, especially youth, to advocate for the security of their rights and livelihoods. Through these efforts, **the project focused on increasing the income of women and women-headed families** through alternative livelihoods and by providing them with safe shelter. As part of this project, YPSA also advocated for rights-based solutions for climate-forced displacement.

4. Pacific Islands

A \$225,000 grant was provided to the **Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC)** to support partners across the Pacific to collaboratively assess and address climate-induced losses and damages being faced in their communities.

Partners co-designed the range of activities that each organisation undertook through subgrants from UUSC. Design activities include youth organising to map out what is being lost or damaged and community-led strategy development to seek resources for rebuilding or relocation. Other activities included protection of traditional knowledge through storytelling; preservation of traditional knowledge through intergenerational dialogue; and litigation at the regional and international levels. UUSC is also engaging in participatory monitoring, evaluation, and learning in this grant in a deliberative and consultative manner.

5. Multi-country

A \$200,000 grant was awarded to the **Loss and Damage Youth Coalition**, to prioritise how loss and damage funding should be allocated. **Eleven small scale, youth led projects** were funded including:

- Sustainability Week Pakistan \$10K to address loss and damage through olive tree planting, grafting, and oil extraction that creates green jobs and reforests dry areas.
- Women for Green Economy Movement Uganda \$10K grant from the Council to plant trees in areas affected by floods and mudslides in Mbale, Uganda.

• The Mawoudit Foundation in South Sudan - \$10K grant to re-construct grass-made houses, distribute solar lamps, and train people to use these lamps in areas affected by the climate crisis.

Scotland's Hydrogen Ambition

Introduction

Good morning to you all.

I would first like to thank SEforALL for inviting me to this event, it is a pleasure to speak to here today.

SE4ALL play a crucial role accelerating the path to universal access to clean energy. In 2022, on behalf of the Scottish Government, I signed the SEforALL 24/7 Carbon Free Energy Compact – a commitment to fully decarbonising the electricity sector.

I am also delighted that, earlier this week, the Scottish Government announced funding for two SE4ALL capacity building projects to unlock local currency financing for minigrids in Zambia and to accelerate access to clean cooking methods in Rwanda.

While we expect direct electrification to do the heavy lifting in decarbonising the energy system, we also recognise the contribution that green hydrogen can make as part of an integrated energy system.

This will be particularly the case in hard to abate sectors such as heavy-duty transport, shipping, aviation and some industrial uses.

As we are all very aware, there is a global momentum and enthusiasm behind green hydrogen, and in Scotland we share this enthusiasm.

Scotland's Ambition

Our Hydrogen Action Plan published last year sets out the vision and actions that we will take to ensure that Scotland becomes a leader in the production of reliable, competitive, and renewable hydrogen.

We believe we have the assets to bring forward large scale green hydrogen production. Alongside our vast offshore wind resources, we have a skilled technical workforce, and highly specialised companies in the energy sector.

As an early adopter and supporter of hydrogen, Scotland is already taking an innovative lead, developing a strong track record of world-leading hydrogen demonstration projects.

International Collaboration

In fact, we strongly believe that Scotland has a key role to play internationally. Our Hydrogen Action Plan sets out some of the actions that we will take to ensure that Scotland can contribute to meeting the growing demand in Europe.

Our approach for the development at pace of the sector is one that focuses in cooperation.

We are proud members of key European alliances such as the Vanguard Initiative, Hydrogen Europe's Regional Pillar, and we co-chair Europe's Under 2 Coalition. We have also signed a number of international agreements on hydrogen, including with Denmark, Occitania, and German states.

We are also involved in a number of cutting edge international hydrogen research partnerships.

We have provided funding towards Hydrogen Backbone Link Project, which is assessing the potential to connect Scotland to the European Hydrogen Backbone pipeline.

We are also currently working with the Port of Rotterdam and other strategic partners, assessing the feasibility of shipping Hydrogen from Scotland to Northern Europe.

Export Ambition

Our analysis shows that Scotland can be an exporter of hydrogen, we have the potential to produce over 3 million tonnes of green hydrogen per year by 2045, with up to 2.5 million tonnes of hydrogen for export.

We are well-placed in terms of proximity and infrastructure connectivity, which gives us the potential to be an export hub linking the North Sea region and the north of Europe.

To realise our export potential, we are currently developing a Hydrogen Sector Export Plan, which will set out the steps we will take, positioning Scotland as a key contributor to the global green hydrogen sector.

