Support for Ukraine – Ivan Tukalo, Finaly Calder, Colin Deans and Gordon Hunter

- I understand that you have already donated vehicles and other supplies to the people of Ukraine and plan to do so later this year – fascinated to hear more about the project and your previous trip?
- I am looking forward to seeing the video which you made and wish you well for your second trip.

Scottish Rugby and Ukraine

- I am aware that Edinburgh Rugby provided 1500 tickets for Ukrainian refugees in 2022 for the Edinburgh v Glasgow match which took place at Murrayfield.

Scottish Government Support to Ukraine

- Since the war against Ukraine began over 25,000 people sponsored by an individual in Scotland or the Scottish Government have arrived in the UK.
- We are investing over £70 million in 2023/24 in the Ukrainian Resettlement programme to ensure people continue to receive a Warm Scots Welcome and are supported to rebuild their lives in our communities for as long as need to call Scotland home.
- The current number of displaced people from Ukraine in welcome accommodation has more than halved since November 2022.

On Alcohol Advertising Ban

- Ministers have asked officials to go back to the drawing board on potential proposals to restrict alcohol advertising and promotion.
- We all want to reduce the harm that is caused by alcohol, particularly to young people.
- We know that young people seeing alcohol marketing is associated with them starting to drink alcohol or drinking more alcohol.
- We must ensure we prevent alcohol harms without undermining Scotland's world-class drinks industry or tourism sector.
- I am hopeful that, by taking a fresh look at the issue, we can find a way forward that achieves both those crucial aims.

- We will be reflecting on the feedback we received from stakeholders during the recent Ministerial roundtables and will analyse the public consultation responses to understand the views and perspectives of those that responded.
- No decisions have been taken on scope or on the type of restrictions that might be taken forward in future.
- In recognition of the wide range of potential impacts raised by the consultation, the then Minister for Public Health held a series of roundtables with key stakeholders, including representatives from the alcohol, retail and advertising industries, to hear directly from them.
- Further consultation and engagement with public health stakeholders and businesses will take place as our work progresses.
- We consulted on restricting alcohol advertising and promotion to protect vulnerable groups, including children and young people and those in recovery. These groups have told us directly that they see a lot of alcohol advertising and promotion and want us to restrict this.
- Alcohol marketing is seen by, and appealing to, large volumes of children and young people.
- International evidence shows that seeing alcohol marketing is associated with an increased likelihood that children and young people will start to drink alcohol or, if they already drink alcohol, drink more. This is harmful to them in both the short and long term.

On Transgender Guidance

- The Scottish Government and the UK Sports Councils passionately believe that sport is for everyone. We should all feel included, and able to take part and access the benefits of sport.
- An ongoing priority for the Scottish Government is to support participation across all groups and tackle inequalities in participation.
- Sports are incredibly diverse and there can be no one-size fits all approach with inclusion. There may need to be different solutions for different sports, which is why the Guidance encourages sports to consider options to balance fairness, safety and inclusion.
- Where possible the Sports Councils encourage sports to be creative, flexible, and accommodating in their approaches, developing meaningful inclusion policies that consider the needs of all groups – and be transparent in their decision-making.

On Concussion

- All Brain injuries need to be taken seriously can be quite difficult to diagnose, even by experienced healthcare professionals. There is no simple test.
- We are committed to increasing the opportunities for people to play sport and be active. At the same time, the safety and wellbeing of all who participate is paramount and that's why we're reminding coaches, players and spectators that all concussions are serious.
- The overarching message remains the same: all concussions are serious - if in doubt, sit them out.

On Scottish Rugby's "Tell Us"

- The Scottish Government is absolutely clear that there is no place for racism or discrimination of any kind in sport, or wider society – whether it is racism, misogyny, or homophobia. Absolutely no one should have to suffer abuse.

