Discussion guide**Introduction (3 mins)****ASK ALL**

Aim: To remind participant of key details about the research and obtain informed consent

THANK PARTICIPANT FOR TAKING PART & INTRODUCE YOURSELF.

EXPLAIN:

- The Scottish Government has asked Ipsos Scotland to get feedback on the vaccination programme for both COVID-19 vaccines and flu vaccines. Ipsos Scotland is an independent research organisation and not part of the Scottish Government. We are speaking to people across Scotland to understand their experiences of the vaccination programme and to see how it's working in practice.

- Remind participant that the interview will last about an hour (90 mins if paired interview) – check this is still a good time.
- Remind participant that they don't have to answer any questions they don't want to answer. Acknowledge that sometimes discussing vaccines can be a sensitive issue but it doesn't matter at all whether they have had covid or flu vaccines or not, there are no right or wrong answers, we are just curious to hear different people's views and experiences.
- Provide reassurances of anonymity and confidentiality. Explain that once we've spoken to everybody, we will write up the findings in a report for the Scottish Government that is to be published, but no identifying information about individuals will be shared outside of the research team. For example, if we want to quote people it will be anonymous. It will not be possible for the Scottish Government or anyone else to identify individuals in any reports that Ipsos produce.
- Check if participant has any questions.
- Request permission to record interview. Explain that this is for transcription and analysis purposes and that recordings will not be shared outside the research team at Ipsos.

START AUDIO RECORDING, RECORD VERBAL CONSENT TO TAKE PART.

- What would people hear about it/how would they like to make their appointment? (Prompt: would they prefer drop-in?)
- What would the experience of getting a vaccination be like?
- Where would it be delivered? What difference would that make?

- What do family and friends think about the vaccine?
- How helpful was this in helping to make their decision?

IF NOT COVERED: **Did you consider the introduction of ‘vaccine passports’ when you were making your decision?**

- Was that encouraging or off-putting?
- Did it make a difference when they were first introduced? How about now they’re being used on a voluntary basis?
- Would it impact their decision to get vaccinated if vaccine passports were reintroduced in the future?

Information if needed:

Covid Status Certification (often known as the Covid passports) contains details of your vaccination and test results. You can use it to prove your COVID vaccination status when travelling abroad or in some venues in Scotland that request it for entry.

Covid Status is no longer mandatory in Scotland for entry to some events and venues but was between September 30th 2021, and Sunday 27th February 2022.

What, if anything, would have to change for you to consider getting a COVID vaccine?
PROBE ON PRACTICAL AND WIDER CONCERNS.

Thanks. I want to ask you something a little different now. I’m going to describe a couple of scenarios where people in different situations are deciding whether or not to get a COVID vaccine, and then get your opinion on what they should do.

Scenario 1

First let me tell you about Chris. Chris is a 59-year-old self-employed builder who lives in Dundee with his wife. They have been careful during the pandemic to avoid catching COVID, but they’ve started to go out more now. He feels nervous that COVID could be a serious illness for him as he suffers from asthma and is considering getting the vaccine. However, his friends who have had the vaccine have had flu-like side effects and he is worried that he would have to take unpaid time off work if the same happened to him. He also knows some of them have gone on to catch COVID anyway. He’s read positive information about the vaccine on the Scottish

Government website and on the NHS, but he's read some blogs questioning how effective the vaccine is that some friends have shared on Facebook. Chris would like to go on a trip abroad this year, but this would be more difficult and expensive if he doesn't get vaccinated beforehand. Chris is unsure what to do.

What do you think would be the best thing for Chris to do in this situation?

Scenario 2a – for those aged over 25

Helen is 36 and works in a local shop. She is a single parent and lives with her three children. Her 73-year-old mother lives nearby. Her mother has lots of underlying health conditions, so Helen helps her out with everyday tasks and delivers her shopping. Helen thinks it would be good to get a vaccine because she caught COVID before and had to isolate which was really disruptive for the whole family, so she would like to avoid getting it again in the future. She is also worried about passing it on to her mother. However, she's very busy and never feels she has time to get it. She is also concerned about the safety of the vaccine since it was developed very quickly and is putting off making an appointment for now. Helen is hoping that if enough people in the community get vaccinated it will be less necessary for her to get one.

What do you think would be the best thing for Helen to do in this situation?

Scenario 2b – for those aged 25 and under

Lisa is 23 and is studying full-time at university as well as working part-time in a local shop. She currently lives with 3 flatmates who are around the same age, although she sometimes goes to stay with her parents for the weekend. Lisa thinks it could be good to get a vaccine because she caught COVID before and had to isolate which was really inconvenient, so she would like to lower her chances of getting it again. Her mother also has several underlying health conditions, so she doesn't want to pass it onto her. However, she had mild symptoms the first time and she's heard that new variants of the virus are milder, so it's low on her list of priorities as she is very busy. She is also concerned about the safety of the vaccine since it was developed very quickly and is putting off making an appointment for now. Lisa is hoping that if enough people in the community get vaccinated it will be less necessary for her to get one.

