Analysis of Written Responses to the Social Security in Scotland Consultation – SUPPLEMENTARY ANNEX TABLES

Background

These more detailed tables provide breakdowns by respondent group on the response levels for all consultation questions, and responses broken down by respondent group to closed questions.

In order to understand whether particular groups of stakeholders responded differently to closed questions, we (Research Scotland) reviewed the patterns in responses to closed questions by respondent group. However, it is important to note that because only a small proportion of consultation respondents answered each question, the number of respondents in each category was often too small to undertake meaningful quantitative analysis of closed questions.

Therefore, comparison of quantitative response patterns between respondent groups should be treated with caution. Assumptions should not be made about the extent to which the views of consultation respondents from a particular group represent the views of similar organisations who did not respond to the consultation.

Throughout Annex 1 percentage figures are used to show the proportion of respondents to the full consultation (of which there were 453) who responded to each question.

In Annex 2 percentage figures are used to show the proportion of people who answered each question who chose each option.