- The Scottish Government welcomes sportscotland's new partnership with the UK-wide race discrimination charity, Sporting Equals, as part of an ongoing commitment to tackling race inequality in sport and physical activity
- We must apply lessons learned from the recent review into institutionalised racism in Cricket Scotland throughout Scotland's sporting system. Scottish Governing Bodies of Sport (SGBs) should work with sportscotland to continue development and progress across their anti-racism and EDI strategy.
- The Scottish Government are committed to tackling the behaviour that stems from systemic, deep rooted women's inequality which leads to violent and abusive behaviour by men directed at women and girls precisely because they are women and girls.
- Sport has a very special place in our society, which is why it is vital that relevant authorities and clubs ensure that they and their players are positive role models for children and adults across the country.
- The Scottish Government has taken robust action to tackle sexual offending – improving our laws, including domestic abuse, stalking, sexual harassment, threatening or abusive behaviour.
- We have modernised the law on sexual offences encouraging more victims of recent and historical cases to come forward and improving support.
- sportscotland invests in 48 SGBs, all of which must be compliant with the Standards for Child Wellbeing and Protection in Sport, which is a condition of investment. Compliance with the Standards is managed, monitored and reviewed by Children 1st.
- The process is currently being reviewed with a view to putting in place a more qualitative assessment framework to further assess both the implementation of the Standards by SGBs and the associated outcomes. They will work with the SGB to embed the criteria and expand their practice for SGB activities and that of their clubs.

UKRAINE

The Scottish Government condemns Russia's illegal war against Ukraine and is shocked and appalled at the violence and humanitarian crisis this has caused.

- Scotland stands for democracy, human rights and the rule of law at home and abroad. Scotland offers its unqualified support for Ukrainian sovereignty, independence and territorial integrity.
- We all wish a speedy victory for Ukraine and a resolution which restores peace and ensures Ukrainian sovereignty, democracy, independence and territorial integrity.
- Providing support and sanctuary for displaced people from Ukraine will continue to be a priority for the Scottish Government.

Since the war against Ukraine began over 25,000 people sponsored by an individual in Scotland or the Scottish Government have arrived in the UK.

- The Super Sponsor Scheme has been overwhelmingly popular, with local authorities, the third sector and local communities responding in partnership.
- Over 20,000 of these arrivals are through the Scottish Government's successful Super Sponsor Scheme.
- I am proud of how Scotland has responded to this humanitarian crisis and grateful to all of those who have opened up their home to displaced Ukrainians fleeing the war.

UKRAINIAN RESETTLEMENT PROGRAMME

We are investing over £70 million in 2023/24 in the Ukrainian Resettlement programme to ensure people continue to receive a Warm Scots Welcome and are supported to rebuild their lives in our communities for as long as need to call Scotland home.

- We will continue to build on the significant funding of around £200 million we have provided to support resettlement in 2022-23.
- In November 2022, the Minister published the results of a review of the Super Sponsor scheme with a focus on longer-term sustainable accommodation.
- Our priority is supporting people displaced from Ukraine to rebuild their lives here, securing jobs and accessing public services including the benefits they are entitled to, and helping them secure longer-term accommodation.

WELCOME ACCOMMODATION

The current number of displaced people from Ukraine in welcome accommodation has more than halved since November 2022.

- Our priority is to support everyone who remains in welcome accommodation to access longer-term housing and ensure new arrivals can be safely accommodated.
- Almost 1,200 long-term homes are being brought back into use for those fleeing war in Ukraine from our Longer-Term Resettlement Fund, which is making up to £50 million available to Local Authorities and Registered Social Landlords to improve empty and unused properties.

- The safe disembarkation of the MS Victoria in Edinburgh was completed ahead of the contract end on 11 July, with all guests supported into onward accommodation where required.
- All guests disembarked MS Ambition in Glasgow before the end of March and were supported where necessary into alternative accommodation.
- We continue to work closely with local authorities to help displaced people secure longer-term housing, including making full use of existing and new volunteer hosts, social housing and supporting access to viable private rental options.

LONGER-TERM RESETTLEMENT FUND

The Scottish Government's £50 million Ukraine Longer-term Resettlement Fund (ULTRF) is funding the improvement of 1168 void properties for rehousing UDPs across Scotland.

- On 22 September 2022, we launched the £50 million Ukraine Longer-Term Resettlement Fund (ULTRF) to bring Local Authority (LA) and Registered Social Landlord (RSL) empty properties back into use that would otherwise not have been available for let.
- The homes provided will be good quality affordable homes and will be available to rent for up to three years, after which some will continue to be available as social rented homes.
- To date, the Fund has allocated nearly £23m (£22.887m) through 14 approved capital projects across Scotland, bringing 1168 homes back into use.
- Almost 1,000 (945) Ukrainian people are already living in 450 of these refurbished homes whilst a further 225 homes have been completed and are in the process of being tenanted.
- There remains a healthy pipeline of applications and expressions of interest and with the Fund still open, we continue to encourage Councils and housing associations to submit their applications given the continuing demand for longer-term settled accommodation.