Closing Remarks

In Scotland we take pride in being a trusted and reliable trading partner, aiming to play a key role in contributing to the European, and global future energy supply.

International cooperation is key to unlocking the hydrogen economy. To address our climate goals, we need global

solutions, no one company, industry or government can achieve these alone.

Over the coming years, we aim to continue developing bilateral and multilateral relations with Scotland's near northern neighbours to promote regional cooperation, and heighten awareness of the region's green hydrogen potential.

By coming together to build a strong and robust hydrogen sector we can accelerate the global transition to net zero, thereby helping to address the fundamental climate issues we are all focused on.

I wish to thank you for your time today, and encourage you to engage with Scotland and our blossoming hydrogen sector.

I am delighted to be with you today and I want to thank the Regions4, the Under2 Coalition and the European Committee of the Regions for hosting this event.

Now, more than ever, it is crucial that we come together as devolved, state and regional governments to elevate local voices

as part of our just transition to a net zero and climate resilient world.

This is also an aptly timed event, as it was announced last week that Scotland is one of the partners, others of whom are also here today, to endorse the LGMA position to UNFCCC at COP28 on multilevel action to address the climate crisis.

Working in concert, our voices as devolved governments are much stronger than if we stand alone.

The First Minister of Scotland also recognises this and ahead of COP28, he hosted political representatives from devolved, state and regional governments.

They discussed opportunities to increase the role of non-party governments in UN climate processes, highlighting how they can maximise their impact and increase inclusion.

As we all know, climate change is happening now. And the impacts of climate change are most intensely felt at the local

level. Local voices make the climate crisis real to decision makers and to the states party to the UNFCCC.

It is communities who were most effected by a recent storm which ravaged parts of the North East of Scotland: Businesses affected, homes devastated, lives upended.

It is vulnerable people, those without fixed tenure and those living in care homes who were affected by the heatwaves this summer.

It is those who have done the least to contribute to climate change who are most affected by its adverse impacts.

In the context of the discussion today, I'm sure that we will speak about ambitious emissions reduction targets and we cannot lose sight of this as it remains the most important collective act we can take.

In Scotland we are committed to reaching net-zero by 2045 and we are already half way there.

However, I'd like to use this opportunity to shine the spotlight on an area of the climate agenda that is often waiting in the wings, namely that of climate adaptation and building resilience.

Because the need to adapt is felt most by those at the local level and there needs to be continued dialogue at multiple levels: from communities, to localities, regions, and national and devolved governments.

Localities can often act in a more agile and targeted way than national governments and need to be supported to deliver climate action.

Next year we will publish our new National Adaptation Plan. This plan will recognise the importance of regions and local authorities in delivery resilience across Scotland.

It will cover 5 outcomes across nature, communities, public services, business and the economy and our international efforts.

With this upcoming Plan in mind, I'm keen to share a few examples of current multilevel action in Scotland:

 Our Regional Adaptation Partnerships are ramping up, with particular progress through Climate Ready Clyde in the Glasgow City Region and HighlandAdapts supporting adaptation in Scotland's most rural and sparsely populated Northern region.

These regional partnerships are proving an effective way of building an ecosystem of local authorities and public bodies to come together and deliver adaptation action in a way that is tailored to their region.

 The Scottish Government has facilitated a network of Climate Action Hubs to support communities to take forward climate action in their areas.

The network of hubs continues to support communities to come together and engage collectively on climate action, whilst supporting the transition to low carbon and climate resilient living

 The Scottish Government also continue to fund capacity building and advisory services for Local Authorities through our nation-wide 'Adaptation Scotland programme'.

This programme sees Local Authorities and other public bodies undertake an initial self-assessment of their current adaptation activities before undertaking a guided process to build capacity going forward.

These are just a few examples of adaptation action in practice but by no means does Scotland have all the answers and I'm looking forward to hearing the discussions and learning from colleagues about what we can be doing better.

We can agree that there is no room for complacency. We must build climate resilience at pace with our changing climate. Scotland will continue to be a strong international voice for subnational governments to influence the negotiations for further ambition on adaptation from the Global Goal on Adaptation to increased financing for Adaptation and Loss and Damage.

We know that the decisions we make today need to shape a more climate resilient tomorrow.

And that is why I come to you today offering our lived experience, as a nation, of how we are adapting Scotland to the changing global climate.

I would like to thank the High Level Champions for the opportunity to be here today and to reflect on Professor Huq's contribution to global action for climate justice. It is a genuine privilege to be asked to speak today about Saleem.

