UPDATED: PROGRAMME AND COSTING OPTIONS FOR PROPOSED FM VISIT TO ZAMBIA/ MALAWI IN OCTOBER 2025

Priority and Purpose

1. First Minister has requested that plans be taken forward for a visit during the second week of October recess (14-21 October) and that officials provide a high level programme, and advice on potential impact of the Malawi elections for a visit.
2. This submission therefore outlines the proposed visit to Malawi and Zambia in October 2025. The submission aims to provide advice on election impact risks in particular, and if FM is content then he is invited to comment in due course on the high level programme set out in **Annex A**.

Recommendation

3. Given timescales until the possible visit, officials would be grateful for an indication **immediately** of whether the proposed visit is workable within the context of existing FM commitments, noting the recommendation to visit Malawi and Zambia on the provisional dates of:
 - Flying out Tuesday 14 October;
 - Lusaka, Zambia 15-17 October;
 - Lilongwe, Malawi 17 October;
 - travel to Blantyre, Malawi 18 October, visiting projects en route;
 - Blantyre, 19-20 October; and flying back 20 October, home by Tuesday 22nd.
4. Thereafter, First Minister is also asked to confirm agreement with party size (ten supporting officials, increased by two to this time include an additional comms official and one Visits and Events official), and is also invited to comment on the high level programme.

Summary

5. Officials consider that, despite a challenging timeline, **a strong programme to Malawi / Zambia could be delivered during 14-21 October**. The draft itinerary is set out at **Annex A**, however with reference to an October visit, it should be noted in terms of positive engagement opportunities around those dates:
 - **Police Scotland** will have a deployment in Zambia during the time of the visit, delivering sexual offences liaison officer training, allowing FM to see the Police peer-peer partnership working in person;
 - our **Women and Girls Fund** has awarded the first set of grants to Women and Girl led Organisations advocating on a range of gender equality issues. FM will have the opportunity to meet some of these organisations at the roundtable on gender equality in Zambia;
 - the **new dental school in Blantyre, Malawi**, is now under construction, and on the radar of Malawi's Minister for Higher Education: partners will be available to organise

- an interesting site visit; the first cohort of home-grown Malawi dental students, funded by SG, graduated earlier this year;
- **Glasgow University** will have one of their Vice Principals visiting Malawi as part of a senior delegation in October – this is relevant for key projects that FM would visit in Blantyre, Malawi.
6. **The caveat to the visit remains the potential impact of the Malawi elections, which took place on 16 September. The key date for any challenge to the result is Wednesday 24th September, which is the last date for the Electoral Commission to declare the winner of the election.** However, it appears that voting went relatively smoothly and final counting remains underway as at today (Friday 19th). Early results point to victory for former President Mutharika without requiring a run off. We will have the final indication of this on Monday 22nd September, but locally it seems that Malawians believe this will not change. If that is the case, we would expect that the inauguration of Prof Peter Mutharika as President will take place sometime around 28-30th September.
 7. Otherwise, delivery risks for this visit are set out in paragraphs 24-26.
 8. Finally, for awareness, FCDO Malawi have expressed a preference for w/c 20th October for the visit, if possible, for logistical reasons at their side, but we are aware that this would not suit FM.

Context

9. FM has requested officials provide advice on a visit to Zambia and Malawi, following the planned visit for August 2024 that was postponed. Previous advice was that 2025 provides an ideal opportunity for an FM visit, in particular to mark the 20th anniversary of the Scottish Government's international development work, which commenced in Malawi in 2005. The last FM visit to Malawi was that carried out by Jack McConnell in 2005, and there has not yet been an FM visit to Zambia despite having a programme there since 2008. The short visit proposed maintains FM's preference for prioritising diplomatic engagement and promoting innovative partnerships.
10. A draft itinerary is outlined in **Annex A**. We are also looking at the possibility, however, of visiting Malawi first and then Zambia, to fit with better availability of UKG FCDO in the earlier part of the week. If the visit is to proceed, we will work with the Malawi and Zambian Governments, and with UKG Malawi and Zambia, to determine which is the most convenient, cost-effective and impactful of the itineraries.
11. It should be noted that we are yet to discuss the visit fully with both the Governments of Malawi and Zambia, with FCDO and with our implementing partners. At this point we have simply tested dates with FCDO, given that this is key to obtain FM's views.

13. Finally, on wider context, if former President Mutharika does win the election as is currently expected locally in Malawi, it should be noted that during his last Presidency (2014-2020) HE Mutharika visited Scotland in April 2018, signing the current Scottish Government / Malawi Government Global Goals Partnership Agreement with former FM Nicola Sturgeon. He therefore knows the Malawi-Scotland relationship well.

Recommended programme

14. The recommended programme is to undertake the visit from 14 October – 21 October with ten supporting officials. These dates provide the best opportunity for the visit during the October recess, taking into consideration other engagements including SNP Annual National Conference (11-13 October) and DFM visit to Canada and preparations for the upcoming COP30 in Brazil.
15. The programme plan is suggested to be:
 - a. Zambia (Lusaka) – 2.5 days
 - b. Malawi (Lilongwe) – 0.5 day
 - c. Malawi (Blantyre) – 3 days (Lilongwe-Blantyre travel within that).

All in, this will be 7 days, which includes two travel days, further detail is in **Annex A**.

(a) Party size

16. In terms of party size, officials advise remains that a core group of ten officials is required for successful visit delivery: 1x SpAd, 1x Private Secretary, 2x Comms, [redacted – s.39], 3x policy officials. The policy officials will work to ensure there as advance party support for logistics, alongside V&E, throughout the programme and to provide sufficient thematic policy support, given the breadth of the programme.
17. Expected estimated costs total around £40,305 (please refer to **Annex A** for a full itemised breakdown of expected costs). To note that subsistence rates are minimal with day rates of £6.69 in Malawi and £8.85 in Zambia and have not been included in this calculation.

 - c) **Visit objectives:** the draft programme will deliver on objectives in terms of prioritising diplomatic engagement and promoting innovative partnerships under both the International Development and Climate Justice Communities programmes, subject to partner availability.
 - d) **Party:** to maximise impact, the delegation includes: a SpAd who, along with other senior officials on the visit, could undertake senior official level meetings in the margins of FM activity to drive forward diplomatic objectives and collaboration critical to the roll out of high-profile International Development programming; and 2 comms officials (see paras 29-30).

- engage with partner country governments, FCDO, and delivery partners to make necessary diplomatic and logistical arrangements; and
- work to develop a more detailed visit itinerary for FM's consideration, engaging comms officials and SpAds accordingly.

DRAFT VISIT PROGRAMME

The below draft visit programme suggests activity in line with FM's stated visit objectives of diplomatic engagement and strengthening partnerships between Scotland and Malawi and Scotland and Zambia in the 20th anniversary of our international development programme; engaging with partner countries and listen to their voices on key Global South challenges including education and health systems, women's rights, climate justice and debt justice; and to see first-hand the impact of Scottish government support from past projects. The programme also seeks to deliver on current programming oversight objectives and provides opportunities for announcements.

The programme has been designed to cover the Scottish Government's dual overseas aid investment portfolios through our: International Development Fund ("IDF") health, education, equalities and civil society programmes; and Climate Justice Fund ("CJF") Climate Just Communities programmes.

A finalised programme will be shared with FM for comment if he is content to undertake the visit. Our recommendation, however, for this visit is a programme which consists of a commitment of 7 days (2 of those being travel days), with the:

- First leg of the visit in Zambia (Lusaka) – 2.5 days
- Second leg of the visit in Malawi (Lilongwe) – 0.5 day
- Third leg of the visit in Malawi (Blantyre) – 3 days (Lilongwe-Blantyre travel within that).

Day 1 – Tuesday 14 October – Travel to Lusaka, Zambia

Depart Edinburgh: 14:10 (via LHR-NBO-LUN, [redacted – s.30])

Day 2 – Wednesday 21 October – Lusaka, Zambia – International Diplomacy and Health Focus

- **Arrival in Lusaka: 09:10**
- **FCDO Briefing**

- **Site visits to: (a) University of Zambia Laboratory:** Presidential bilateral at the IDF £1m research laboratory funded by Scottish Government, with the possibility of mobilising senior engagement from the University of Glasgow; (b) followed by an event at **University Teaching Hospital Lusaka**, with KidsOR. Day 3 – Thursday 16 October – Lusaka, Zambia – Gender, Equalities and Climate change / Climate Justice Focus

Opportunity to listen to global south voices on gender dynamics and participatory approaches to international development as well as discussing Scottish Government programming in this space. - **Police Scotland partnership with Zambia**, under our IDF Equalities Programme: engagement with Zambian Police Force services to discuss their work in tackling

violence against women and children, addressing the acute impacts of gender inequality. **Police Scotland** will have a deployment in Zambia during the time of the visit, delivering sexual offences liaison officer training, allowing FM to see the Police peer-peer partnership working in person; possibility also to visit a One Stop Centre, which support victims of gender based violence. **[redacted - s.30]**

Afternoon:

- **Climate Justice Fund focused afternoon (TBC);** The trip presents a fantastic opportunity to showcase and visit a selection of **Climate Just Communities programmes/projects**. **[redacted - s.30]**. The FM is also due to take part in a virtual visit of Climate Just Communities (CJC) Rwanda from Scotland on 23rd October and this is a good opportunity to complement this. **Senior bilateral engagement**, with the Zambian Minister's engaged on Climate and/or Agriculture.

Day 4 – Friday 17 October – Lusaka, Zambia - Health

- Visit Matero Level 1 Hospital (Lusaka outskirts), an existing PEN-Plus site. PEN-Plus is a “Package of Essential NCD Interventions – Plus”, a strategy adopted by the WHO to improve access to care for severe NCDs in resource-constrained settings, particularly in rural and peri-urban areas. **[redacted - s.30]**

Travel from Zambia to Malawi – flight Lusaka to Lilongwe (1 stop):

- Depart Lusaka: 12:20 (*touches down in Harare, Zimbabwe, en route*)
- Arrive Lilongwe: 15:00

Day 4 – Friday 17 October – Lilongwe, Malawi – International Diplomacy Focus

- **FCDO Briefing** on arrival at airport.
- **Presidential Bilateral**, Strategic dialogue on Scotland and Malawi's relationship, across key policy areas, discussing challenges in climate, aid, and in key areas of health, education and equalities. **[redacted - s.30]**
- **FCDO British High Commission evening reception.**

Day 5 – Saturday 18 October – Travel to Blantyre by car (Stops en route in rural Machinga/Balaka and Zomba to visit IDF and CJF project, as site-visits)

- **First stop:** Visit Inclusive Education project schools in Balaka or Machinga, funded under the Girls Initiative for Resilient Learning and Support, to meet recipients of our scholarships. Engage with school leaders on the challenges that girls face in attaining education.
- **Second stop:** Engagement with community, to learn about participatory approach to Climate Justice and programming that has been provided – including in water and sanitation.
- **Third Stop:** Visit IDF economic development/“trade not aid” project: St Andrews Macadamia Farm which has received commercial investment through the African Lakes Company (ALC) (a match-funded initiative between SG and Scottish private investors), to invest in tobacco replacement crops; and the Agricultural Community Foundation (ACF) – a women's social enterprise at the farm. **[redacted - s.30]**

[NB: as then DFM in March 2013, FM hosted a roundtable for the then President of Malawi Joyce Banda in Edinburgh, towards SG establishing a commercial investment fund for Malawi – our partnership with ALC, match funded by HNW individuals, was the result of that].