HUMANITARIAN AID AND FUNDING SUPPORT

The Scottish Government committed to over £5 million in humanitarian aid to help provide basic humanitarian assistance, including in health, water and sanitation, and shelter for those fleeing Ukraine to neighbouring countries.

- The Scottish Government has committed to over £4 million in humanitarian aid to help provide basic humanitarian assistance, including in health, water and sanitation, and shelter for those fleeing Ukraine.
- This included an immediate response of £4M. Of this: we contributed £2M to the Disasters Emergency Committee Ukraine Humanitarian Appeal; the British Red Cross and SCIAF each received £500,000; and we awarded £1M to UNICEF.
- In February 2023, we committed to provide a further £1M focusing on cold weather resilience and recovery. We have also committed to provide funding of £300,000 to Scottish-based demining charity The HALO Trust.
- In addition to this financial support, the Scottish Government has also sent 5 consignments of medical supplies to Poland for onward transport to Ukraine, totalling 156 pallets worth almost £3M.

UK GOVERNMENT FUNDING

We continue to press the UK Government over their decision to cut tariff funding for year 2, remove it for year 3 and to scrap the education tariff.

- While we welcome confirmation of Scotland's allocation of £30m from the £150 million UK-wide fund to help support Ukrainians into settled housing, this cash was originally announced in December 2022 and coincided with significant cuts to the tariff funding that local authorities receive from UK-government to provide services to people displaced from Ukraine.
- The decision to deviate from a traditional Year 2 tariff to support Ukrainians arriving in our nations will have a disproportionate effect in Scotland and Wales due to our larger share of arrivals.
- Whilst we welcome the additional payments to volunteer hosts (for those whose guests who have been in the UK for more than 12 months the payment increases from £350 to £500 per month), it is vital that all volunteer hosts should receive the uplift now to meet the increasing cost of living.

LOCAL AUTHORITIES

Local Authorities with more concentrated urban-based welcome accommodation are experiencing greatest pressures as people want to live in areas with existing Ukrainian communities and a wider range of employment opportunities.

- In 2023-24 we have made £3.2 million available to support local authority resettlement teams.
- This builds on the £11.2 million provided last year to increase the capacity of local authority resettlement teams, support refurbishment of properties, and enhance the pace of host checks and matching.
- In 2022-23 we also reimbursed local authorities for all costs associated with welcome activities.
- We continue to work closely with Local Authorities to maximise planned re-settlement activity including making full use of existing and new volunteer hosts, social housing and supporting access to viable private rental options.

HOST ARRANGEMENTS

The Scottish Government is extremely thankful for the generosity of everyone across Scotland who has expressed an interest in hosting or offered their support to people displaced by the war against Ukraine.

- On 28 November 2022, we launched a new campaign for volunteer hosts, specifically for Scotland, which included a new simplified online application portal. By the end of June 2023, a total of 665 prospective hosts had submitted offers to host.
- Our Scotland-specific campaign provides a simplified application process, clearer information on what to expect as a volunteer host, and sources of support. It can be accessed directly, or via the UK Government's 'Expression of Interest' pages.
- We are working closely with Local Authorities to progress checks on all prospective hosts in a timely manner and make homes available to displaced people.

BACKGROUND

WAR IN UKRAINE

- Russia invaded Ukraine on 24 February 2022 and has since concentrated its activity in eastern and southern Ukraine.
- Fighting remains fierce across the front line, with Ukraine's counter-offensive making slow but steady progress. Russia continues to shell civilian infrastructure, including Odesa's grain storage facilities after Putin withdrew from the grain deal, harming food supply to some of the world's poorest regions.
- NATO and other aligned countries continue to supply Ukraine with lethal aid and other support. Zelenskyy has successfully pushed the west to increase the volume and effectiveness of this support, with the UK supplying long-range missiles that can degrade Russia's supply, command and control infrastructure far behind the front line, and Ukrainian pilots are currently being trained in F16 fighters. But Ukraine continues to call for more and more sophisticated weaponry as losses mount in a grinding counter-offensive.
- Ukraine expressed some frustration at a lack of clarity around its NATO accession perspective, with the recent Vilnius summit failing to give a clear path to accession. Biden has however been clear that he wants Ukraine in NATO as soon as the war is over.
- During a debate on 23 February 2023, the Scottish Parliament reiterated its unqualified support for Ukrainian sovereignty, democracy independence and territorial integrity. It also acknowledged and celebrated the contribution displaced people from Ukraine make to Scotland and declare unequivocally that all Ukrainians who have made Scotland their temporary home will be welcome as long as they need.

SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSE

- Since the war against Ukraine began over 25,300 people sponsored by an individual in Scotland or the Scottish Government have arrived in the UK. Over 20,200 of these arrivals are through the Scottish Government's successful Super Sponsor Scheme.
- The Scottish Government committed to over £5 million in humanitarian aid to help provide basic humanitarian assistance, including in health, water and sanitation, and shelter for those fleeing Ukraine to neighbouring countries.
- This included an immediate response of £4M and in February 2023, we committed to provide a further £1M focusing on cold weather resilience and recovery. We have also committed to provide funding of £300,000 to Scottish-based demining charity The HALO Trust.
- In addition to this financial support, the Scottish Government has also sent 5 consignments of medical supplies to Poland for onward transport to Ukraine, totalling 156 pallets worth almost £3M.

BACKGROUND - RUGBY

1. Scottish Rugby is the governing body for Rugby Union in Scotland. Its role and purpose are to grow the game and inspire Scotland through rugby.
2. Scottish Rugby administers Scotland's International Rugby Teams, the country's two professional clubs (Edinburgh Rugby and Glasgow Warriors) as well as the domestic fixtures for clubs and schools across Scotland.
3. The men's national team is the principal driver for Scottish Rugby revenues, which are then invested in the activities of the governing body. This includes investment in two professional teams, the regional academies, growth and development of the women's game and the regional/local development infrastructure.

Alcohol Advertising Ban Consultation

4. Research has consistently shown that exposure to marketing is associated with an increased likelihood that children will start to drink or – if they already drink – drink more. This is endorsed by the World Health Organization.
5. Alcohol-related harm is one of the most pressing public health challenges that we face in Scotland. An average of 700 people are hospitalised and 24 people die each week from illnesses caused directly by drinking alcohol.
6. Restricting alcohol advertising and promotion is one of the World Health Organization's three best buys to reduce alcohol-related harms.
7. Emerging evidence sets out that those who are in recovery find alcohol marketing triggering and take action to avoid seeing this due to the appeal it has for them. This can be a barrier to their successful recovery.
8. The consultation meets our PfG commitment 2022/23 to “consult on proposals to restrict alcohol advertising and promotion later this year and, subject to the outcomes of the consultation, introduce legislation within the lifetime of this parliament.”
9. In 2019, we asked Young Scot to facilitate a project with young people to report on their experiences of alcohol marketing and any actions required.
10. We asked the Scottish Youth Parliament to run a workshop in March 2022 to give MSYPs an opportunity to have their say on alcohol marketing in Scotland and discuss potential restrictions.
11. Several other European countries have implemented mandatory restrictions on alcohol marketing and the UK is lagging behind in this area.

Transgender Guidance

12. Scottish Rugby has amended the eligibility criteria in its existing Gender Participation Policy which will be applied from 1 February 2023. The amended policy now aligns with the already published positions of other rugby union

governing bodies in the UK and Ireland which follow guidance from World Rugby and the Sports Councils' Equality Group (SCEG).

13. This Guidance is consistent with the International Olympic Committee Framework on Fairness, Inclusion and Non-Discrimination on the Basis of Gender Identity and Sex Variations which sets out the framework for transgender inclusion for elite sport globally.
14. Scottish Rugby undertook a period of consultation to fully consider the impact of such changes with those affected and will continue to engage and provide support going forward. We are aware LEAP Sport Scotland and Scottish Rugby transgender participants were included during the consultation period.
15. Scottish Rugby's updated policy means contact rugby for players in the women's category is limited to those whose sex was recorded as female at birth. The policy does not apply to non-contact forms of the game, such as Tartan Touch.
16. Previously, transgender women could participate in the women's game in Scotland depending on the outcome of a thorough medical process including testosterone tests prior to registration to play.
17. Transgender men may continue to play contact rugby in the men's category provided a risk assessment has been undertaken by the club in which the player is registered, and the outcome logged with Scottish Rugby.
18. Scottish Rugby have confirmed the policy will be reviewed on, at least, an annual basis and in light of any new scientific data and research becoming available in the future.