His legacy and impact at every COP to date make his absence all the more noticeable here in Dubai.

His tireless efforts have directly led to the tremendous progress made by the climate justice community. A community of which he was a founding member. Scottish Government officials often remarked that Saleem must have secretly cloned himself, because it was simply not possible for one human being to achieve all that he did in the time in a day.

And yet that is something I will personally remember him for – his generosity with his time.

He was always at the end of a call for advice - whether with myself, the First Minister, our Former First Minister or with officials – he made time for everyone equally and treated everyone equitably. He certainly lived by his principles.

He has been a great friend to Scotland, and a kind critic – guiding our loss and damage policies and programmes as we found our

way in a new landscape, prompting our ambition and holding us to account for our promises.

Many in this room and around the world have seen him as a mentor, and that is exactly what he was for Scotland – guiding our work and offering us the opportunity to learn from his experience.

His contributions were not always visible – a quiet conversation, or a well-timed email – but they leave an indelible imprint on the work and achievements that have been made on loss and damage to date.

He made us expect more of ourselves and do more than we expected.

I personally can think of no more fitting tribute to him than naming the UNFCCC Fund after him, both in recognition of his legacy, and as a symbolic reminder that Huq in many South Asian countries means 'Rights'.

Centring and cementing the principles of climate justice that Saleem championed and safeguarding the rights of climate-vulnerable communities around the world.

Focus: Decarbonisation of Energy Intensive Industries

Speaking Note: 692 Words 7 minutes

I would first like to thank you for inviting me to this event, it is a pleasure to speak to everyone here today.

A lot of discussion on the decarbonisation of energy is focussed on electrification and this is fine – but as we know, while we expect direct electrification to do the heavy lifting in decarbonising the energy system. We also must recognise the particular challenges faced by energy intensive industries in their decarbonisation journey – where for many industrial processes electrification is not a practical solution.

In Scotland a number of developers are coming forward to explore the use of different low-carbon fuels such as hydrogen to provide reliable high temperature heat to industry.

And Scottish Gas Networks our national gas transmission operator is installing 300 hydrogen ready boilers into homes in Scotland to demonstrate how the use of 100% green hydrogen (from offshore wind) to may help decarbonise some of our homes. This project is called H100 Fife and will go live next year and is one of the largest domestic trial of 100% hydrogen boilers in the world. A visitor centre is under construction just now and will be open next year so I would invite you to please come and see this for yourselves.

The global transition to net zero is hard, its challenging and no doubt will be difficult but we think that it can also offer enormous economic opportunities.

In Scotland we are taking a whole-systems approach as we move our plans forward.

As part of that approach we recently announced that we will develop a Green Industrial Strategy in the coming year to deliver on a commitment made in our National Strategy for Economic Transformation (NSET), and to sit alongside and support the development of our sectoral Just Transition Plans (JTPs).

The JTPs will set out our plans to secure a fair transition to net zero for specific high-emitting sectors of the economy, while the Green Industrial Strategy will focus on capturing for Scotland the economic benefits of the global transition to net zero.

Developing a Green Industrial Strategy is a signal that we are serious about capturing the economic benefits of the global transition to net zero, giving the private sector confidence to make decisions and invest in Scotland.

As an early adopter and supporter of hydrogen, Scotland is already taking an innovative lead, developing a strong track record of world-leading hydrogen demonstration projects.

Scotland is one of the few places where visitors can come and physically try out the refuelling of hydrogen vehicles and come and see hydrogen electrolyser systems working in situ.

Hydrogen isn't the only tool in the toolbox and we are also taking forward large scale plans for Carbon Capture, Utilisation and Storage (CCUS) as a route to decarbonise many of our key strategic and economically significant industries.

Combining that geological advantage with our existing oil and gas infrastructure and our expertise and world-class workforce, presents Scotland with the opportunity to be at the centre of a European hub for the importation and storage of CO2 from Europe.

International Collaboration

Our approach for the development of solutions to decarbonise industry is one that focuses on cooperation.

We are proud members of key European alliances such as the Vanguard Initiative, Hydrogen Europe's Regional Pillar, and we co-chair Europe's Under 2 Coalition. We have also signed a number of international agreements on hydrogen, including with Denmark, Occitania, and German states.

And we continue to seek new collaborations going forward.

Closing Remarks

In Scotland we take pride in being a trusted and reliable trading partner, and we aim to play a key role in contributing to the European, and global future energy supply.

