

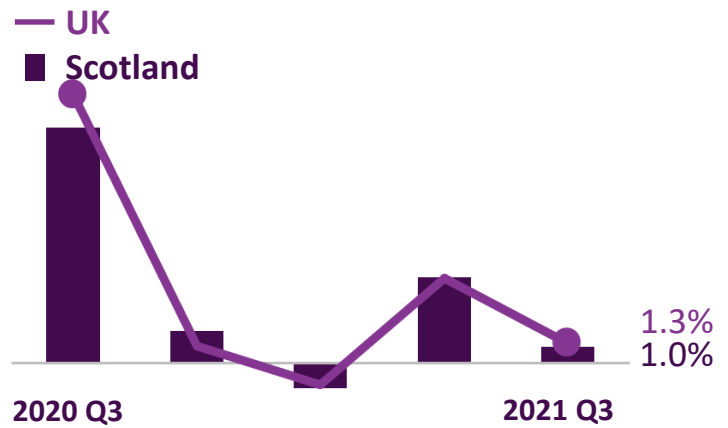


**GDP grew 1.0% in the third quarter of 2021**

Gross Domestic Product has increased by 1.0% during July to September.

During this period UK GDP increased by 1.3%.

Change in GDP compared to last quarter

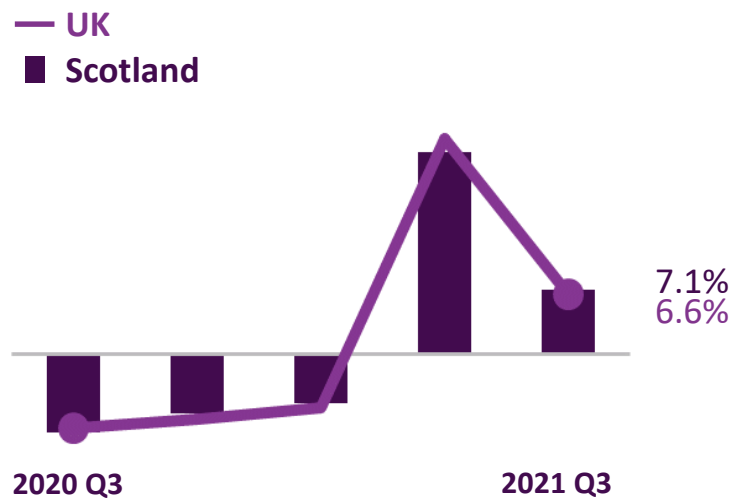


**Scottish GDP grew by 7.1% over the year**

Compared to the same time last year (2020 Q3), Scottish GDP has increased 7.1%.

Equivalent UK change over the year was 6.6%.

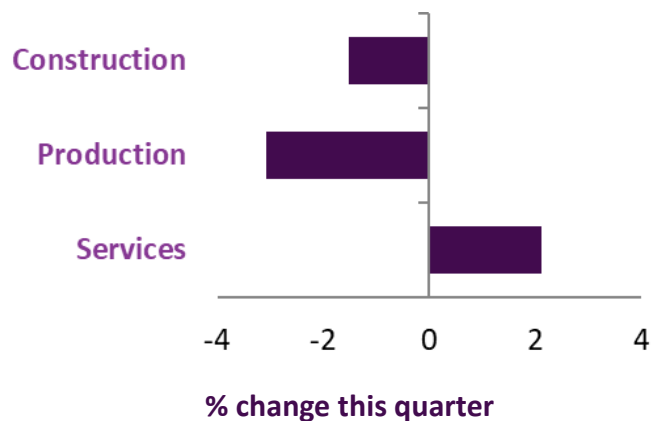
Change in GDP compared to the same quarter last year



**Falls in Construction and Production**

In 2021 Q3, output in the Construction sector decreased by -1.5%, output in the Production sector decreased by -3.1% and Services sector output increased by 2.1%.

## GDP fell 9.7% in 2020

Between 2019 and 2020 (taking all four quarters of each year), Scottish GDP decreased by 9.7%.

Equivalent UK change in 2020 was also 9.7%.

## Revisions to GDP

This publication has no revisions since the 2021 Q2 second estimate, published on 3 November 2021

The publication of Quarterly National Accounts Scotland (QNAS) on 9 February 2022 will include a second estimate of GDP growth for 2021 Q3 and revisions to previous quarters.