Day 6 – Sunday 19 October – Blantyre, Malawi. Health Focus

- Possibility in the morning to **attend a church service at St. Michael and All Angels Church, Blantyre** - constructed 1888-91 of brick by Scottish missionaries at the Blantyre Mission in Blantyre, Malawi. It is located on the original Scottish mission site in the Church of Central Africa, Presbyterian's Blantyre Synod. Although now separate churches, the CCAP remains closely affiliated to the Church of Scotland, as evidenced by the visit of the Moderator of the Church of Scotland last year.
- **Site visit to Queen Elizabeth Hospital:** opportunity to promote the continuation of the strategic partnership with the University of Glasgow and KUHeS. FM to visit Scottish Government funded Malawi Dental School, Blantyre-Blantyre facility, the Scotland Malawi Mental Health Education Project (SMMHEP) and existing health partnerships.
- the **new dental school in Blantyre, Malawi**, is now under construction, [redacted - s.32]: partners will be available to organise an interesting site visit; the first cohort of home-grown Malawi dental students, funded by SG, graduated earlier this year [redacted - s.30].
- **Announcement:** new £1.5m pa Health Programme for Malawi through the HSJF.
- **Site visit to Malawi University of Business and Applied Sciences (MUBAS)** – covering its Innovation Lab (linked to Strathclyde University), previous community renewable energy work funded by Scottish Government etc.

Day 7 – Monday 20 October – Blantyre, Malawi

- **Visit to Mandala House** – cultural – Malawi's oldest building - historic site located in Blantyre, Malawi. The building was formerly a residence built in 1882 by the African Lakes Corporation, founded by the Moir brothers from Glasgow, and continues to host a Saltire flag alongside the Malawi flag.

MAIN MESSAGES

- Your Excellency, the President of the Republic of Zambia, Hakainde Hichilema [***Haka-Indeh Hitch-e-Lehma***], it is an honour to meet with you again.
- The last time we met, in June 2024, at Bute House in Edinburgh, was during your visit to Scotland to be awarded an honorary doctorate from Heriot-Watt University.
- A reflection not only of your leadership in transforming education in Zambia, but of your personal connection with Scotland, and indeed the many and varied wider linkages between our 2 countries.
- I am absolutely delighted to now be here in Zambia – the first time a First Minister of Scotland has visited Zambia – and to have this opportunity to meet with you again.

- Honourable Mulambo Haimbe (*Ha-im-bay*), Minister of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation, and other distinguished guests, thank you also for your warm welcome to Zambia.
- Your Excellency, when we met last year, we noted that Scotland's relationship with Zambia has been built over the last 150 years.
- But, that it is equally an innovative and forward-looking relationship, with great potential for further growth. In particular focused on our work together in health, education, equalities, renewable energy, and climate justice – with sustainable economic growth and wellbeing in Zambia our shared goal.
- I want to take this opportunity to again assure you, that Scotland remains wholly committed to investing in, and indeed growing, its special and strategic relationship with Zambia.

SUPPORTING MESSAGES

- Your Excellency, in June last year, I had gifted you a photo frame containing images of the newly opened state-of-the-art research laboratory facility at University of Zambia here in Lusaka. The Scottish Government had invested £1 million to create this laboratory.
- It joined the laboratories at Kamuzu University of Health Sciences in Malawi, and Glasgow University, as a ground-breaking now 3-country collaboration, in scientific health research, between universities in Scotland, Zambia and Malawi.
- This new facility, that I have now seen in person today truly embodies our shared commitment to collaborative research across borders and to improved healthcare for all.

- It is a powerful testament to what can be achieved when ambition, partnership, and purpose come together. And with African expertise at the forefront.
- Likewise, I am looking forward to visiting University Teaching Hospital this afternoon, to see here in Zambia the paediatric operating room – the “Kids Operating Room” – which is the new “sister” operating room to that which I have previously visited in Dundee, Scotland.
- This type of health partnership, again based on our shared values, will significantly improve safe surgical access for thousands of children in Zambia. Particularly important, with around 45% of Zambia’s population being children.
- Reflecting on shared values, Scotland was the first nation globally to commit funds specifically to climate justice, launching our Climate Justice Fund in 2012.
- In 2023, we launched a three-year programme called Climate Just Communities, with £7.4 million for Zambia. I am looking forward over the next few days to meeting with Zambian climate justice advocates from that programme.
- Likewise, I will meet with partners and grantees from our Women and Girls Fund programme, as a key opportunity to engage with local woman- and girl-led organisations in Zambia. Your Excellency, I know equalities is equally a personal commitment on your part.
- Finally, whilst here, I am looking forward to celebrating the myriad – and growing – Zambian-Scottish Connections within the Zambian population.

Across diaspora, students and church groups. But also businesses, towards increased trade relationships.

- In closing, Your Excellency, I wish to convey once again my thanks to you, for your kind invitation to visit Zambia.

Summary

The dinner guests all have an economic, trade and investment, or renewables background, to support a discussion on economic dynamics in Zambia and climate resilience.

Discussion may also cover macroeconomic climate and the situation regarding Debt restructuring and debt justice, future of aid and generating private investment.

Debt restructuring and Debt Justice

- First Minister's has had recent discussions with UK based NGOs regarding **debt justice** - focused on the issue of private creditors and the experience of indebted countries.
- Zambia completed its debt restructuring in 2024, following 2020 default on its Eurobond loans, becoming the first African country to do so during the pandemic. A \$3.5 billion restructuring deal was reached in 2024; and while this has reached a more stable arrangement, debt repayments are still significant.
- **[redacted - s.30]**
- Scottish Government has a history of championing ethical finance initiatives, including the Global Ethical Finance Initiative (GEFI), and our ability to build common ground between differing viewpoints.
- Scotland does not have a formal role at the G20, World Bank and other international financial institutions. However, this does not prevent us from being a "good global citizen," and using our voice to speak out against injustice when we have the opportunity.
- The Scottish Government provides its international climate justice and development funding as direct grants, not loans. This approach allows for sustainable development without adding financial strain.
- We have consistently advocated for other countries to follow our example of giving funding for loss and damage as grants, not loans, to allow countries to recover from extreme climate events without taking on additional debt and to provide them with the ability to determine how this money is spent most effectively. We will continue to champion the need for grant-based finance, including at COP30 in Brazil.
- But improving access to finance is only one part of the solution. We must also find ways to address the structural issues that entrench cycles of debt and dependence.

Summary

This is the first ministerial engagement with the Women and Girls Fund programme partners and grantees, as well as a key opportunity to engage with local woman- and girl-led organisations in Zambia and publicly announce the award of the first grants under this fund.

The First Minister will hear directly from these organisations about the challenges they face, particularly around aid cuts and challenging advocacy contexts. They will also be invited to reflect on the design and grant application stages of the Women and Girls Fund. The First Minister will have the opportunity to reaffirm commitment to working collaboratively to advance gender equality around the world, as well as expressing Scotland's commitment to international development, recognising its role as a good global citizen.

Scottish Government officials met with Ecorys, FAWEZA and one of the grantees, the Zambian National Women's Lobby, in July when they were in Zambia. Grant funding had not yet commenced so this is the first Scottish Government engagement with organisations in receipt of funding through the Women and Girls Fund.

Top Brief

We are delighted to be working with Ecorys and the Forum for African Women Educationalists (FAWE) [fa-way] in our three partner countries on the Women and Girls Fund.

- This Fund is being delivered in a participatory way and puts the voices of women and girls and women- and girl-led organisations at the heart of the Fund's design and implementation.
- Importantly, this Fund provides support directly to local woman- and girl-led organisations in our partner countries.
- We know that direct funding is central to driving transformational change and this fund will empower women and girls, locally, to define and meet their own priorities.

Informed by the findings of the design phase, the Women and Girls Fund will deliver several types of grants tailored to the needs of women- and girl-led organisations in each country, across a range of thematic areas.

- The grant types include grants for advocacy, capacity building, research, social movements and swift response grants.
- The thematic focus areas for cycle one include women's representation in politics and decision-making; rights for disabled women and girls; gender-based violence and child marriage; gender-inclusive public services; menstrual hygiene; and women's land rights.

Background

We awarded the contract for the new Women and Girls Fund in March 2024 and this was announced on International Women's Day 2024.

- This contract was awarded to Ecorys [eh-koh-riss] who are working in partnership with the Forum for African Women Educationalists (FAWE) [fa-way].
- The £3 million contract is for a period of 4 years and follows a competitive procurement process.
- We engaged with the governments of Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia as we developed proposals for the Women and Girls Fund. Ecorys and FAWE also met with representatives from the governments to set out their plans for the Fund shortly after being awarded this contract.
- Government-level engagement in this work is continuing through their participation as part of steering committees across the three countries, and we would like to thank the partner country governments for their enthusiastic engagement on this work to date.
- Ecorys and FAWE have recently completed the crucial participatory design phase for the Fund during which they engaged with a range of organisations to understand their needs and to work with them to create an effective fund which will deliver for women and girls across Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia.

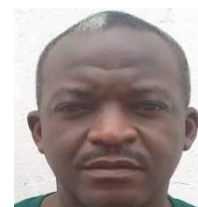

Summary

The partnership between Police Scotland and the Zambian Police Service began in 2016 and this is the second year of a multi-year funding agreement to support the programme as it seeks to tackle violence against women and children. Funding in the last year has supported various training deployments, awareness-raising activities and support to one stop centres (rape crisis centres which offer a range of services including police, psychosocial, health interventions). The First Minister will attend a One Stop Centre which received resources as part of this programme last year. Two Police Scotland officers will be in Zambia 10 October – 26 October to deliver Sexual Offences Liaison Officer training to 16 officers.

The First Minister will have the opportunity to express commitment to this longstanding partnership between Police Scotland the Zambian Police Service which will be celebrating its tenth year next year. The partnership is based on sharing lessons learned, recognising that there is still progress to be made in Scotland in tackling gender-based violence, but also that Scotland stands ready to support Zambian police officers to achieve this shared goal.

The Cabinet Secretary for Constitution, External Affairs and Culture met with a delegation of Zambian officers during an intensive training programme in Scotland in March. The Zambian Police Services are working with Police Scotland to plan another training programme in Scotland for early next year, although this is unlikely to include the officers engaged with today apart from **[redacted - s.38]**.

Top Brief

We understand the importance of working in partnership internationally to learn from and support each other in tackling gender-based violence, and Scotland must play its part as we work to achieve the crucial goal of ending violence against women and girls, in Scotland and globally.