International cooperation is key to unlocking the challenges we face to decarbonise energy intensive industry. To address our climate goals, we need global solutions, no one company, industry or government can achieve these alone.

By coming together to build strong relationships and robust plans we can accelerate the global transition to net zero, thereby helping to address the fundamental climate issues we are all focused on.

I look forward to the panel discussion today and hope you will enjoy this session.

The Global Renewables Centre (GRC)

- In 2022 the Global Renewables Centre (GRC) was launched at Sustainable Energy for All Global Forum in Kigali.
- The GRC aims to harnesses expertise from renewable energy experts in Scotland to share learning and support capacity building through a (mainly online) peer-to-peer technical support model in Malawi, Rwanda, and Zambia.
- The vision for the GRC is to facilitate knowledge exchange and support global citizenship that results in increased and improved use of renewables across the Scottish Government's African partner countries, in line with their national energy policies. Scottish Government International Development Fund In Country:

The Scottish Government have funded international development projects in Zambia since 2008. Following our 2016 consultation and new Strategy, we established a dedicated **Zambia Development Programme**.

- Through our Zambia Development Programme, we have been supporting six projects in Central Province covering Health, Education, Sustainable Economic Development, and Agriculture with total funding of over £6M between 2017 and 2022 (with two extended to 2023).

Annex A Notes on IDRIC

The UK's **Industrial Decarbonisation Research and Innovation Centre (IDRIC)**, hosted by Heriot Watt, is spearheading the development of innovative solutions to decarbonise energy intensive industries. Collaborating with research organisations, industry, government, policymakers, NGOs, trade organisations and the public, IDRIC is co-creating whole-system, multidisciplinary solutions that are accelerating the green futures of our industries. As well as providing critical research expertise, IDRIC's convening power is adding value by building cross-sector stakeholder collaborations, as well as synthesising key insights to address real world challenges associated with the industrial transition.

Top priorities identified by IDRIC to date include development of international standards for green products, mechanisms to measure progress for reduction of GHG emissions as well as to involve emerging economies in early stages along the innovation value chain. Scotland, Heriot-Watt University and IDRIC aim to strengthen mechanisms for sharing knowledge and experience in different situations globally, to prevent duplication of effort, speed up work, and support the development of new clusters.

ANNEX B [redacted s.29(1)(d)]

1. Heriot Watt University (HWU) - online MBAs for Women in Zambia

The 'Scottish Government and Edinburgh Business School Scholarship for Women in Zambia' scheme began in 2019 as a partnership between Heriot-Watt University (HWU) and the Scottish Government which aimed to address the gender gap in MBA learning for women in Zambia through a scholarship initiative. The initiative received over 230 applications and in December 2019/20 fully funded online learning places were awarded for Edinburgh Business School's Master of Business Administration (MBA) programme. From the first cohort of 20 learners, 15 have graduated with two more students on track to complete their studies over the next six months.

Officials from the SG International Development team have been in touch with senior officials from the Zambian Ministry of Education in recent weeks, who have confirmed that Zambia's leadership have been delighted with the previous success of this scheme and confirmed Heriot-Watt University's claim that the programme has previously enabled Zambian women to take senior leadership roles in Zambia's banking and telecomms industries.

Building on the success of the first phase in Zambia, HWU has proposed delivering a second cohort of fully funded MBA Scholarships for women in Zambia, on the basis of a £150K contribution from the Scottish Government this financial year, which will be matched by HWU. In total, the second phase of additional funding will support an additional 30 full funded Scholarships, with scholars starting their studies in March

2024. HWU is mobilised to announce and open applications as soon as possible and in line with the Scottish Governments defined terms.

Mwenya Likulunga, a recent MBA graduate from the scheme, is now a leader within the Zambian Telecomms Industry working at one of the country's leading internet providers. The practical knowledge acquired through the Scholarship opportunity has had a positive impact in not only her professional working life but has facilitated her venture into entrepreneurship where she has now founded a neurodiversity awareness initiative, one of the first in the region.

Her current role includes supporting the development of technological solutions to tackle the adverse impact of Climate Change and the development of smart solutions centred around "Internet of Things", including the deployment of technology that supports sustainable agricultural practices, the adoption of renewable energy sources, and the use of data analytics for climate predictions.