What do you think would be the best thing for Lisa to do in this situation?

Section 3 – Reasons for not getting flu vaccine (10 mins / 40 overall)

ASK THOSE WHO ARE ELIGIBLE FOR A FLU VACCINE BUT DID NOT GET IT IN 2021/22

Aim: to understand influences on decisions not to get the flu vaccine

As I mentioned earlier, I'm also interested in hearing your thoughts on the flu vaccine. You mentioned that you chose not to get the flu vaccine this Winter, although you were eligible for it.

Have you previously had the flu vaccine?

What would you say are the main reasons you didn't get a flu vaccine this winter?

PROBE FULLY

What would have to change for you to consider getting a flu vaccine in future?

PROBE FULLY

Section 4 - Experience of children (not) getting vaccinated (10 mins / 50 overall)

ASK THOSE WHO HAVE CHILDREN UNDER 16

Aim: to understand views on children getting vaccinated and whether this is different to how they think about themselves being vaccinated. To understand any differences between children getting vaccinated against COVID compared to flu.

Now I'd like to ask about your views on your child/children getting either the COVID or flu vaccines.

COVID VACCINE

Firstly, can I just check - as far as you're aware, [is your child / are any of your children] eligible for the COVID vaccine?

IF NOT ELIGIBLE: SKIP TO FLU QUESTIONS (NEXT YELLOW SECTION)

And have your child(ren) had all the COVID vaccines that they are eligible for?

IF NO: are they likely to get them in the future?

Have you fully decided this yet?

Did you have the same views as your child(ren) as to whether they should receive it? IF

NOT: how was the decision made?

ASK THOSE WHOSE CHILD(REN) HAVE BEEN VACCINATED:

Tell me about the decision for your child(ren) to get the COVID vaccine?

- How the decision was made (parent/child/jointly)
 - How did their age impact this?
- Main reasons for decision

Even though your child(ren) have had a COVID vaccine, did you have any initial concerns?

PROBE FOR REASONS (e.g. side effects; safety; practical concerns)

How were these overcome?

ASK THOSE WHOSE CHILD(REN) HAVE NOT BEEN VACCINATED:

Tell me about the decision for your child(ren) not to have the COVID vaccine?

- How the decision was made (parent/child/jointly)
 - How did their age impact this?
- Main reasons (e.g. forgot / didn't get around to it; side effects; safety; practical concerns e.g. making an appointment, accessibility)

What would have to change in order for you to be happy for your child(ren) to get a COVID vaccine?

FLU VACCINE

And [is your child / are any of your children] eligible for the flu vaccine?

IF NOT ELIGIBLE: SKIP TO SECTION 6.

And have your child(ren) had the flu vaccine this Winter? Have they had it in the past?

Did you have the same views as them as to whether they should receive it? IF NOT: how was the decision made?

ASK THOSE WHOSE CHILD(REN) HAVE BEEN VACCINATED:

Tell me about the decision for your child(ren) to get the COVID vaccine?

- How the decision was made (parent/child/jointly)
 - How did their age impact this?
- Main reasons for decision
- Were these reasons any different this year given COVID-19?

Even though your child(ren) have had a flu vaccine, did you have any initial concerns?

PROBE FOR REASONS (e.g. side effects; safety; practical concerns)

IF THEY HAD CONCERNS: Were these overcome? If so, how?

ASK THOSE WHOSE CHILD(REN) HAVE NOT BEEN VACCINATED:

Tell me about the decision for your child(ren) not to have the flu vaccine?

- How the decision was made (parent/child/jointly)
 - How did their age impact this?
- Main reasons (e.g. forgot / didn't get around to it; side effects; safety; practical concerns e.g. making an appointment, accessibility)

What would have to change in order for you to be happy for your child(ren) to get a flu vaccine?

Section 5 - Future engagement with vaccines (10 minutes, 60 overall)

ASK ALL

Aim: To summarise key factors in future engagement with vaccination programmes (likely to have emerged during interviews)

Looking ahead - how likely would you be to take up future offers of Covid-19 vaccines or the flu vaccine?

IF THEY SAY UNLIKELY:

Overall, what (if anything) would have to happen for you to change your mind?

PROBE FULLY ON BOTH PRACTICAL AND WIDER ELEMENTS.

If you were to imagine a future where there was a vaccination programme that you trusted and that was really well designed – what would that look like? PROBE AS NECESSARY:

- How would people hear about it? From who?
- What would people hear about it/how would they like to make their appointment? (e.g. would a drop-in be preferred?)
- What would the experience of getting a vaccination be like?
- Where would it be delivered? What difference would that make?

Is there anything else you feel it is worth mentioning about the COVID or flu vaccine programmes that we haven't talked about today?

Wrap up