We are committed to continuing support for the Police Scotland Peer-to-Peer Partnership Programme with the Police Services of Malawi and Zambia on the protection of vulnerable groups, in particular on the areas of gender-based-violence and child protection.

- The Scottish Government will provide £450,000 to Police Scotland in 2025/26 for capacity-strengthening around child protection and gender-based violence.
- Police Scotland undertake regular reviews of the partnerships to inform future programming and their long-term peer-to-peer partnership.

We are pleased to have announced our continued support of the Police Scotland Peer to Peer Partnership with the police services of Malawi and Zambia for 2024-27 of up to £1.45 million over three years.

- The overall outcomes of this phase of the programme are to:
 - Increase reporting and conviction rate in Malawi/Zambia for incidents of violence against women and children;
 - Enhance the experience of engaging with police services for women and children in Malawi/Zambia who are victims of violence; and
 - Positively influence attitudinal shifts around gender-based violence and child protection in Malawi/Zambia.
- Key strands of activity to support the achievement of these outcomes are:
 - supporting the delivery of training and upskilling of relevant staff;
 - enhancement of IT systems to support the programme outcomes;
 - improving data collection on impact of interventions; and
 - scoping further capacity strengthening and collaboration opportunities.
- Plans for this phase of the programme were informed by learning from previous phases and follow a recent review deployment during which Police Scotland engaged with police services and victim support providers on the ground in Malawi and Zambia to gather feedback.




Advancing gender equality remains an important priority in Malawi and Zambia and significant work remains to be done in this area in both countries, particularly with regard to gender-based violence.

- This is why we are supporting Police Scotland to work alongside the police services of Malawi and Zambia to improve the experience of engaging with the police for victims who have experienced gender-based violence or child protection related issues.

This multi-year programme includes support for enhanced resources at one stop centres (OSCs) as we look to maximise the impact of Scottish Government funding through considerations of holistic approaches to victim support.

- We know that these centres are a priority area of focus for enhancing victim support and Police Scotland have committed to explore opportunities for enhancement over the course of the programme for 2024-27.
- In 2024-25, £50,000 was allocated to provide resources to several centres across Malawi and Zambia.
- In Malawi, this included significant upgrades at two key OSCs in Lilongwe and Blantyre, including children's items, office furniture, refrigeration for medical samples, voice recorders, medical equipment, and other essential items.
- In Zambia, this included increased resources across up to 38 OSCs nationwide, including furniture, children's toys, and refrigeration facilities.

Background Briefing- CJC Zambia

- The CJC programme (2023- 2026) operates in Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia, under three separate contracts. £24m total, £8m each in Rwanda and Malawi, and £7.4m in Zambia)
It is Scotland's biggest Climate Justice Fund programme to date.
- NIRAS Group (UK) is the lead supplier contracted to deliver CJC in Zambia, in partnership with delivery partners on the ground: Council of Churches in Zambia (CCZ), Evangelical Fellowship of Zambia (EFZ), Green Living Movement of Zambia (GLM), Tearfund, Civil Society for Poverty Reduction (CSPR), Centre for Environmental Justice (CEJ), Disability Rights Watch (DRW) and CBM UK.
- CJC Zambia is delivering interventions in four districts: Luangwa (14 wards), Shangombo (2 wards), Sioma (2 wards), and Sinazongwe (4 wards). The target districts are among the poorest in Zambia and the remote wards selected are the hardest hit by the impacts of climate change.
- Project interventions were designed using participatory approaches, and implementation in each ward is overseen by a Community Management Committee (CMC).
- It takes a community-led, participatory approach, prioritising the needs of the most vulnerable including women, young people and people with disabilities.
- CJC Zambia has been delivering interventions across 6 key workstreams as follows
 - Water access, sanitation and hygiene: borehole drilling, borehole rehabilitation and weir construction.
 - Climate resilient agriculture: livestock provision, seed provision and training in climate-resilient livestock and crop/ vegetable production.
 - Natural resource management: tree planting and training in community- led forestry management.
 - Disaster risk reduction: formation and training of community based disaster risk reduction committees, provision of emergency food relief during the 2024 drought emergency.
 - Advocacy: training of climate justice advocacy champions and facilitation of dialogues spanning local, regional and national levels on climate justice issues.
 - Economic development: business development support to village savings loan associations and facilitation of market linkages to support local business groups.
- CJC Zambia is now in its third and final year of implementation, with the contract due to finish at the end of March 2026. **[redacted - s.30]**.
- The programme is now working to finish the vast majority of implementation pre-Christmas, with largely wash- up work to take place between December 2025 and March 2026.

You will then visit a solar irrigation scheme and meet with beneficiaries of honey production by beekeeping groups; goat pass-on interventions and youths trained in various vocational skills.

These are part of Climate Just Communities **Livelihoods Security theme**. Climate change poses a formidable threat to livelihood security, particularly for communities relying on environment-based sources of income. In response to this challenge, the CJC Malawi Livelihoods theme concentrates on diversifying livelihood options for these communities.

Following from this, you will meet with community members benefitting from CJC Malawi's **WASH interventions**.

Key climate risks in Malawi are linked to there being either too much or too little rain. This effects communities' access to potable water especially since the majority depend on surface water sources such as shallow wells. CJC Malawi WASH interventions include establishing water points, introducing solar powered reticulation systems and drilling boreholes to increase community access to water.

You will then meet community members benefitting from **Natural Resource Management interventions** as part of CJC Malawi.

Over 1 million trees have been planted as part of afforestation interventions since the project's inception. This has been driven by Village Natural Resource Management Committees (VNRMCs) – committees run by the community that focus on natural resource management.

Finally, you will interact with Vitalite representatives – which is a **private sector company that is promoting clean energy** through provision of solar lamps for lighting.

Vitalite successfully established a distribution hub in Zomba (and another in Phalombe) and recruited agents to drive market penetration of their solar products.

Top Brief Background

CJC Malawi focuses on the most marginalised communities. Women and girls, young people, and people with disabilities are supported to take leadership roles, shaping locally- led solutions that respond to their needs, while strengthening resilience to the material and social impacts of the climate crisis.

- CJC aims to demonstrate the value of community-led climate justice programming. We encourage other governments and donors to adopt approaches that also place communities at the centre climate action.
- The CJC Malawi Steering Committee provides feedback to DAI and the SG on the project. They meet twice a year to review progress of CJC Malawi and provide guidance for improvements to the project. Local Delivery partners also (DAI's sub-contractors) meet monthly at district level.
- Climate Change in Zomba primarily manifests in the form of disasters such as flooding, dry spells, cyclones, heavy rains, hailstorms and thunderstorms.

As part of Scotland's international work, we continue to advocate for climate finance to be accessible at the community level.

- Scotland will have a presence at COP30 in several weeks and will use our platform to call for equitable climate finance, delivered as grants not loans, and channelled directly to communities.
- Excellent programmes such as these help us make the argument for this, by demonstrating the value of community-led climate justice programming.

Summary – Church service

St Michael and All Angels Church, Blantyre:

- Constructed 1888-91 on the site of the original Scottish Mission site, and designed by a Scot Rev David Clement Scott with no formal architectural training.
- The Church is part of the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian Synod, which is now separate to but affiliated to the Church of Scotland.

Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP)/Synod of Blantyre:

- Scottish missionaries embarked on missionary work in Malawi in honour of David Livingstone
- The Free Church founded a mission in Livingstonia in 1875, and the Church of Scotland founded one in Blantyre in 1876. In 1924 the CCAP was established by loosely joining these two missions together with the Dutch mission in Nkhoma
- In 1957-8 there were 67 Scottish missionary families in Malawi, manning a large network of schools and hospitals. Today the CCAP has 5 Synods – 3 in Malawi and one each in Zambia and Zimbabwe
- There are many congregation twinnings between Scotland and Malawi, and the Blantyre Synod also support some Mission Partners in the country.

Background – earlier funding at QEH

Edinburgh Malawi Breast Cancer Project (earlier funding)

- The project received around £185,340 between 2015-2018 and aimed to enhance breast cancer treatment at Queen Elizabeth Central Hospital through improved multidisciplinary care and pathology.
- The project successfully reached 213 patients, expanded the multidisciplinary team, trained QECH staff in oncology skills, established new roles in breast care nursing and IT/data management, and implemented improvements in pathology tissue processing.
- The project improved healthcare for women in Malawi through multidisciplinary breast cancer treatment. Increased access to targeted therapy via oestrogen receptor testing. Enhanced patient care through improved multidisciplinary team working and oncology nursing education.
- The project empowered Malawian staff to lead oncology nursing education and established sustainable systems for data management and pathology.

Summary

- In March 2013, as DFM/Cabinet Secretary Finance, Mr Swinney hosted a roundtable at Prestonfield, Edinburgh during the visit of President Banda to Scotland, to discuss establishing a commercial investment fund for Malawi.
- That led to establishment of our commercial investment funding stream under the International Development Fund, through African Lakes Company (ALC), co-investing with private Scottish investors such as Ann Gloag and Sir Ewan Brown, and interest in mentorship by John Cameron.
- The Malawi Investment Initiative is intended to begin moving Malawi away from reliance on aid (**[redacted - s.30]**) and towards a self-sustaining economy supported by trade and investment.
- The investment is managed by ALC, reviving the original African Lakes Company that was established in Glasgow in 1878 to develop trade as an effective way of displacing slavery in Malawi, and which had its African HQ in Mandala House.
- In October 2016 Minister for International Development announced Scottish Government investment of £1m from the IDF in Malawian businesses, over a 3-year period, match-funded by private investors based in Scotland to provide a total business investment of £2m for Malawi.
- This roundtable will enable First Minister to hear about the business and investment climate in Malawi from business and banking leaders. And discuss how Scottish Government support and investment is there for that "aid to trade" desire.

This is the first time that FM will meet HE President Mutharika, following his recent inauguration on 4 October. FFM Nicola Sturgeon previously met President Mutharika in Edinburgh in April 2018, signing the current Global Goals Partnership Agreement.

Top Brief

SG Priorities in Malawi

- During this visit in Malawi, FM will undertake a range of engagements:
 - **Climate Justice projects in Zomba District**, through our Climate Just Communities Programme;
 - Visit to our long-term strategic partners - **Kamuzu University of Health Sciences** – to see a range of key initiatives, including:
 - **the Blantyre-Blantyre Research Laboratory**
 - **mental health training support;**
 - **Malawi's first dental school**, including meeting the first cohort of home-grown dentists;
 - **hosting an investment roundtable at Mandala House, Blantyre; and**
 - celebrating through a reception in Lilongwe and then gathering after church in Blantyre the myriad – and still growing – **Malawi-Scottish Connections** within Malawi's population.

Presidential Priorities

President Peter Mutharika has outlined his priorities for Malawi following his return to office in October 2025. The following themes are priorities:

1. Anti-Corruption and Accountability

The president has emphasized **zero tolerance for embezzlement**, promising that any official who misuses public funds "will not be tolerated." He aims to strengthen the Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB) and ensure its independence.