Biographies

Razan Al Mubarak, UAE, President of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) and UN Climate Change High-Level Champion

Razan Al Mubarak is the UN Climate Change High-Level Champion from the COP28 Presidency and President of the IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature) a membership union of government and civil society organisations. She has an academic background in international relations and environmental studies, bringing an extensive technical and executive expertise to the UN Climate Change High-Level Champion role. Razan was present at COP27, at NYCW and there will be a fantastic opportunity to network with her during this event.



Governor Mauricio Vila Dosal, State of Yucatan, Mexico

Mauricio Vila took office as Governor of the State of Yucatan on October 1, 2018, after serving as Mayor of Merida between 2015-2018. Governor Dosal has been voted as the best Governor in Mexico, in the 2022 survey. He has been one of the most influential leaders for showing trajectory and contributing to the state and the citizens of Yucatan. Speaking note:

Good evening. I'd like to start by saying thank you to our hosts Regions4 for giving me the opportunity to meet with all of you today and speak at this event

We are gathered here almost a year to the day since the COP15 UN Convention on Biodiversity met in Montreal. That conference saw the adoption of the Global Biodiversity Framework, setting out targets for urgent action over this decade to 2030.

I hope that in years to come, as we meet again to take stock of what we have achieved, and what still needs to be done, we can look back at the adoption of that Framework as the moment the world turned the corner on biodiversity loss.

I hope too, that we can look back with pride at the leadership shown by states and regions both in the development and the delivery of the framework.

In developing it, the Edinburgh Declaration was so important in ensuring that the voices of subnational governments were heard during COP15 and beyond. The commitment and ambition shown by the 300-plus signatories to the Declaration was too powerful for the State Parties to ignore. Regions4 members were key to this.

And in delivering it, I am delighted that a renewed Plan of Action on subnational governments was agreed alongside the Biodiversity Framework. State, regional and local authorities, including cities, have a crucial role to play in translating global and national strategies into real and tangible local actions.

Often the resources to put in place transformative actions for nature – money, people, and infrastructure – are directed at these levels but may not always be recognised, nor properly utilised, by national governments. We know that State Parties cannot meet these targets alone - it will take a whole-of-government, whole-of-society approach.

We will build upon the legacy of state and regional leadership by working closely with key international partners including through: our membership of the Convention on Biological Diversity's Advisory Committee on Subnational Governments; the High Ambition Coalition for 30x30's Subnational Taskforce; and the RegionsWithNature platform.

The Scottish Government is very clear in our priorities, that we are facing **twin** crises of climate change and biodiversity loss. We are equally clear in our commitment to a global transition to a net zero and resilient future that addresses both crises.

That is why our ambitious new biodiversity strategy sets out goals to halt nature loss by 2030 and reverse it by 2045.

We are committed to expanding and improving areas managed for nature, including protected areas, with an ambitious commitment to protect 30% of our land for nature by 2030.

We must recognise the points at which climate, biodiversity, and development challenges intersect, and require solutions that benefit and enrich the lives of local populations.

In Scotland one of those points of intersection is on peatlands which cover over 2 million hectares (or 25%) of our land area and are of national and global significance.

In good condition, peatlands provide multiple benefits: capturing and storing carbon, supporting nature, reducing flood risk, improving water quality and providing places that can support physical and mental wellbeing.

Caring for our peatlands through protection, management and restoration is critical to mitigating and adapting to the linked climate and nature emergencies and achieving a Just Transition to net zero.

We are achieving this by weaving peatlands through our agricultural reform process, and ensuring that our investment into restoring peatlands supports good green jobs in the rural economy.

It would be remiss of me not to mention Loss and Damage at this point – given the attention it is receiving at this year's COP. When it comes to biodiversity loss, as with so many other aspects of the climate and nature crises, those who are the least responsible are often the ones who suffer most.

This is why Scotland recognises the twin crises of climate change and biodiversity as issues that must and **can** be tackled together. One of the ways we seek to do this, is through Non-Economic Loss and Damage funding, which the First Minister announced a £5 million contribution towards at COP27.

I have already outlined my hopes, that we will one day be able to look back at these critical years, and be grateful that we took action when it needed to be taken. I am sure, that you all share that hope with me.

I would like to ask you to raise a glass to toast the cooperation and leadership shown by non-party states and regions, that led to crucial interventions such as the Edinburgh Declaration, the Global Biodiversity Strategy, and our renewed subnational Plan of Action. May we continue to strive for greater ambition, and greater cooperation, and greater action. As we say in Scotland, Slainte Mhath (*Pronounced Slanj-a-va*). Cheers.