Concussion Protocols

19. In 2015, in a world first, medics, sports, Scottish Government and sportscotland, came together to produce a single concussion policy for all sports. An updated version was published in 2018.
20. Concussion understanding has progressed rapidly in the past decade, but there remain many unknowns – in particular about the medium and long term consequences of repeated poorly managed concussions.
21. Scottish Guidelines were developed by a team of experts including Scottish Rugby, Scottish Football Association, Universities of Edinburgh, Glasgow and Stirling, the Camanachd Association and the sportscotland institute of sport.
22. The advice is that, like any other injury, the brain needs to rehabilitate rather than rest. A concussed brain should be challenged in controlled stepwise increases in function to rehabilitate it back to a normal life of work or school as the first priority, and then again stepwise increases in physical activity to get back to sport.
23. Young developing brains need slower rehabilitation and hence the minimum times for return to sport are different for adults, adolescents and children.

24. SRU is in the process of updating the Player Welfare Strategy, it includes significant support for mental wellbeing across the pathway - launch 2023.
25. Tackle height – aimed at reducing risk of concussion. RFU has banned above waist tackles in the amateur game in England, there is no update on the SRU's plans to follow.

SRU 'Tell Us'

26. Scottish Rugby have launched an email support resource called 'Tell Us' to encourage members of the game to raise concerns relating to incidents of sexism, misogyny, homophobia or racism.
27. 'Tell Us' went live on 07 February 2023 in recognition of recent concerns raised by players in the community game relating to discrimination in their local playing environments.
28. The service will sit alongside existing support channels covered by Scottish Rugby's regional teams, respective club and school's own management structures and sport's existing disciplinary process underwritten by its Code of Conduct.
29. The dedicated and confidential inbox will be monitored on a daily basis, with submissions delegated to experienced representatives of Scottish Rugby's Rugby Development dept, disciplinary and safeguarding teams, depending on the level of support and action required.
30. 'Tell Us' will allow clubs and people connected to the game to have a voice with the knowledge that they will be supported, their concerns will be handled sensitively, investigated when appropriate and addressed for the benefit of all involved and the wider game.
31. 'Tell Us' will also support the welcome and positive growth of clubs offering women and girls' opportunities in the last three seasons which has risen from 8 playing centres to 90.
32. Liberton RFC is facing allegations of racism, misogyny and homophobia after cutting its women's team. Liberton RFC's female players have criticised the club's committee after it said it could no longer accommodate the "additional needs" of the squad.
33. The women's team claimed the requirements were those of a coach and an administrator to take on tasks that had previously been completed by team members. Players also accused the Liberton RFC committee of "decaying" their relationship over time by failing to resolve any issues raised appropriately.
34. Players suggested the committee hire a club welfare representative, in an effort to remedy building tensions before the disbanding. However, it is claimed that was met with "significant resistance".
35. The women have asked the Scottish Rugby Union and World Rugby for support. Scottish Rugby has been in recent and regular contact with Liberton FP RFC and is aware of the issues being raised by the women's team.

sportscotland Investment

36. sportscotland's investment supports a wide range of Scottish Rugby's activity that encourages and supports people to participate in rugby, including both club and coach development.

37. sportscotland investment in 2022-23 is £708,600.

38. sportscotland's investment into Scottish Rugby since 2017-18:

39. Since 2014-15, sportscotland has invested over £5 million, across 36 rugby projects, through its Sports Facility Fund. With partner contributions, the total invested (projects in receipt of sportscotland funding) in rugby facility infrastructure is over £24.5 million.

40. Direct Club Investment (DCI) offers investment to support club development over a period of 2-4 years, giving the club time to embed significant developmental change.

41. Over £553,000 invested by sportscotland into 19 rugby clubs, since 2013, through DCI.

Cashback

42. Scottish Rugby have been a Cashback for Communities partner since 2012/13 and have spent £5,597,216 on their Cashback projects up to 2022/23.