2. Economic Stabilization and Growth

In relation to the economy, his administration is prioritizing:

- **Food security**
- **Foreign exchange stability**
- **Debt restructuring**

- **Export diversification**
- **Job creation**, especially for youth

He has called for **international investment**, framing Malawi as a trustworthy partner.

3. Public Services Reform

Plans include strengthening **healthcare and education systems**, improving infrastructure, and restoring trust in public institutions.

Mutharika has promised to restructure state institutions, improve transparency, and restore efficiency in government operations.

4. Climate and Environmental Action

Mutharika has signalled renewed commitment to **environmental management**, including enforcing bans on single-use plastics and promoting clean energy.

Core Brief: First Minister Visit to Zambia and Malawi – October 2025

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Steering Brief – Overarching Themes and Aims

Summary Purpose and Themes for Malawi and Zambia Visit October 2025

- Current global challenges – climate change, pandemics, conflict, poverty, inequality – can only be addressed if the Global South and North work together.
- Supporting international development and climate justice is an important way that Scotland can be a good global citizen.
- SG established its international development footprint in 2005, with a £3 million International Development Fund focused on Malawi only. Since then, our overseas assistance has evolved and expanded geographically, thematically and financially.
- Since 2023, our revised International Development Fund programmes focus on health, education, equalities, and renewables.
- How we spend is equally important. While our programme started with an ambition to support Scottish organisations partnering abroad, our focus now is to listen to the voices of the people and governments in our partner countries, to better understand their challenges, and work in partnership to address these issues.

Current Challenges in International Development and Aid

- Scottish Government planned aid expenditure for 2025-26 is £23 million.
- Our world-leading Climate Justice Fund was also established in 2012. We are fulfilling our commitment to spend £36 million on Climate Justice, over this Parliamentary term, including £10 million on loss and damage.
- And we support Humanitarian crises with £1 million of support annually.
- Our commitment shows leadership at a time UKG cut aid by 30%.
- **[redacted - s.30]**
- Economic turbulence, flooding/drought events and significant US aid cuts have reduced Malawi and Zambia's capacity to make progress on their own national development plans.

Purpose and Outcomes of the Visit

- Celebrating the 20th year of Scotland's International Development Programme in 2025, the First Minister will visit programmes in Zambia and Malawi:
 - How health systems cope with diseases,
 - how we support quality education,
 - how to support those most affected by climate change, and
 - how we support the advancement of gender equality.
- This will be the first time a First Minister has visited Malawi since the historic Co-operation Agreement between the governments of Scotland and Malawi in 2005, and the first ever visit to Zambia.

Overview of Current International Development (IDF) Programming

[See the thematic briefs throughout this document for more detail]

Background

Since 2022, following discussion with our partner countries during Covid-19, we refocused our work thematically, and further evolved our approach. We are clear that how we fund is equally as important as what we fund:

- How: in designing/implementing our new programmes, we're now guided by 3 underpinning approaches: our International Development Principles; mainstreaming equality; and pursuing an equalising power agenda.
- What: launching new international development programmes with our partner countries, where we are looking to collaborate on tackling non-communicable diseases, support inclusive education for those with additional support needs, and work together on advancing the rights of women and girls. We are also responding to our partner countries' asks on renewable energy.

In developing these new sectoral programmes, we are working to embed **participatory methodology**, where possible, into programme design, implementation, and evaluation processes to ensure decisions on our new programmes are driven by local expertise, including those who are 'experts by lived experience. This is further linked to shifting power commitments.

A. Stronger Health Systems

- Scotland has a strong history of supporting health systems in our partner countries.
- Our NHS partnerships, have transformed health care, for example launching Malawi's first dental school, supporting a programme which has trained all psychiatrists, established the first dedicated A&E centre, and supported on cancer.
- Further health partnerships have sought to explore "the Glasgow Effect" (low life expectancy/health equity gaps) through the SG-funded Blantyre-Blantyre Research Labs initiatives between universities in Glasgow/Blantyre/Lusaka, driving forward research advancements for Africans, by Africans, in Africa.
- This is a key example of our commitment to support "shifting power" or power equalisation, as part of our 20-year partnership with them.
- We also support work on Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs), an area where Scotland has huge expertise. NCDs are the leading cause of death and disability, accounting for c74% of all global deaths, projected to be responsible for the most fatalities in Africa by 2030. Despite this they receive a fraction of aid support.
- In Malawi and Zambia our funding has helped to create facilities and training which can help the poorest get support for complex cases, such as heart disease and cancers; and in Rwanda we are supporting palliative care, in the context where 80% of those needing pain relief in the global south are unable to receive it.

B. Promoting Gender Equality and the Rights of Women and Girls

- In 2023 Malawi ranked 110 out of 146 countries for gender equality, 37.5% of women have experienced Gender Based Violence (GBV), and early child marriage is 26.9%. In 2025, Zambia ranked 79 out of 146 countries in terms of gender equality, with 41% of women experiencing GBV, and child marriage rate of 14.6%.
- While progress has been made, there is a lot of work to be done. Advancing gender equality and tackling GBV and early child marriage remain key priorities for our partner countries' governments. The police services in both Malawi and Zambia are working to address GBV as a priority.
- To date, we have invested in a range of successful equalities programmes, including: our collaboration with Comic Relief in Malawi/Zambia/Rwanda focused on girls' and women's rights and leadership through sport; and Police Scotland's peer-peer partnership with the Malawi and Zambia police services on capacity building for tackling GBV and child protection.
- Our equalities programme comprises our Women and Girls Fund, designed/led by woman- and girl-led organisations in Malawi, Zambia and Rwanda.

C. Inclusive Education

- Our inclusive education programme aims to build on previous projects, including supporting primary schools to effectively include deaf learners to improve their quality of education; online MBA Scholarships for Zambian women from all backgrounds; and our Scotland Pakistan Scholarships for Young Women and Girls.
- Despite widespread agreement on the importance of education for all children, girls and disabled children are still left behind. There are nearly 240 million children living with disabilities globally who, like every child, have the right to be supported through responsive care and education.
- 129 million girls are out of school worldwide (32 million primary /97 million secondary). These estimates are worse in Sub-Saharan Africa where girls and disabled children are more likely to never attend school or to drop out due to barriers including culture and stigma, lack of trained teachers, inadequate learning materials and inaccessible facilities.
- Our inclusive education programme (2024-29) aims to support existing efforts on inclusive education through national policies. It comprises 3 strands in our African partner countries:
 - Support disabled learners (especially girls) to attend school.
 - Support young women through scholarships to complete secondary education and transition to tertiary education and Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET).
 - Support policymakers to strengthen inclusive education policy skills and remove barriers.

D. Climate Justice (including Loss and Damage)

- Devastating, widespread, rapidly escalating impacts of the climate crisis are being experienced globally, with the Global South and marginalised groups impacted first

and most severely, including economic loss, but also loss of life, indigenous/local knowledge, biodiversity, and territory.

- Global North countries, as historic emitters, have a responsibility to act. Scotland leads by example, e.g. enshrining the principle of climate justice in our 2019 Climate Change Act.
- Scotland was the first nation globally to commit funds specifically to climate justice and have committed to trebling the Climate Justice Fund to £36 million over the course of this parliamentary term.
- In 2023, we launched a three-year £24 million Climate Just Communities programme, split across Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia. This programme delivers and develops a series of interventions to help build inclusive and climate resilient communities.
- On **Renewables**, we have established a Global Renewables Centre (GRC), with the Scottish GRC at Strathclyde University, committed to sharing knowledge/resources between Scotland, Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia that enables increased deployment of sustainable energy.

E. Humanitarian Responses

- In 2017, SG established a £1 million per annum Humanitarian Emergency Fund (HEF) to respond to humanitarian emergencies, both the high profile DEC Appeals as well as “hidden emergencies” globally. The HEF Panel comprises experts from 8 leading NGOs based in Scotland.
- In the last 2 years, SG has also responded to climate-related humanitarian emergencies in our partner countries: the food crisis in 2024 in Malawi with £500,000 to SCIAF/Christian Aid; and in March 2024, £500,000 to the Red Cross to respond to the severe cholera outbreak there.

Scotland recognises the huge pressure escalating debt levels are putting on countries in the Global South.

- Excessive debt levels are undermining progress toward the Sustainable Development Goals and the Paris Agreement, diverting resources away from critical investment in health, education, infrastructure and climate action.
- When faced with a climate disaster, governments should not be in a position where they are forced to choose between repaying their creditors and helping their communities to recover.
- We have consistently advocated for other countries to follow our example of giving funding for loss and damage as grants, not loans, to allow countries to recover from extreme climate events without taking on additional debt. We will continue to champion the need for grant-based finance, including at COP30 in Brazil.

Climate Justice

Scotland's approach to climate justice is distinct and internationally recognised.

- Our £36 million Climate Justice Fund, now in its final year, supports those most affected by the climate crisis in ways that are participatory, rights-based and inclusive.
- Scotland's financial contributions are relatively small in a global context, but we will continue to lead by example and there has never been a more vital time to do so.
- The Climate Justice Fund is distinct from, and additional to, Scotland's International Development Fund, and acknowledges Scotland's commitment to international climate finance and recognition of its common but differentiated responsibilities in addressing the global impacts of climate change.

Our focus for the rest of this Parliamentary term is on two major multi-year programmes: Climate Just Communities (CJC) and our Non-Economic Loss and Damage Programme (NELD).

- The flagship £24 million Climate Just Communities (CJC) programme is Scotland's biggest climate justice programme to date and is now in its final year.
- CJC operates in **Malawi, Zambia** and Rwanda, working through national partners and local organisations to put communities themselves in the lead.
- Programme delivery focuses on the most marginalised communities. Women and girls, young people, and people with disabilities are supported to take leadership roles, shaping locally- led solutions that respond to their needs, while strengthening resilience to the material and social impacts of the climate crisis.
- The programme is delivering real change on the ground. In Malawi, communities have benefitted from improved access to clean water and food security; in Zambia, communities are being trained in climate- resilient agriculture and climate justice advocacy; and in Rwanda, houses rebuilt after flooding have been designed to be accessible for people with disabilities.
- CJC aims to demonstrate the value of community-led climate justice programming and to encourage other governments and donors to adopt approaches that also place communities at the centre climate action.
- Scotland uses its platform internationally to act as a bridge-builder, amplifying Global South voices and sharing learning from our programmes to strengthen the global evidence base.
- Key upcoming international climate justice milestones, in particular COP 30, must be inclusive of participants from the Global South, bringing those most impacted by the climate crisis to the forefront of decision- making processes.

Loss and Damage

There is an important role for Scotland and other subnational governments to continue to show leadership on loss and damage.

- As a good global citizen, Scotland was proud to be the first global north Government to commit funding explicitly to address loss and damage.
- Since COP26, we have mobilised £10 million on community-led loss and damage projects in East Africa, the Pacific Islands and the Bay of Bengal. This includes our world-first Non-Economic Loss and Damage Programme.
- Learning from our projects has consolidated our position that a proportion of the UNFCCC Fund for Responding to Loss and Damage (FRLD) must be ringfenced to make finance directly available to communities in the form of grants not loans.
- There must also be recognition of, and funding for, non-economic loss and damage, such as loss of cultural heritage, indigenous knowledge, biodiversity and impacts on physical and mental health. A holistic approach to addressing loss and damage is needed.

Background- Climate Finance

At COP29, developed countries agreed that they would raise a core of at least \$300 billion a year in climate finance for developing countries by 2035. This agreement is known as the “New Collective Quantified Goal” (NCQG).

- There is also broader ambition to increase climate finance to \$1.3 trillion per year by 2035.
- Amongst developing countries (including Malawi and Zambia), the NCQG has been criticised as wholly inadequate to the scale of need. For example, the Least Developed Countries (LDC) Group have called it a “staggering betrayal of the world’s most vulnerable.”
- The reality is that there remains a significant shortfall in climate finance:
 - Adaptation: Global adaptation finance remains critically underfunded. According to UNEP’s Adaptation Gap Report 2024, the annual gap between needs and current flows is estimated at \$187–\$359 billion, of which less than 15% is currently being met. This shortfall threatens progress toward the Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA), which aims to enhance resilience and reduce vulnerability globally.
 - Emissions Reduction Funding: Investment in mitigation must triple by 2030 to stay within 1.5°C pathways, with developing countries requiring over \$2 trillion annually.
 - UNFCCC Fund for Responding to Loss and Damage (FRLD): A breakthrough agreement at COP27 helped to establish the world’s first Fund for Responding to Loss and Damage. Since the Fund’s establishment at COP27 and the decision to operationalize it at COP28, only 28 countries have made pledges to the value of \$768 million. This amount is modest compared to the scale of climate-induced loss, which is projected to reach hundreds of billions annually.
- Scotland has called for the need to scale up ambition and good quality climate finance to keep to the commitments made under the Paris Agreement and the Glasgow Climate Pact and to deliver on climate justice.

COP30 will be defined by:

- **Accountability and ambition:** Parties are due to submit their new **Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) and National Adaptation Plans (NAPs)**. So far, only about 10% (this includes the UKG) of the 196 signatories to the UNFCCC have revised Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), leading to uncertainty around what level of ambition will be exhibited.
- **Climate finance:** At COP30 Parties will define a strategy to reach the \$1.3 trillion goal (referred to as the 'Baku to Belém Roadmap to \$1.3T'). The mobilisation of this – particularly in the face of drastic overseas aid cuts enacted by western governments – is likely to be challenging and represent a point of conflict in negotiations.
- **Fossil fuel phase-out:** Building on COP28's commitment to transition away from fossil fuels, with potential pressure for stronger language on phase-out timelines.
- **Nature and Indigenous leadership:** Given Brazil's hosting role, nature-based solutions, rainforest conservation, and Indigenous rights will be at the forefront.

Climate Just Communities - £8m Malawi

- CJC operates in Karonga, Salima, Neno, Machinga, **Zomba** (where you will visit), Phalombe and Chikwawa districts.
- Our delivery partner for the £8m CJC Malawi Contract is DAI Global UK.
- Interventions are in the following areas:
 - Disaster Risk Management
 - Livelihoods Security
 - Loss and damage
 - Resilient Schools
 - Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)
 - Gender and Inclusion- Advocacy,
 - Communication and Networking.
- CJC Malawi directly benefits over 61,000 people and indirectly benefits over 270,000 people. Key achievements so far include planting more than 1 million trees, developing 223 Community by-laws on protection of natural resources and riverbanks and training more than 1,300 farmers on sustainable agriculture.

Climate Just Communities - £7.4m CJC Zambia

- CJC operates in Luangwa, Shangombo, Sinazongwe and Sioma districts.
- You will meet delivery partners and community members at an event in Lusaka.
- Our delivery partner for the £7.4m CJC Zambia Contract is NIRAS Group (UK).
- Interventions through the CJC Zambia are being delivered across the following areas:
 - Climate Resilient Agriculture (crops, livestock, irrigation)
 - Economic Development (Village Savings and Loan Associations, small enterprises)

- Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH)
- Natural Resource Management (NRM)
- Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR)
- Gender, Equality, Disability & Social Inclusion (GEDSI)
- Climate advocacy
- Key achievements include:
 - At the start of September 2025, the programme had reached a total of 36,691 direct beneficiaries and 79,969 indirect beneficiaries.
 - At the start of September 2025, the programme had supported an estimated 19,650 people to access improved sources of clean water.
 - At the start of September 2025, the programme had planted 63,408 trees.
 - Throughout FY2 (2024-2025) food relief was distributed to 4,746 individuals, supporting households facing acute food insecurity during the Zambian national drought emergency.
 - At the start of September 2025, the programme had distributed 3867 livestock, supporting communities to improve livelihoods, economic stability and food security.

International Development and cuts to Aid

We are protecting our commitments to International Development, humanitarian support and Climate Justice because it's right thing to do.

- The financial commitments Scotland has made have shown leadership during difficult times and at time UKG cut aid and is further dropping its commitment to the UN target of 0.7% Gross National Income (GNI) for aid spend - cut again from 0.5% to 0.3% GNI.
- SG has been clear on not wanting to "balance the books on the backs of the poor".

Principles of the International Development Programme

Vision

The Scottish Government's vision is that through embedding the UN Global Goals, Scotland will contribute to sustainable development and the fight against poverty, injustice and inequality internationally.

Overarching Ethos

We speak out with clarity of purpose and compassion, in support of democracy, human rights and the rule of law. This requires three overarching and immutable commitments in how we act internationally:

- Respect for human rights and equality – Whether through the incorporation of UN Human Rights Treaties^[3] or through international engagement with partners;
- Support for the rules-based international system – We strongly support multilateralism and the rules-based international system, contributing actively in global dialogues; and
- Implementation of a feminist approach to our international work – Scotland is the first country in the UK to commit to taking a feminist approach to international relations.

Our International Development Principles:

• **Partner-country led development**

We recognise that countries prioritise their own needs and lead their own development, therefore we fund work that is aligned with national/local plans and other in-country development partners. In supporting partner-countries we make sure we have sufficient expertise and skills to form a partnership and add value, and also support them to move beyond aid to sustainable development.

• **Equality**

We prioritise the rights of women and girls, their advancement and equality. We recognise the enduring and intersectional inequalities that exist and we oppose racism in all its forms and aspire to be anti-racist in our work.

• **Amplify global-south voices**

We encourage advocacy by and in support of the global south including the poorest and those living in vulnerable situations.

• **Inclusion and diversity**

We question whose expertise we value, who we listen to and who holds the levers of power. We support new and innovative ways to break down barriers, to harness a diverse range of new voices and new ideas to drive change.

• **Collaboration and partnerships**

We build partnerships with a shared ethos and vision that benefit from expertise across partner countries to foster joint learning and co-create solutions to further our commitment in our 2016 International Development Strategy to the "Beyond Aid agenda".

• **Innovative, adapting and sustainable**

We design programmes that are: flexible, resourceful and capable of responding to changing circumstances; are environmentally, socially and economically sustainable, with

interventions that consider long-term aims, and take account of risk. Recognising that we are facing a global climate emergency, we will support increasing resilience to climate change and to transition to becoming, as appropriate, net-zero economies in a way that is fair, just and leaves no one behind.

- **Embrace technology**

We support innovation to progress human health, wellbeing and environmental sustainability, such as improved access to digital services and using technology to reduce the need to travel, while acknowledging that technology can be a barrier to participation for some people in the global south.

- **Accountable, transparent and safe**

The Scottish Government and our delivery partners are transparent and accountable to local communities and the general public in our partner countries and in Scotland; we ensure, that all of our work has appropriate safeguarding policies and practices in place.

Feminist Approach to International Development

Our feminist approach to ID will continue to support the **equalisation of power** and the **advancement of gender equality**.

On power equalisation, our international development work will:

- Prioritise partner-led development, by ensuring that our programmes are focussed on areas identified by our partner country Governments
- Embed participatory methodology, where possible, into programme design, implementation and evaluation processes to ensure decisions on our new programmes are driven by local expertise.
- Evolve our programmes to provide funding streams for Civil Society Organisations in our partner countries, starting with the Women and Girls Fund and a new Global Citizenship Fund Investment in (south to south) institutional partnerships
- Explore opportunities to provide long-term institutional south-south investment, such as continued support for our long-term partnership with Kamuzu University of Health Sciences in Blantyre, Malawi
- Explore further opportunities to invest in south- south knowledge exchange between other stakeholders in our international development partner countries in key agreed areas, such as through our Global Renewables Centre.
- Review our due diligence processes to build more transparent and accessible processes.

Background on Safeguarding Position

Sexual exploitation and harm is a risk in international development and humanitarian interventions by aid organisations. This is due to: power (financial) imbalances that continue between aid organisations and the local communities they support; difficulties for individuals and communities in reporting incidents; and practices by individuals within organisations still not reflecting their organisations' policies.

Our response to this issue has been established over several interventions:

March 2018: The Scottish Government published its safeguarding statement, setting out expectations on the standards from those we fund to provide services to those people and communities who look to our support at their time of greatest need. There was also significant engagement with partners on safeguarding, to review policies.

October 2018: "Safer for All" safeguarding support package developed/published by Scotland's International Development Alliance, funded by Scottish Government.

October 2018: The Scottish Government signed up to the UK-Government-led 'Commitments made by donors to tackle sexual exploitation and abuse and sexual harassment in the international aid sector'. We remain aligned with UKG on safeguarding against sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment (SEAH) in the international aid sector.

February 2024: The Scottish Government contracted a safeguarding assessor and training to support capacity building within the international development team and ensure new programmes under the International Development Fund had high quality safeguarding policies and processes, as part of our wider due diligence process.

Now (SG): We have continued to monitor and strengthen our own grant conditions over the last 7 years, including specifically focusing on power imbalances. **[redacted - s.29]**

Health Programme

HS1: Non-Communicable Diseases (NCDs)

Background

- Globally NCDs are the leading cause of death and disability, killing around 41 million people each year. This accounts for around 71% of all global deaths.
- The World Health Organisation predicts that by 2030 NCDs will be the primary cause of death across sub-Saharan Africa with around **3.8 million premature deaths**.
- Across the African continent, countries are facing a **rapid demographic and epidemiological transition that includes a shift in health profile** with many countries now facing a dual burden of communicable and non-communicable disease.
- **NCDs are widely reported to be the largest unmet need in health financing**. For example, since 2001, it is estimated that only 2% of global Official Development Assistance for Health has been targeted towards NCDs.

Programming

- £2.5m over 5 years (2023-2028) to the Health4Life Fund supporting global action and progress on the prevention of non-communicable diseases such as heart attacks, strokes and cancers. WHO invited Scotland to become the first high-income donor to the Health4Life fund following our collaboration with Global South partners on tackling non-communicable diseases;
- Country level programming on supporting the scale up the WHO's 'Package of Essential non-communicable disease interventions' (PEN-Plus), a model of care that integrates treatment for non-communicable diseases into primary care hospitals in low-and middle-income countries:
 - **Malawi** - 'The Health Services Joint Fund' (HSJF) – a pooled funding mechanism set up by The Malawian Ministry of Health to ensure better coordination and synergy of donor inputs to reduce fragmentation.
 - **Zambia** - partnering with the Centre for Infectious Disease Research in Zambia (CIDRZ) to set-up two additional PEN-Plus training centres increasing capacity and coverage of health workers to deliver quality NCD services. Includes a secondment to the Zambian MOH to support national policy building on NCDs.

HS2: Health Partnerships Programme (HPP)

- Launched in July 2025, building on the success of the NHS Scotland Global Citizenship Programme, to provide a strategic platform and financial investment to support exchanges of skills, experience and knowledge, with an emphasis on bidirectional learning.
- Includes the **Tripartite Quality Improvement partnership** between Malawi, Scotland, and Zambia, which aims to improve healthcare quality through knowledge sharing and alignment with national strategies.

Kamuzu University of Health Sciences (KUHeS)

Blantyre Blantyre Malawi

- Over £1m Scottish Government funding established the Blantyre-Blantyre Clinical Research Facility with KUHeS and The University of Glasgow, aiming to compare health factors between the "two Blantyres".

- The facility strengthens Malawi's research and diagnostic capacity, especially on NCDs.
- Recognised as a model of equitable north-south partnership, driving forward cutting-edge research in Africa, by Africans, for Africa.

Blantyre Blantyre Lusaka

- £1 million investment to establish a state-of-the-art biomedical laboratory at the University of Zambia, building on the existing partnerships in Malawi.
- Focussing on vaccine efficacy research to improve access to vaccines in Zambia, particularly Cholera, in response to direct request from President of Zambia.
- Powered by solar energy, installed by female engineers, demonstrating a commitment to sustainability.
- Aims to build research capacity in Africa, with potential for collaboration with global pharmaceutical companies and the African Research Universities Alliance.

MalDent Malawi

- Establishment of an undergraduate dental degree (BDS) programme within the Faculty of Medicine, Kamuzu University of Health Sciences, to train Malawian dentists who are 'globally competent and locally relevant'.
- Successfully increased the number of dental students in Malawi, surpassing the number of registered dentists, the first cohort graduated this year.
- Secured significant funding from the World Bank for the construction of a new dental teaching facility.

Kids Operating Room

Background

- In 2015, Garreth and Nicola Wood founded Kids Operating Room (KidsOR), a global health charity dedicated to providing life-saving surgical care to children in more than 75 state-of-the-art operating rooms in 26 countries.
- **Scottish Government funding:**
 - May 2022 - £250,000 for new facilities at Kabwe Central Hospital (Zambia).
 - November 2023 (COP28) - £324,900 partnership in Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia to facilitate the establishment of seven paediatric Operating Rooms.
 - September 2025 - £400,000 to establish the Gaza HOPES Field Readiness Hub – a rapidly deployable hospital in Gaza to provide essential surgical, maternity and paediatric services.

Inclusive Education

- The First Minister announced in October 2024 that new inclusive education programmes, funded via the International Development Fund, would be delivered through multi-year commitments in Malawi, Rwanda, Zambia (Central Province) and Pakistan between 2024 and 2029.
- Our commitment to inclusive education was strengthened in 2025, when Scotland made first-time commitments at the Global Disability Summit, including a commitment to ensure at least 50% of all over aid is disability-inclusive by 2030.
- Our inclusive education programmes are already delivering against this commitment.
- **The majority of the (up to) £3.5m per year funding for inclusive education will go to two programmes, grants for which were competitively awarded to civil society organisations in 2024, with input from the Rwandan, Malawian and Zambian Ministries of Education - for example Ms Noriana Muneka, PS for Education was involved in selecting the winning organisations (Oxfam and Link Education International) for the above two programmes.**

Equality context for education in Zambia and Malawi

The Malawi and Zambia context

- UNICEF have indicated that Malawi and Zambia, and other countries in the region, are still facing a learning crisis that COVID and more recent economic and environmental events have made worse.
- In sub-Saharan Africa, learning poverty, defined as the share of children unable to read and understand an age-appropriate text by age 10, is estimated [at 89 percent](#) by the World Bank, UNESCO, and other organizations.
- Children with disabilities in Malawi face significant barriers to education, which are worsened by recurring shocks. For instance, only 3.3 per cent are enrolled in primary schools and 2.2 per cent in secondary schools.
- Girls with disabilities are the most excluded group of children at all levels of education due to multiple and intersecting forms of discrimination on the basis of both their gender and their disability.
- Barriers to the delivery of inclusive education in both Malawi and Zambia include financial barriers faced by parents, the lack of transport for itinerant teachers, inadequate specialist teachers, inaccessible infrastructure for learners with special needs, inadequate SNE teaching and learning materials and lack of assistive devices.
- For Malawi and Zambia, ensuring girls and young women – including those with disabilities - have equitable access to quality education is a critical part of both countries' paths to greater prosperity. Both have in recent years outlined commitments to strengthening inclusive education systems.

The Girls Initiative for Resilient Learning and Support (GIRLS) Project

This is the programme you are visiting on Saturday 18th October.

- GIRLS aims to help women and girls to finish secondary school and to transition to Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) or tertiary education in Malawi (2 districts – Balaka and Machinga), Rwanda (10 districts), and Zambia (4 districts).
- This programme is being delivered by Oxfam GB between July 2024 and March 2029, GIRLS started implementation in October 2024 and will run for five years, supported by Scottish Government funding of up to £1m per year.
- It is implemented through partnerships with:
 - the Young Women’s Christian Association in Zambia and Rwanda
 - the Concerned Youth Organisation in Malawi
 - government ministries and agencies responsible for education and gender.
- GIRLS achieves its aims through providing scholarships to girls, including those with disabilities, as well as critical wrap-around activities. These include mentorship, counselling, career guidance, and teacher capacity strengthening.

Recent Progress

In Year 1 (financial year 2024/25), GIRLS reported the following results:

Malawi: During a period in which extreme weather events and food inflation have been a significant challenge, scholarships were awarded to 500 students, split between Machinga and Balaka districts, with 300 bicycles distributed to scholarship recipients, and engagement with school leaders and communities.

Zambia: Scholarships were awarded to 1,390 girls in Central Province (which is the geographical focus of the project) across four districts (Chitambo, Kabwe, Kapiri-Mposhi, and Serenje), comprising of 40 individuals enrolled in Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) institutions, and 1350 at secondary schools.

The Realising Inclusive and Safer Education (RISE) programme

- RISE aims to remove barriers to quality education for out-of-school children with disabilities and additional support needs. The programme is being delivered by Link Education International between July 2024 and March 2029.
- The RISE project involves more than 400 government schools in eight districts in three countries – Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia.
- The project aims to support children with disabilities, especially girls and those who are out-of-school, to access a safe and quality education, through Scottish Government funding of up to £1.5m per year.

World Bank Inclusive Education Policy Academy (IEPA)

- A third programme strand, already announced in March 2024, complements the first two by support national policy-makers to strengthen their inclusive education policy skills and remove barriers to inclusive education.
- The World Bank Inclusive Education Policy Academy and Learning Exchange (IEPALE) is a three-year programme, which we have supported since March 2024. The programme supports policy-makers from our partner countries in Africa to strengthen the delivery of inclusive education policy in their countries.

- This initiative is our first-ever contribution to a World Bank programme, made through its Foundational Learning Compact Trust Fund, multi-donor trust fund supporting early childhood, primary, and secondary education.
- IEPALE is now in its third year. During that time, our contribution (£356,000 in Year 1, £431,000 in Year 2, and £177,000 in year 3) has supported the policy-makers of Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia to build more inclusive education systems.
- IEPALE's main objectives are to:
 - strengthen education systems to be more inclusive for all learners, through knowledge-sharing and peer support
 - strengthening the technical capacity of policymakers and practitioners to build quality education systems for all, and specifically for learners with disabilities.

Recent Progress

Malawi

- IEPALE has helped Malawi to ensure that Continuous Professional Development activities, including school leadership, are inclusive from the design stage.
- IEPALE has shaped the development of Malawi's Inclusive Education Policy and its strategy, with Malawian government policy makers now taking forward a proposal to turn one of the existing teacher education colleges into an inclusive education college.
- Dr. Ambumulire of Phiri National Council for Higher Education in Malawi recently spoke in September 2025 at an education conference at Oxford University about the success of IEPA in supporting Communities of Practice on inclusive education in the region, and for facilitating learning between Malawi and Zambia/Rwanda.

Equalities Programme

Legislation and Government Priorities

- Legislation in Malawi and Zambia has been updated in recent years, reflecting government-level prioritising of tackling gender inequality and power imbalances that exist culturally.
- While wide-reaching gender-based violence laws give legal protection to victims, incidents are still widespread, and Police Scotland also found during their 2024 review that support services tended to be limited, with focus groups held in Malawi highlighted that provision of these services was not yet sufficient to be able to meet demand.
- In 2023-24, Police Scotland reported that the area of gender-based violence and child protection were assessed by the partner countries to be areas of significant need. These were identified by the respective Inspector Generals as priorities within their strategic plans and there was general agreement at all levels in each police force that tackling gender-based violence remains a top priority.

Women and Girls Fund

In line with UN Sustainable Development Goal 5, the Women and Girls Fund supports the advancement of gender equality and empowerment of women and girls in our partner countries.

- The aim of the Women and Girls Fund is to provide direct funding to support woman- and girl-led organisations in Malawi, Zambia and Rwanda, with the advancement of equality and the rights of women and girls as a principal objective.
- In line with feminist principles, and our commitments to equalise power, this fund applies a participatory methodology and has been co-developed by women and girls as experts, both by profession and by experience, and woman- and girl-led organisations in our international development partner countries.

The former Minister for International Development announced the award of the contract for the Women and Girls Fund on International Women's Day 2024.

- This contract was awarded to Ecorys who are working in partnership with a pan-African NGO, the Forum for African Women Educationalists (FAWE).
- The £3 million contract is for a period of 4 years.
- We engaged with the governments of Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia as we developed proposals for the Women and Girls Fund. Ecorys and FAWE also met with representatives from the governments to set out their plans for the Fund shortly after being awarded this contract.

- Government-level engagement in this work is continuing through their participation as part of steering committees across the three countries, and we would like to thank the partner country governments for their enthusiastic engagement on this work to date.

We are delighted to be working with Ecorys and the Forum for African Women Educationalists (FAWE) in our three partner countries.

- Ecorys and FAWE have completed the crucial participatory design phase for the Fund during which they engaged with a range of organisations to understand their needs and to work with them to create an effective fund which will deliver for women and girls across Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia.

Informed by the findings of the design phase, the Women and Girls Fund will deliver several types of grants tailored to the needs of woman- and girl-led organisations in each country, across a range of thematic areas.

- The grant types include grants for advocacy, capacity building, research, social movements and swift response grants.
- The thematic focus areas for cycle one include women's representation in politics and decision-making; rights for disabled women and girls; gender-based violence and child marriage; gender-inclusive public services; menstrual hygiene; and women's land rights.

Police Scotland Partnership

We understand the importance of working in partnership internationally to learn from and support each other in ending gender-based violence, and Scotland must play its part as we work to achieve the crucial goal globally.

- We are committed to continuing support for the Police Scotland Peer-to-Peer Partnership Programme with the police services of Malawi and Zambia on gender-based-violence and child protection.
- The Scottish Government will provide £450,000 to Police Scotland in 2025/6 for capacity-strengthening activities to tackle violence against women and children.
- Police Scotland undertake regular reviews of the partnerships to inform future programming and their long-term peer-to-peer partnership.

We are pleased to have announced our continued support of the Police Peer to Peer Partnership for 2024-27 of up to £1.45 million over three years.

- The overall outcomes of this phase of the programme are to:
 - Increase reporting and conviction rate in for incidents of violence against women and children
 - Enhance the experience of engaging with police services for women and children who are victims of violence
 - Positively influence attitudinal shifts around these issues
- Key strands of activity to support the achievement of these outcomes are:
 - supporting the delivery of training and upskilling of relevant staff;

- enhancement of IT systems to support the programme outcomes;
- improving data collection on impact of interventions; and
- scoping further capacity strengthening and collaboration opportunities.

Advancing gender equality remains an important priority in Malawi and Zambia and significant work remains to be done in this area in both countries, particularly with regard to gender-based violence.

- This is why we are supporting Police Scotland to work alongside the police services of Malawi and Zambia to improve the experience of engaging with the police for victims.

This multi-year programme includes support for enhanced resources at one stop centres (OSCs) as we look to maximise the impact of Scottish Government funding through considerations of holistic approaches to victim support.

- We know that these centres are a priority area of focus for enhancing victim support and Police Scotland have committed to explore opportunities for enhancement over the course of the programme for 2024-27.
- In 2024-5, £50,000 was allocated to provide much needed resources to several centres across Malawi and Zambia.

Background

Supported by the Scottish Government, Police Scotland have collaborated with the Malawi and Zambia Police Services since 2016 in 5 phases:

- Phase 1 (GBV/child protection programme): 2015-2019
- Phase 2 (Protection of Vulnerable Groups programme): 2019-2020
- Phase 3: Programme paused due to COVID: 2020-2022
- Phase 4: Programme partially recommenced post-COVID: 2022
- Phase 5: PVG Programme recommenced in full: 2023

The multi-year programme for 2024-27 includes:

- Sexual offences and child protection training, delivered collaboratively with the police forces in Malawi and Zambia;
- Specialist training programmes particularly for managers and on interview skills to support enhanced evidence gathering;
- An inbound visit from Zambian and Malawian officers for training in Scotland;
- A review of the previous Malawi ICT work, with the aim of creating a central crime recording system to improve prosecution rates for instances of violence against women and children;
- Improved data collection for monitoring and evaluation of the programme itself;
- Scoping of opportunities for collaboration, particularly around forensic testing and cyber-crime.

Background: One Stop Centres

- **[redacted - s.30]**
- One Stop Centres are the equivalent of Sexual Assault Referral Centres (SARCs) in Scotland. SARCs in Scotland provide specialist medical and forensic services for anyone who has been raped or sexually assaulted. They are designed to be comfortable and multi-functional, providing private space for interviews and forensic examinations, and may also offer sexual health and counselling services.

Mainstreaming Gender Equality

Scottish Government recognises that accelerating progress towards gender equality requires combining gender-focused actions with mainstreaming.

- Our aim is to build more gender-responsive, and gender-transformative international development programmes by mainstreaming gender equality across our international development sector portfolios.
- This is to ensure that any work undertaken by our health, inclusive education, equalities and global solidarity programmes supports gender equality.
- To support the delivery of this commitment, we will score our new bilateral and multilateral Official Development Assistance funding for the implementation of specific projects against the OECD DAC gender equality policy marker.

Domestic Gender Equality

Gender equality is at the heart of our vision for a fairer Scotland.

- We want women and girls to be empowered to exercise equal rights and opportunities, have equitable access to economic resources and decision making, and live their lives free from all forms of violence, abuse and harassment.

We continue to take forward work to protect, promote and improve gender equality, recognising intersectional inequality, in Scotland.

- Gender inequality is complex and harmful and it affects everyone - not just women and girls.
- We know that child poverty and women's poverty is inextricably linked and that we can only tackle child poverty by tackling the inequalities faced by women.

We have announced that we will have an Equality Strategy for Women and Girls, [redacted - s.29]

Humanitarian

The £1 million per year Humanitarian Emergency Fund (HEF) was established in 2017. The aim of the HEF is to provide immediate and effective assistance to reduce the threat to life and wellbeing for a large number of a population faced with a humanitarian emergency.

In 2025 funds from the HEF were allocated to the following humanitarian crises based upon recommendations from the panel:

- £250k for conflict in Sudan
- £250k for conflict in Democratic Republic of Congo
- £250k for the DEC Appeal for the devastating earthquakes in Myanmar

A further £1m was announced in September 2025 for the humanitarian crisis in Gaza as follows:

- £400,000 to Kids Operating Room to establish the Gaza HOPES Field Readiness Hub – a rapidly deployable hospital in Gaza to provide essential surgical, maternity and paediatric services.
- £600,000 to the UNOCHA led Humanitarian Fund for the Occupied Palestinian Territories to provide life-saving health services, food and nutrition assistance, emergency shelter, water and sanitation, protection services, education support and cash for families.

In 2023/24 alongside the £1m HEF budget, we piloted an additional £1m of Climate Justice funding through the HEF for Loss and Damage projects in Kenya, Ethiopia, Pakistan and **Zambia**.

Also in March 2024, we provided £500k for a response to a deadly cholera outbreak in **Zambia** and £500k for a response to the ongoing food crisis in **Malawi**. In February 2025 we provided £450,000 to Christian Aid, Oxfam and SCIAF for a response to the food crisis in **Malawi**.

Renewable Energy

Top Lines

I have made clear my government's priority of tackling the climate emergency. The twin crises of climate change and biodiversity loss is real and present, but so is the opportunity to successfully reach net zero.

- The government that I lead will align the capacity generated by our vibrant entrepreneurial nation, with our world-leading academic and research institutions, our valuable natural resources and our businesses and communities in a shared agenda to develop our renewable energy capacity and to deliver net zero.
- International collaboration and partnership is key as we develop our renewable energy sectors and support our partner countries reach their renewable energy goals.

Background

Renewable energy is a priority area for our African partner countries. In 2022, we launched a new **Scottish Global Renewables Centre** (GRC) to facilitate knowledge exchange between our international development partner countries (Malawi, Zambia and Rwanda) and the Scottish renewables sector.

Scottish Global Renewables Centre

- The Scottish part of the GRC is sited in Strathclyde University, our partner on renewable energy in Malawi since 2012.
- The vision for the GRC in the long term is to facilitate knowledge exchange and support global citizenship that results in increased and improved use of renewables across our African partner countries and wider region, in line with their national energy policies. The GRC has gender and climate justice as cross-cutting themes.
- It promotes leadership from the Global South by partnering with local stakeholders to gather perspectives on energy sector priorities and design knowledge exchange activities.
- The GRC will also engage with local communities and civil society organizations to ensure that their voices are represented in decision-making processes.
- It will continue to work to promote local ownership and leadership of renewable energy projects.
- Such initiatives support Global South-led, Global South-delivered solutions for the Global South.
- The current focus of the GRC has been in sourcing and appointing its local partners – organisations – in Malawi, Zambia and Rwanda, following a process of engaging and consulting key stakeholders in all our partner countries. These African hubs will be funded from the IDF (£200k total p.a.).
- The local engagement work to date has identified a set of themes around which the GRC intends to form Communities of Practice and develop a programme of knowledge exchange activities. Minigrid innovation, business models and financing – as proposed by SE4ALL for Zambia - are priority areas.

- Together, University of Strathclyde and the local partner will co-design and deliver Knowledge Exchange activities through 2024, including in-country workshops.
- The GRC has engaged extensively with stakeholder networks and achieved its goal of a decentralised structure with a formal presence in Scotland, and our three partner countries, operationalised through The Renewable Energy Industry Association of Malawi, The Zambian Renewable Energy Association, and Energy Private Developers (Rwanda).

Rural Energy Access through Social Enterprise and Decentralisation

- The Rural Energy Access through Social Enterprise and Decentralisation (EASE) project worked to address energy poverty in marginalised communities in Malawi by deploying renewable energy systems under sustainable social business models and piloting District Energy Officers in Dedza and Balaka to support local energy planning and deployment.
- The Project was delivered in partnership with the University of Strathclyde, Self Help Africa, Community Energy Malawi (CEM) and WASHTED. **NB:** FM will meet these partners at Malawi University for Business and Applied Science.
- The project successfully installed 2 solar PV microgrids serving 126 customers, which support connections for 646 households, 37 businesses, 2 schools and 2 churches. 20 of the households and businesses connected customers are women-headed. The Balaka Energy Hub powers an irrigation scheme, cold room and 3 co-located PUE business. 125 irrigation scheme members (50m, 75f) directly benefit. The Dedza school Energy Hub serves classrooms, offices, and 8 teachers houses.
- Capacity-building by CEM's District Energy Officer pilot programme provided renewable energy training and ongoing support to 20 local technicians, 170 local government extension workers from Agriculture, Education, Health and Community Development sectors, plus 280 employees of local NGOs actively supporting these areas.
- The project received over £1.6 million in funding from the Scottish Government between 2018-2024.
- The microgrid assets have been transferred to local partner Kuyatsa, ensuring the sustainability of the project.

Global Citizenship

Promoting and supporting global citizenship in Scotland is a key objective for the Scottish Government's International Development work.

- Our new Global Solidarity portfolio will strengthen global citizenship participation through three core portfolio strands:
 - **GS1: Core Funding of 4 networking bodies** - to engage in, and build domestic support and understanding of, international development issues and Scotland's commitment to Fair Trade, recognising the important contribution it makes to delivery of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

- Programme for Government (2024-25) commitment to: **"not forget our commitment to the global Sustainable Development Goals'** and also to **'launching new programmes to support good global citizenship, connecting Scotland to the Global South.'**
- Our portfolio design aligns with SG's commitment to UN SDG 17 (Partnership for the Goals) which recognises the need for cross-sector and cross-country collaboration in pursuit of all UN SDGs.

GS1 - Core Funded Bodies

We provide core funding to 4 networking organisations -

- **Scotland's International Development Alliance** (SIDA), as the main network in Scotland that unites the international development sector to promote effectiveness and to collectively influence the international development policy agenda;
- **Scottish Fair Trade** (SFT) (since 2017), initially to coordinate the campaign for Scotland to meet the criteria necessary to become a Fair Trade Nation, and then to retain this and work to promote and support fair trade in Scotland;
- **Scotland Malawi Partnership** (SMP), as the national civil society network coordinating, supporting and representing the people-to-people links between Scotland/Malawi; and
- **Malawi Scotland Partnership** (MaSP), the Malawi-owned/led sister organisation of the SMP, an umbrella organisation to bring together, support and add value in Malawi to the many civil society links that Malawi has with Scotland.

Zambia gained independence on 24 October 1964, following British colonial rule under the British South Africa Company. Kenneth Kaunda became the first President after UNIP won the 1964 elections. The Scottish Government has supported development projects in Zambia since 2008, with a dedicated Zambia Development Programme established in 2016.

Historical Links with Scotland

- Scotland and Zambia share strong historical links going back over 170 years since Dr David Livingstone's expeditions first brought him into Zambia.
- The city of Livingstone, in the Southern Province, is named after the Scottish explorer who was the first European to explore the area.

Key Recent Ministerial engagement

- **June 2024:** First Minister John Swinney hosted President Hichilema at Bute House for a bilateral.
- **March 2024:** Ms Stewart, then International Development Minister, met the Zambian High Commissioner twice, in London as part of a wider roundtable with all three African partner High Commissioners, with Former First Minister (Mr Yousaf) joining; then in Edinburgh in a 1:1. Discussion focused on live issues in Zambia and international development programming.
- **December 2023:** FFM (Mr Yousaf) met President Hichilema at COP28 in Dubai. They discussed key climate challenges for the global community and urgency of action on loss and damage.
- **May 2023:** FFM (Mr Yousaf) met President Hichilema in Edinburgh following the King's Coronation. In addition to discussing partnership in international development, conversation touched on Zambian debt, renewable energy, and potential partnership between the Zambian and Scottish chambers of commerce.
- **November 2021:** FFM (Ms Sturgeon) met President Hichilema during COP26. They discussed the bilateral relationship, climate finance, devolution of public spending, trade and investment and COVID-19.

Zambia Development Programme 2017-24

Projects under the Zambia Development Programme (competitive funding round) started on 1 October 2017: totalling more than £6.2 million over 4.5 years and featuring 6 projects which

focus on the themes of agriculture, sustainable economic development, health and education in Central Province, and ran until 2024.

US aid cuts were 'long overdue', Zambia's president says Hakainde Hichilema tells FT abrupt closure of USAID was a 'shock' but offers opportunities for African nations

Zambia's president has branded cuts to international aid "long overdue", saying the closure of the US Agency for International Development and reductions by other donors offered his country the opportunity to "take care of our own affairs".

Zambia has relied on Washington for roughly a third of its health budget, with the bulk going on HIV/Aids treatment, basic and maternal health. But speaking to the Financial Times during a trip to London, President Hakainde Hichilema said his country had to learn to stand on its own feet.

"It forces us to grow our economies and to do the things we should have been doing," he said, adding his mantra was "seek ye growth" as a way of raising the government's capacity to spend on social programmes.

"It's painful for now," he said, adding the "instantaneous" nature of the cuts — which reversed funding Congress already allocated — left his government little time to adjust. "There is a shock. But longer term, it's a good thing."

In its 2026 budget, Zambia's government raised spending on healthcare 13 per cent to K26.2bn (\$1.1bn), though, at 11 per cent of total spending, that falls short of an international commitment to raise health spending to 15 per cent. It has also pledged to crack down on theft of donated medicines and has increased funds allocated for the purchase of drugs by 30 per cent.

Hichilema's remarks echo those of other African leaders who have been less critical of sweeping reductions in international aid than many non-governmental organisations and public health campaigners who fear a rebound in diseases such as HIV, tuberculosis and malaria. One study predicted an additional 14 million deaths worldwide by 2030 as a result of USAID cuts.

Hichilema said his stance did not mean there was no role for international solidarity, especially on issues such as public health and global security. "Countries cannot decouple themselves from one another," he said.

Big countries also had a duty to keep the international trading system open so that smaller states including Zambia could export freely, he said. The US this year raised tariffs on goods from Zambia to 15 per cent, though it exempted many metals, including copper, the African country's main export. China has responded by offering zero tariffs on all goods imported from Africa.

"We're too small to get caught in the middle of [arguments between] bigger countries," Hichilema said, urging the US and China to end their trade war. "When we're in Beijing, we are not against Washington. When we're in Washington, we're not against Beijing," he said.

Hichilema, whose four years in office have been dogged by painfully slow debt restructuring negotiations, said Zambia — which defaulted on its debt in 2020 — had cleared 94 per cent of its arrears in what he described as a "major milestone".

A dispute with the African Export-Import Bank (Afreximbank), to which Zambia owes about \$50mn, would be concluded under the rules of the G20 framework, he said.

The president said the economy was recovering as the debt crisis receded. The IMF expects Zambia to grow at roughly 6 per cent this year, up from 4 per cent last year when a recovery in mining revenue was offset by drought, which hit hydropower output and forced the country, normally a food exporter, to import staples.

Hichilema said his government had helped revive the mining sector by reversing what he characterised as the previous government's erratic policies. In 2023, Hichilema unwound an expropriation of the Konkola Copper Mines from Vedanta, an Indian miner, making it a condition that Vedanta invested \$1bn, he said.

The mining sector, he added, had received billions of dollars of new money, highlighting \$1.1bn invested by United Arab Emirates' International Resources in the Mopani Copper Mines since 2023 and Barrick's \$2bn expansion of the Lumwana copper mine.

Hichilema was elected on a wave of optimism in 2021 after he defeated Edgar Lungu. He described the debt inherited from his predecessor as a "python around our neck, chest and legs". High inflation and a squeeze on spending have damaged the new government's popularity.

Lungu died in June, but Hichilema, who will stand for re-election next year, has become drawn into a protracted fight with the late president's family over funeral arrangements.

Lungu's widow has gone to court to fight the repatriation of her late husband's body from South Africa — where he died while seeking health treatment — saying she did not want Hichilema to preside over the state funeral. Hichilema was imprisoned under his predecessor. The president conceded the dispute had been "very embarrassing" for Zambia. "But I believe sanity will prevail," he said.

Media plan: First Minister trip to Zambia and Malawi, October 2025

Background and aims

Scotland has developed close links with our partner countries, Malawi, Rwanda and Zambia. This will be the first time a First Minister has visited either country since the start of our international development work in 2005, and will be the first ever visit by a First Minister to Zambia. It is therefore a significant milestone, providing opportunities to:

- Showcase the importance of the Scottish Government's international development and global citizenship work
- Demonstrate to people in Scotland, as well as partner countries, the legacy of partnership programmes
- Promote initiatives aligned with the First Minister's priorities for Scotland: eradicating poverty, growing the economy and tackling the climate emergency, and Scotland's role on the world stage

Key messages

As a result of the Scottish Government's investment in international development programmes, and the hard work of our humanitarian and development partners, many lives across the world have been transformed. Our global partnerships have thrived in Zambia and Malawi. We are committed to supporting Global South countries to grow in a fair and sustainable manner – moving “from aid to trade”. And, in learning more about the challenges and opportunities facing people in other countries, we learn more about ourselves.

Health:

Over the 20-year period of our development programme, Scotland has a strong history of supporting health systems in our partner countries, with innovative partnerships between Universities, NHS staff and institutions, as well as support throughout the COVID crisis. Our NHS partnerships have transformed health care, for example launching Malawi's first dental school, supporting a programme which has trained all psychiatrists, established the first dedicated A&E centre, and supported on cancer.

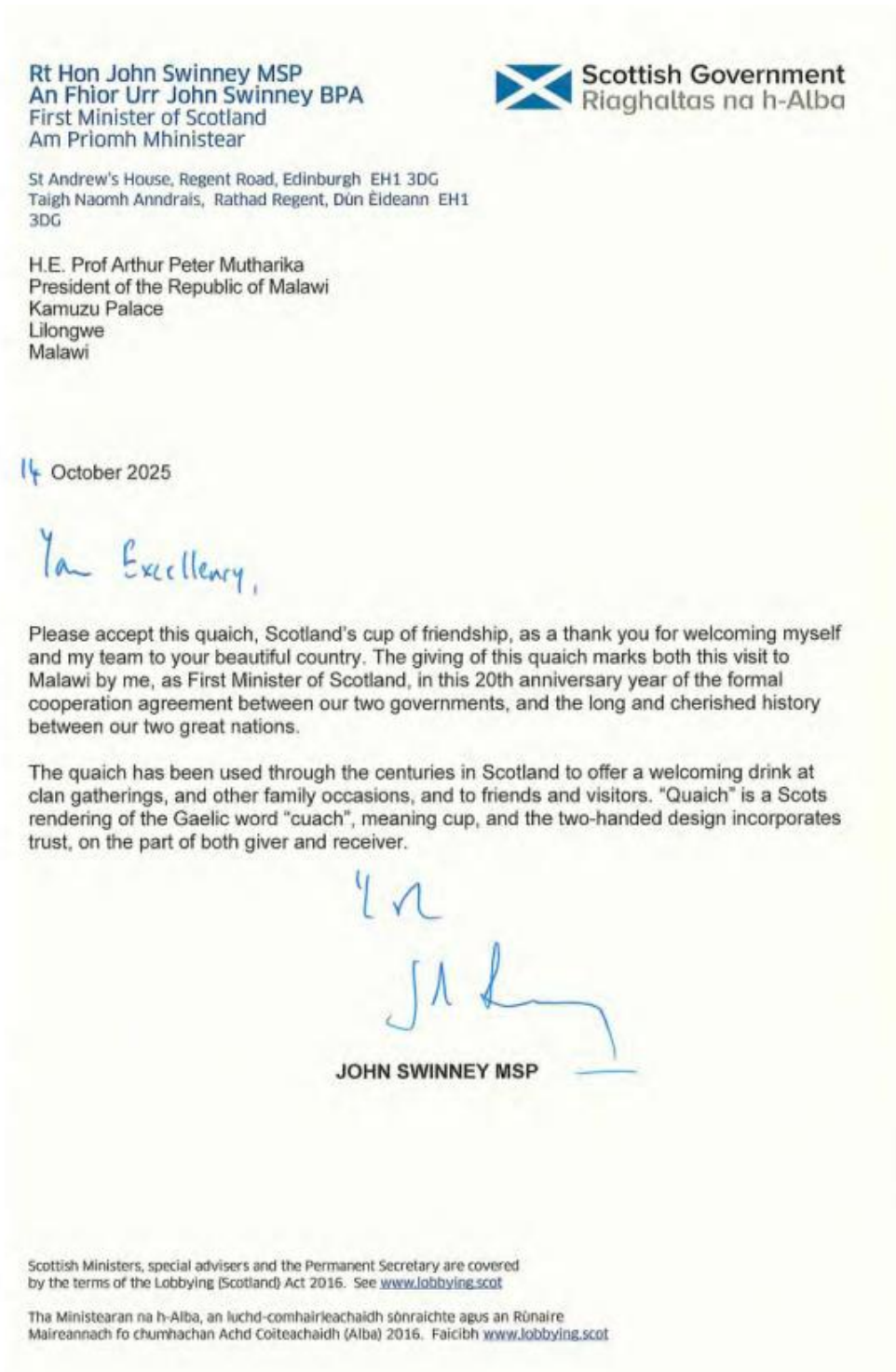
